- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact two new sections to chapter 15-20.1, two new sections to
- 2 chapter 15.1-06, a new section to chapter 15.1-07, chapter 15.1-18.2, four new sections to
- 3 chapter 15.1-21, sections 15.1-21-02.2, 15.1-21-02.3, 15.1-21-02.4, and 15.1-21-02.5, two new
- 4 sections to chapter 15.1-27, and four new sections to chapter 15.1-37 of the North Dakota
- 5 Century Code, relating to school personnel, program and course requirements, assessments,
- 6 career development facilitation, state aid payments, and early childhood education; to amend
- 7 and reenact sections 15.1-06-04, 15.1-09.1-10, 15.1-21-02, 15.1-21-02.1, 15.1-27-03.1,
- 8 15.1-27-04, 15.1-27-07.1, 15.1-27-07.2, 15.1-27-11, 15.1-27-19, 15.1-27-35, 15.1-27-41,
- 9 15.1-32-18, and 15.1-37-01 of the North Dakota Century Code and section 55 of chapter 163 of
- 10 the 2007 Session Laws, relating to school calendars, course requirements, state aid payments,
- 11 special education, and early childhood education; to provide for teacher compensation
- 12 increases; to provide for the distribution of transportation grants, reorganization planning grants,
- 13 regional education association grants, baseline recalculation grants, deferred maintenance
- 14 grants, and contingency payments; to provide for a contingent transfer; to provide for reports to
- 15 the legislative council; to repeal sections 15.1-21-02.2, 15.1-27-20.1, and 15.1-38-01.2 of the
- 16 North Dakota Century Code, relating to high school graduation requirements, the minimum mill
- 17 levy offset, and new immigrant English language learners; and to declare an emergency.

During the 2007-08 school year, a full day of instruction consists of: 10 (1) At least five and one-half hours for elementary students, during which 11 time the students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of 12 receiving curricular instruction; and 13 At least six hours for high school students, during which time the (2) 14 students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of receiving 15 curricular instruction. 16 Beginning with the 2008-09 school year, a A full day of instruction consists of: b. 17 (1) At least five and one-half hours for kindergarten and elementary 18 students, during which time the students are required to be in 19 attendance for the purpose of receiving curricular instruction; and 20 (2)At least six hours for high school students, during which time the 21 students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of receiving 22 curricular instruction. 23 Beginning with the 2010-11 school year, up to four of the days of full b. 24 instruction required by subsection 1 may be configured as follows: 25 (1) At least four hours for kindergarten and elementary students, during 26 which time the students are required to be in attendance for the 27 purpose of receiving curricular instruction and at least one and one-half 28 hours during which students are not required to be in attendance but 29 teachers are required to participate with other teachers in collaborative 30 or cooperative activities pertaining to curriculum, classroom practices, 31 and the interpretation and use of formative testing data; and

1 (2) At least four and one-half hours for high school students, during which 2 time the students are required to be in attendance for the purpose of 3 receiving curricular instruction and at least one and one-half hours 4 during which students are not required to be in attendance but teachers 5 are required to participate with other teachers in collaborative or 6 cooperative activities pertaining to curriculum, classroom practices, and 7 the interpretation and use of formative testing data. 8 6. If a school's calendar provides for an extension of each schoolday beyond the 9 statutorily required minimum number of hours, and if the extensions when 10 aggregated over an entire school year amount to more than eighty-four hours of 11 additional classroom instruction during the school year, the school is exempt from 12 having to make up six hours of instruction time lost as a result of weather-related 13 closure. In order to make up lost classroom instruction time beyond the six hours, 14 the school must extend its normal school calendar day by at least thirty minutes. 15 7. A school that does not qualify under the provisions of subsection 6 must extend its 16 normal schoolday by at least thirty minutes to make up classroom instruction time 17 lost as a result of weather-related closure. 18 If because of weather a school must dismiss before completing a full day of 8. 19 instruction, the school is responsible for making up only those hours and portions 20 of an hour between the time of early dismissal and the conclusion of a full day of 21 classroom instruction. 22 **SECTION 4.** A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is 23 created and enacted as follows: 24 Counselor positions - Requirement. 25 Each school district must have available one full-time equivalent counselor for 1. 26 every three hundred students in grades seven through twelve. 27 2. Up to one-third of the full-time equivalency requirement established in subsection 1 28 may be met by career advisors. 29 For purposes of this section, a "career advisor" means an individual who holds a 3.

