- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the agriculture
- 2 commissioner; to amend and reenact sections 4-01-21 and 19-18-04 of the North Dakota
- 3 Century Code, relating to the salary of the agriculture commissioner and pesticide registration
- 4 fees; to provide for transfers; to provide for legislative intent; and to provide an effective date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

6 **SECTION 1. BASE LEVEL FUNDING INFORMATION.** The amounts identified in this 7 section represent the base level funding component appropriated to the agriculture

9 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the 10 funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 11 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 12 other income, to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of that 13 agency, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009, as follows:

SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND

PROTECTION FUND. The estimated income line item in section 3 of this Act includes the sum
of \$3,042,109, or so much of the sum as may be available, from the environment and
rangeland protection fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various agriculture
department programs, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009.
SECTION 5. ANHYDROUS AMMONIA STORAGE INSPECTION FUND. The

30 estimated income line item in section 3 of this Act includes the sum of \$65,912, or so much of

31 the sum as may be available, from the anhydrous ammonia storage inspection fund for the

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1 purpose of defraying the expenses of regulating anhydrous ammonia storage facilities, for the 2 biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. 3 SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND. The estimated income 4 line item in section 3 of this Act includes the sum of \$889,684, or so much of the sum as may 5 be necessary, from the game and fish department operating fund for the purpose of defraying 6 the expenses of various agriculture department programs for the biennium beginning July 1, 7 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. 8 SECTION 7. INTENT - SALARY EQUITY. The sum of \$318,138 included in the 9 salaries and wages line item in section 3 of this Act is for salary equity increases, which must 10 be based on market. 11 SECTION 8. TRANSFER. The commissioner shall transfer \$200,000 from the 12 environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund. 13 SECTION 9. AMENDMENT. Section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is 14 amended and reenacted as follows: 15 **4-01-21.** Salary of agriculture commissioner. The annual salary of the agriculture 16 commissioner is seventy-two seventy-eight thousand six five hundred sixty-nine ninety-nine 17 dollars through June 30, 2006 2008, and seventy five eighty-one thousand five seven hundred 18 seventy-six forty-three dollars thereafter. 19 SECTION 10. AMENDMENT. Section 19-18-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is 20 amended and reenacted as follows: 21 19-18-04. (Effective through June 30, 2007) Registration - Fees. 22 Any person before selling or offering for sale any pesticide for use within this state 1. 23 shall file biennially with the commissioner an application for registration of the 24 pesticide. The application must: 25 Give the name and address of each manufacturer or distributor. a. 26 b. Give the name and brand of each product to be registered. 27 C. Be accompanied by a current label of each product to be registered. 28 Be accompanied by a registration fee of three hundred fifty dollars for each d. 29 product to be registered. At the close of each calendar month, the 30 commissioner shall transmit to the state treasurer all moneys received for the 31 registrations. The state treasurer shall credit fifty dollars for each registered

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1			product to the general fund in the state treasury and the remainder of the
2			registration fee for each registered product to the environment and rangeland
3			protection fund.
4			e. Be accompanied by a material safety data sheet for each product to be
5			registered.
6		2.	The commissioner may require an applicant or registrant to provide efficacy,
7			toxicity, residue, and any other data necessary to determine if the pesticide will
8			perform its intended function without unreasonable adverse effects on the
9			environment. If the commissioner finds that the application conforms to law, the
10			commissioner shall issue to the applicant a certificate of registration of the product.
11		3.	Each registration covers a designated two-year period beginning January first of
12			each even-numbered year and expiring December thirty-first of the following year.
13			A certificate of registration may not be issued for a term longer than two years, and
14			is not transferable from one person to another, or from the ownership to whom
15			issued to another ownership. A penalty of fifty percent of the license or registration

16 fee must be imposed if the license or certificate of registration is not applied for on 17 or before January thirty-first following the expiration date. Each product must go 18 through a two-year discontinuance period in order to clear all outstanding products 19 in the channel of trade.

20 4. This section does not apply to a pesticide sold by a retail dealer if the registration 21 fee has been paid by the manufacturer, jobber, or any other person, as required by 22 this section.
