The report, which must be presented at the time and in the manner directed by the legislative council, must address how the money was expended, including the number of mills by which the district was able to decrease its property taxes, if such was a permitted use.~~

~~(Effective after June 30, 2011)~~ **Payments to school districts - Unobligated general fund balance.**

1. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine the amount of payments due a school district and shall subtract from that the amount by which the unobligated general fund balance of the district on the preceding June thirtieth is in excess of ~~fifty percent of its actual expenditures, plus twenty thousand dollars.~~ Beginning July 1, 2008, the superintendent of public instruction shall determine the amount of payments due a school district and shall subtract from that the amount by which the unobligated general fund balance of the district on the preceding June thirtieth is in excess of forty-five percent of its actual expenditures, plus twenty thousand dollars.

2. In making the determination required by subsection 1, the superintendent of public instruction may not include in a district's unobligated general fund balance any moneys that were received by the district from the federal education jobs fund program.

**SECTION 23. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-37-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

**15.1-37-01. Early childhood education program - Approval.**

1. Any person or school district operating an early childhood education program may request approval of the program from the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent shall approve an early childhood education program if the program:

1.a. Is taught by individuals who are licensed to teach in early childhood education by the education standards and practices board;

2.b. Follows a developmentally appropriate curriculum; ~~and~~

3.c. Is in compliance with all municipal and state health, fire, and safety requirements;

and

1 d. Limits its enrollment to children who have reached the age of four before August  
2 first of the year of enrollment.

3 2. Per student funding will not be provided to individuals or school districts offering a  
4 ~~prekindergarten~~ early childhood education program.

5 **SECTION 24. ISOLATED SCHOOLS - TRANSITION PAYMENTS.**

- 6 1. If during the 2010-11 school year a school district received payments as a result of  
7 section 15.1-27-15, as the section existed on June 30, 2011, and if that district is not  
8 eligible for the factor established under subdivision j of subsection 1 of section  
9 15.1-27-03.1, the district is entitled to the following transition payments:
- 10 a. For the 2011-12 school year, an amount equal to that which the district would  
11 have received under section 15.1-27-15, as the section existed on June 30, 2011;
- 12 b. For the 2012-13 school year, an amount equal to seventy-five percent of that  
13 which the district would have received under section 15.1-27-15, as the section  
14 existed on June 30, 2011;
- 15 c. For the 2013-14 school year, an amount equal to fifty percent of that which the  
16 district would have received under section 15.1-27-15, as the section existed on  
17 June 30, 2011; and
- 18 d. For the 2014-15 school year, an amount equal to twenty-five percent of that  
19 which the district would have received under section 15.1-27-15, as the section  
20 existed on June 30, 2011.
- 21 2. Upon the closure of a school that met the definition of isolated under section  
22 15.1-27-15, as it existed on June 30, 2011, the superintendent of public instruction  
23 shall cease to provide to the district the transition payments established under  
24 subsection 1.

25 **SECTION 25. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.**

- 26 1. During each year of the 2011-13 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction  
27 shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state  
28 transportation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent  
29 shall provide reimbursement at the rate of:
- 30 a. One dollar and three cents per mile for schoolbuses having a capacity of ten or  
31 more passengers;



- 1           b. Forty-six cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer
- 2           passengers;
- 3           c. Forty-six cents per mile, one way, provided:
- 4           (1) The student being transported resides more than two miles from the public
- 5           school that the student attends;
- 6           (2) The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;
- 7           (3) The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;
- 8           and
- 9           (4) The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents; and
- 10          d. Twenty-six cents per student for each one-way trip.
- 11          2. The superintendent of public instruction shall use the latest available student
- 12          enrollment count in each school district in applying the provisions of subsection 1.
- 13          3. If any moneys provided for transportation payments in the grants transportation line
- 14          item in the appropriation bill for the superintendent of public instruction, as approved
- 15          by the sixty-second legislative assembly, remain after application of the formula
- 16          provided for in this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall prorate the
- 17          remaining amounts according to the percentage of the total transportation formula
- 18          amount to which each school district is entitled.
- 19          4. This section does not authorize the reimbursement of any costs incurred in providing
- 20          transportation for student attendance at extracurricular activities or events.

