1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of human services; to provide statements of legislative intent; to provide for a legislative council 2 3 report; to provide for legislative council studies; to authorize a Bank of North Dakota loan; to 4 provide a contingent appropriation; to provide for transfers; to create and enact a new section 5 to chapter 23-01 and chapter 23-39 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to programs for 6 children with special health care needs; to amend and reenact sections 25-17-02, 25-17-03, 7 50-06-01.2, 50-06-01.4, 50-06-24, and 50-24.4-15 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating 8 to rulemaking and to the provision of medical food for individuals with metabolic disorders, the 9 structure of the department of human services, guardianship services, and to nursing home 10 property-related costs; and to repeal chapter 50-10 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating 11 to aid to crippled children.

### 12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. BASE LEVEL FUNDING INFORMATION. The amounts identified in this

The funds provided in this section, or so much of the 7 funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 8 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 9 other income, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying the expenses 10 of its various divisions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009, as 11 follows:

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#### 17 SECTION 4. FUNDING TRANSFERS - EXCEPTION - AUTHORIZATION.

18 Notwithstanding section 54-16-04, the department of human services may transfer 19 appropriation authority between line items within each subdivision of section 3 of this Act and 20 between subdivisions within section 3 of this Act for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and 21 ending June 30, 2009. The department shall notify the office of management and budget of 22 any transfer made pursuant to this section. The department shall report to the budget section 23 after June 30, 2008, any transfers made in excess of \$50,000 and to the appropriations 24 committees of the sixty-first legislative assembly regarding any transfers made pursuant to this 25 section.

## 26 SECTION 5. BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA LOAN AUTHORIZATION - BUDGET

SECTION APPROVAL - CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION. If cost and caseload/utilization of
developmental disabilities services is more than anticipated by the sixtieth legislative assembly,
the department of human services, subject to budget section approval, may borrow the sum of
\$3,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the Bank of North Dakota,
which is appropriated for the purpose of providing the state matching share of additional

1 medical assistance grants for developmental disabilities services for the biennium beginning 2 July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. The department of human services shall request 3 funding from the sixty-first legislative assembly to repay any loan obtained pursuant to 4 provisions of this section, including accrued interest. 5 SECTION 6. CRITICAL ACCESS HOSPITALS - MEDICAL ASSISTANCE 6 **REIMBURSEMENT METHOD.** The department of human services shall implement a 7 cost-based reimbursement system for inpatient and outpatient hospital services of critical 8 access hospitals based on the funding provided in section 3 of this Act for the biennium 9 beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. 10 SECTION 7. DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES STUDY - REBASING MEDICAL 11 SERVICES PAYMENT RATES - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The department 12 of human services shall determine, during the 2007-08 interim and with the assistance of a 13 health care consultant, the estimated cost of rebasing payment rates under the medical 14 assistance program for hospital, physician, dentist, ambulance, and chiropractic services to the 15 actual cost of providing these services for use in preparing the department's budget request for 16 the 2009-11 biennium. The base year used in developing the cost estimate must be the most 17 recent calendar year for which complete financial information is available to the department. 18 The department shall report its findings and recommendations to the appropriations committees 19 of the sixty-first legislative assembly. The department's recommendations may include options 20 for staggered implementation or earlier implementation date preferences for service providers 21 that have medical assistance service revenue that is ten percent or more of its total patient 22 revenue. Any funds appropriated by the sixtieth legislative assembly to the department for 23 providing the information required by this section may not be spent for other purposes during 24 the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. 25 **SECTION 8. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STUDY - NURSING HOME RATE** 26 **EQUALIZATION.** The legislative council shall consider studying, during the 2007-08 interim,

the feasibility and desirability of continuing the equalization of nursing home payment rates and
the feasibility and desirability of establishing a provider tax or assessment on nursing homes.
The study must include input from representatives of the department of human services, other
appropriate state agencies, and the nursing home industry. The legislative council shall report

1 its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the

2 recommendations, to the sixty-first legislative assembly.

3 SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STUDY - INFANT DEVELOPMENT 4 **PROGRAM.** The legislative council shall consider studying, during the 2007-08 interim, infant 5 development programs. The study, if conducted, must include a review of the state's lead 6 agency agreement, service coordination, staffing, and funding structure, including the adequacy 7 of the funding and the equitable distribution of the funds to providers. The legislative council 8 shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to 9 implement the recommendations, to the sixty-first legislative assembly. 10 SECTION 10. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES SERVICE 11 PROVIDERS FUNDING INCREASES - EMPLOYEE SALARY INCREASE PRIORITY. It is the 12 intent of the sixtieth legislative assembly that developmental disabilities service providers give 13 priority to using the increased funding being provided for the 2007-09 biennium for increasing 14 employees' salaries.

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#### SECTION 11. ONE-TIME FUNDING - EFFECT ON BASE BUDGET - REPORT TO

SIXTY-FIRST LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The total general fund appropriation line item in subdivision 3 of section 3 of this Act includes \$8,244,131 for the one-time funding items identified in this section. This amount is not a part of the agency's base budget to be used in preparing the 2009-11 executive budget. The department of human services shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-first legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009.

