4	SEC	OTION	N 1. American Indian language preservation committee - Membership -

6	<u>1.</u>	The	American Indian language preservation committee consists of:
7		<u>a.</u>	The executive director of the Indian affairs commission, who shall serve as
8			the chairman;
9		<u>b.</u>	The superintendent of public instruction or the superintendent's designee;
10		<u>C.</u>	An individual employed as a faculty member at a tribal college, appointed by
11			the governor;
12		<u>d.</u>	The director of the state historical society;
13		<u>e.</u>	The chairman of the North Dakota humanities council;
14		<u>f.</u>	The chairman of the university of North Dakota department of Indian studies
15			or the chairman's designee; and

1 The translation of existing materials; and b. 2 The acquisition, development, and dissemination of instructional materials for <u>C.</u> 3 elementary and high school students, individuals enrolled in institutions of 4 higher education, and other adults; 5 Pursue working relationships aimed at American Indian language preservation with <u>2.</u> 6 public and private sector entities, including institutions of higher education, in this 7 state and in other states and provinces; and 8 Seek the active participation of American Indians residing in this state on an 3. 9 individual and a tribal basis. 10 **SECTION 3.** Powers - Continuing appropriation. 11 The committee may: 1. 12 Accept gifts, grants, and donations of money, property, and services to carry a. 13 out this Act; 14 Expend moneys received under this section to carry out this Act; and b. 15 C. Contract with any person for any purpose related to this Act. 16 Any moneys received by the committee under this section are appropriated to the 2. 17 committee on a continuing basis. 18 **SECTION 4.** APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated out of any moneys from the 19 federal fiscal stabilization - other government services funds made available to the governor 20 under the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, not otherwise 21 appropriated, the sum of \$18,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the Indian 22 affairs commission for the purpose of providing matching funds to the American Indian 23 language preservation committee, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending 24 June 30, 2011. Each dollar provided to the committee under this section is contingent upon the 25 committee demonstrating that it has matched each \$1 to be provided under this section with \$3, 26 or the equivalent thereof in-kind, from nonstate sources for the purposes set forth in this Act. 27 SECTION 5. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL REPORT. Before September 2010, the 28 chairman of the American Indian language preservation committee shall provide a report to the 29 legislative council regarding the work of the committee, together with any recommendations for 30 ongoing preservation efforts.