certificate in career development facilitation issued by the department of career

and technical education under section 1 of this Act or an individual who is

1	provisionally approved by the department of career and technical education under
2	section 2 of this Act to serve as a career advisor.
3	SECTION 5. A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is
4	created and enacted as follows:
5	Career advisor - Duties. A career advisor shall meet with students in grades seven
6	through twelve, discuss the student's academic assessments and career interest surveys, and
7	pursue with the student career development and work-planning activities. A career advisor
8	shall use computer-assisted career guidance systems and work at the direction and under the
9	supervision of the school district counseling staff.
10	SECTION 6. A new section to chapter 15.1-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is
11	created and enacted as follows:
12	Student performance strategist - Verification - Qualifications. Beginning with the
13	2010-11 school year, each school district must have available one full-time equivalent student
14	performance strategist for every four hundred students in average daily membership in
15	kindergarten through grade three. Each school district shall submit documentation to the
16	superintendent of public instruction, at the time and in the manner directed by the
17	superintendent, verifying the amount of time that each student performance strategist expended
18	in tutoring students on a one-to-one basis or in groups ranging from two to five, or in providing
19	instructional coaching to teachers. For purposes of this section, a "student performance
20	strategist" must meet the qualifications of an elementary school teacher as set forth in section
21	15.1-18-07 and serve as a tutor or an instructional coach.
22	SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-09.1-10 of the North Dakota Century Code
23	is amended and reenacted as follows:
24	15.1-09.1-10. State aid - Payable to a regional education association - Obligation
25	of district.
26	1. The superintendent of public instruction shall forward the portion of a school
27	district's state aid that which is payable by the superintendent under subdivision q
28	of subsection 1 of section 15.1-27-03.1 as a result of the district's participation in a
29	regional education association directly to the association in which the district
30	participates. The superintendent shall forward the amount payable under this

1		subsection at the same time and in the same manner as provided for other state
2		aid payments under section 15.1-27-01.

4		meet any contractual or statutory obligation imposed upon it as a result of the
5		district's participation in a regional education association, the superintendent shall

The superintendent of public instruction may expend up to \$100,000 from the grants - state school aid line item in the appropriation bill for the superintendent of public instruction, as approved by the sixty-first legislative assembly, for the purpose of providing planning grants to school districts participating in reorganizations under chapter 15.1-12, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011. A grant provided under this section may not exceed \$25,000 and may not be awarded unless the student and the recipient districts vote not to reorganize, the superintendent of public instruction shall withhold the grant amount that each district received under this section from any state aid payable to the district.

SECTION 38. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS. During each year of the 2009-11 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall expend up to \$200,000 from the grants - state school aid line item in the appropriation bill for the superintendent of public instruction, as approved by the sixty-first legislative assembly, for the purpose of providing grants in the amount of \$25,000, to each group of school districts which has been designated as a regional education association under section 15.1-09.1-02. SECTION 43. CONTINGENT TRANSFER BY BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION. If during the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, the superintendent of public instruction determines that, using all available sources, there are insufficient funds with which to fully reimburse school districts for the excess costs of serving the one percent of special education students statewide who require the greatest school district expenditures in order to be provided with special education and related services, the industrial commission shall transfer from the earnings and accumulated and undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota the amount the superintendent of public instruction certifies is necessary to provide the statutorily required level of reimbursement. The superintendent of public instruction shall file for introduction legislation requesting that the sixty-second legislative assembly return any amount transferred under this section to the Bank of North Dakota.
