## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SENATE AND HOUSE RULES 312

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Senate Rule 312 is amended as follows:
312. ORDER-OF MOTION MOTIONS DURING DEBATE. When a question is under debate, no motion may be received, except to fix the time to which to adjourn; to adjourn; to lay on the table; to move the previous question; to close, limit, or extend debate (which four five kinds of motions must be decided without debate); to move to postpone to a day certain; to refer; and to amend. These motions have precedence in the order in which they are named. No motion to postpone to a day certain or to refer, having been decided, may be entertained again on the same day.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. House Rule 312 is amended as follows:
312. ORDER OF MOTION MOTIONS DURING DEBATE. When a question is under debate, no motion may be received, except to fix the time to which to adjourn; to adjourn; to lay on the table; to move the previous question; to close, limit, or extend debate (which four five kinds of motions must be decided without debate); to move to postpone to a day certain; to refer; and to amend. These motions have precedence in the order in which they are named. No motion to postpone to a day certain or to refer, having been decided, may be entertained again on the same day.

NOTE: This proposed rules amendment is in response to a suggestion that this rule specifically include motions to close, limit, or extend debate. The previous question is a motion used to close debate (and put the question to an immediate vote) and similar treatment (e.g., allowing the motion to be made during debate) would be accorded to a motion to close, limit, or extend debate.

The motion to close, limit, or extend debate is treated as not being subject to debate, and proposed amendments to Senate and House Rules 317 add such motions to the list of nondebatable motions.
