1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact two new sections to chapter 15-20.1, two new sections to 2 chapter 15.1-02, two new sections to chapter 15.1-06, a new section to chapter 15.1-07, a new 3 section to chapter 15.1-13, chapter 15.1-18.2, six new sections to chapter 15.1-21, sections 4 15.1-21-02.3, 15.1-21-02.4, 15.1-21-02.5, and 15.1-21-02.6, two new sections to chapter 5 15.1-27, and three new sections to chapter 15.1-37 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating 6 to career development facilitation, student health insurance, the use of federal stimulus dollars, 7 school personnel, national board certification, program and course requirements, assessments, 8 state aid payments, and an early childhood education council; to amend and reenact sections 9 15.1-06-04, 15.1-09.1-10, 15.1-21-02, 15.1-21-02.1, 15.1-27-03.1, 15.1-27-04, 15.1-27-07.2, 10 15.1-27-11, 15.1-27-19, 15.1-27-35, 15.1-27-41, and 15.1-32-18 of the North Dakota Century 11 Code and section 55 of chapter 163 of the 2007 Session Laws, relating to school calendars, 12 course requirements, state aid payments, and special education; to provide an appropriation; to 13 provide a continuing appropriation; to provide for teacher compensation increases; to provide 14 for the distribution of teacher support system grants, transportation grants, reorganization 15 planning grants, regional education association grants, baseline recalculation grants, deferred 16 maintenance grants, and contingency payments; to provide for a contingent transfer; to provide 17 for reports to the legislative council; to repeal sections 15.1-21-02.2, 15.1-27-20.1, 15.1-27-41, 18 and 15.1-38-01.2 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to high school graduation 19 requirements, the minimum mill levy offset, the commission on education improvement, and 20 new immigrant English language learners; to provide an effective date; and to declare an 21 emergency.

All interest and income received on investments are appropriated on a continuing 20 21 basis to the education standards and practices board for the purpose of awarding 22 grants to teachers pursuing national board certification. 23 The education standards and practices board shall make grants available to 2. 24 applicants in an amount equal to the cost of obtaining national board certification, 25 but not exceeding two thousand five hundred dollars per applicant. The board 26 shall make the grants available to applicants in chronological order, based on the 27 date the board receives an applicant's completed application. 28 As a condition of the grant, the education standards and practices board may <u>3.</u> 29 require recipients who achieve national board certification to mentor other 30 individuals who are licensed to teach by the board.
