Effect on Prisons Division:

Inmates are sent to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation under current statutes are seldom given the maximum available sentence. For calendar year 2003 DOCR admissions for GSI with force were sentenced to an average 6.5 years (a low of 3 years and a high of 12 years). Other GSI cases received a range from 6 months to 12 years with only one sentence of 20 years (maximum) to prison. The average was 4.6 years. Other crimes in this section were very limited and all received a sentence less than the maximum. It is not anticipated that there will be any incarceration impact until the 2009-11 biennium unless sentencing practices change.

Effect on Field Services Division:

Case loads for probation officers will be impacted significantly after the 2007-09 biennium. Specialized sex offender probation officers were hired in the second half of the 2003-05 biennium and it is anticipated those officers will be able to effectively manage sex offender probation cases during the fiscal note period. It will be necessary to evaluate the willingness of the courts to impose additional (discretionary) period of probation before a reasonable estimate can be made. However, it is the opinion of the DOCR that major effects will not be felt until after the 2007-09 biennium.