1 SECTION 12. METHAMPHETAMINE TREATMENT SERVICES. The department of 2 human services shall use the \$700,000 from the general fund included in the operating 3 expenses line item in subdivision 2 of section 3 of this Act for increasing the number of 4 individuals receiving treatment services under the department's existing contract for 5 methamphetamine treatment services for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending 6 June 30, 2009. 7 SECTION 13. ESTIMATED INCOME - LIMIT - HEALTH CARE TRUST FUND. The 8 estimated income line item in subdivision 2 of section 3 of this Act includes \$525,597 from the 9 health care trust fund. The department of human services expenditures from this fund may not 10 exceed this amount for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. 11 SECTION 14. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - STATE CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE 12 **PROGRAM.** The funding appropriated in subdivision 2 of section 3 of this Act includes 13 \$453,000 for a state children's health insurance program outreach program. It is the intent of 14 the sixtieth legislative assembly that the department of human services provide this funding to 15 an entity that focuses on statewide community health care initiatives and issues. 16 SECTION 15. A new section to chapter 23-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is 17 created and enacted as follows: 18 Children with special health care needs - Program administration. The state 19 department of health shall administer programs for children with special health care needs as 20 may be necessary to conform to title 5, part 2, of the federal Social Security Act, as amended 21 through July 1, 2007 [Pub. L. 74-271; 49 Stat. 620; 42 U.S.C. 701 et seq.], including providing 22 services and assistance to children with special health care needs and their families and 23 developing and operating clinics for the identification, screening, referral, and treatment of 24 children with special health care needs. 25 **SECTION 16.** Chapter 23-39 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted 26 as follows: 27 23-39-01. Definitions. In this chapter unless the context or subject matter otherwise 28 requires: 29 "County agency" means the county social service boards in this state. 1. 30 <u>2.</u> "Department" means the state department of health.

SECTION 20. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-01.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is

50-06-01.4. Structure of the department. The department includes the state hospital;
the regional human service centers; a vocational rehabilitation unit; and other units or offices
and administrative and fiscal support services as the executive director determines necessary.
The department must be structured to promote efficient and effective operations and,
consistent with fulfilling its prescribed statutory duties, shall act as the official agency of the
state in the discharge of the following functions not otherwise by law made the responsibility of
another state agency:

- Administration of programs for children and families, including adoption services and the licensure of child-placing agencies, foster care services and the licensure of foster care arrangements, child protection services, children's trust fund, state youth authority, licensure of day care homes and facilities, services to unmarried parents, refugee services, in-home community-based services, and administration of the interstate compacts on the placement of children and juveniles.
- Administration of programs for persons with developmental disabilities, including
   licensure of facilities and services, and the design and implementation of a
   community-based service system for persons in need of habilitation.
- Administration of aging service programs, including nutrition, transportation,
   advocacy, social, ombudsman, recreation, and related services funded under the
   Older Americans Act of 1965 [42 U.S.C. 3001 et seq.], home and
   community-based services, licensure of adult family care homes, committee on
   aging, and the fund matching program for city or county tax levies for senior citizen
   activities and services.
- Administration of mental health programs, including planning and implementing
   preventive, consultative, diagnostic, treatment, and rehabilitative services for
   persons with mental or emotional disorders and psychiatric conditions.
- Administration of programs for crippled children, including the provision of services
   and assistance to crippled children and their families, and the development and
   operation of clinics for the identification, screening, referral, and treatment of
   crippled children.

Administration of alcohol and drug abuse programs, including establishing quality
 assurance standards for the licensure of programs, services, and facilities,
 planning and coordinating a system of prevention, intervention, and treatment
 services, providing policy leadership in cooperation with other public and private
 agencies, and disseminating information to local service providers and the general
 public.

- 7 7. 6. Administration of economic assistance programs, including temporary assistance
   8 for needy families, food stamps, fuel assistance, child support enforcement,
   9 refugee assistance, work experience, work incentive, and quality control.
- 8. <u>7.</u> Administration of medical service programs, including medical assistance for
   needy persons, early and periodic screening, diagnosis and treatment, utilization
   control, and claims processing.

The executive director shall consult with and maintain a close working relationship with the state department of health; with the department of corrections and rehabilitation and the superintendents of the school for the deaf and the school for the blind to develop programs for developmentally disabled persons; and with the superintendent of public instruction to maximize the use of resource persons in regional human service centers in the provision of special education services. The executive director shall also maintain a close liaison with county social service agencies.

SECTION 21. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-24 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

22 **50-06-24.** Guardianship services. The department of human services may create 23 and coordinate a unified system for the provision of guardianship services to vulnerable adults 24 who are ineligible for developmental disabilities case management services. The system must 25 include a base unit funding level at the same level as developmental disability corporate 26 guardianship rates, provider standards, staff competency requirements, the use of an 27 emergency funding procedure to cover the costs of establishing needed guardianships, and 28 guidelines and training for guardians. The department shall require that the contracting entity 29 develop and maintain a system of volunteer guardians to serve the state. The department shall 30 adopt rules for guardianship services to vulnerable adults which are consistent with chapters 31 30.1-26, 30.1-28, and 30.1-29.