21           **SECTION 26. FEDERAL EDUCATION JOBS FUND PROGRAM GRANTS - ALLOWABLE**  
22           **USES.**

- 23          1. Federal education jobs fund program grants distributed to school districts may be used
- 24          only for:
- 25          a. The improvement, renovation, repair, or modernization of school buildings and
- 26          facilities, including deferred maintenance; weatherization; heating, ventilation,
- 27          and cooling projects; asbestos removal and abatement; security improvements;
- 28          and laboratory improvements provided that the projects meet the approval
- 29          requirements of section 15.1-36-01;
- 30          b. Building additions, provided the additions do not exceed twenty-five percent of
- 31          the square footage of the building to which they are to be attached and further

- 1 provided that the additions meet the approval requirements of section
- 2 15.1-36-01;
- 3 c. Equipment, including technological equipment, career and technical education
- 4 equipment, vehicles for instructional purposes, and vehicles for student
- 5 transportation;
- 6 d. Textbooks, instructional materials, and library media materials;
- 7 e. Title I expenditures; and
- 8 f. Professional development for teachers and administrators.
- 9 2. Each school district expending federal education jobs fund program grants shall file a
- 10 report with the superintendent of public instruction, at the time and in the manner
- 11 directed by the superintendent. The report must include a description of all
- 12 expenditures, obligations, or other commitments made as a result of receiving a
- 13 federal education jobs fund program grant. The superintendent shall compile the
- 14 information and present it to the legislative council.

15 **SECTION 27. USE OF NEW MONEY - TEACHER COMPENSATION INCREASES -**  
16 **REPORTS TO THE LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.**

- 17 1. During the 2011-13 biennium, the board of each school district shall use an amount
- 18 equal to at least seventy percent of all new money received by the district for per
- 19 student payments to increase the compensation paid to teachers and to provide
- 20 compensation to teachers who begin employment with the district on or after July 1,
- 21 2011.
- 22 2. For purposes of this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall calculate the
- 23 amount of new money received by a district during the 2011-13 biennium by:
- 24 a. Determining the total amount of state dollars received by each district during the
- 25 2009-11 biennium as per student payments, provided that equity payments,
- 26 transportation payments, contingency distributions, mill levy reduction payments,
- 27 and technology support payments are not to be included in the total;
- 28 b. Determining the total amount of state dollars received by each district during the
- 29 2011-13 biennium as per student payments, provided that the following are not to
- 30 be included in the total:
- 31 (1) Contingent distributions;

- 1 (2) Cross-border attendance moneys;
- 2 (3) Deferred maintenance and physical plant improvements grants;
- 3 (4) Equity payments;
- 4 (5) Federal education jobs funds program moneys;
- 5 (6) Home-based education program monitoring moneys;
- 6 (7) Mill levy reduction payments;
- 7 (8) PowerSchool acquisition, implementation, and utilization moneys;
- 8 (9) Regional education association moneys and grants; and
- 9 (10) Transportation payments; and

10 c. Subtracting the amount arrived at under subdivision a from the amount arrived at  
11 under subdivision b.

12 3. School districts providing educational services under a cooperative agreement  
13 approved by the superintendent of public instruction must, for purposes of this section,  
14 be treated as a single district.

15 4. a. This section does not apply to a school district if the board of the school district,  
16 after a public hearing at which public testimony and documentary evidence are  
17 accepted, determines in its discretion and by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of  
18 the members of the board that complying with subsection 1 would place the  
19 school district in the position of having insufficient fiscal resources to meet the  
20 school district's other obligations.

21 b. Within ten days of the vote required by subdivision a, the school board shall  
22 notify the superintendent of public instruction of its action and shall file a report  
23 detailing the grounds for its determination and action.

24 c. The superintendent of public instruction shall report all notices received under  
25 this subsection to the legislative management.

26 **SECTION 28. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS.** During the 2011-13  
27 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall expend up to \$800,000 from the grants -  
28 state school aid line item in the appropriation bill for the superintendent of public instruction, as  
29 approved by the sixty-second legislative assembly, for the purpose of providing an annual grant  
30 to each eligible regional education association in order to assist each association with the cost  
31 of compensating a coordinator.

- 1       1. In order to receive a grant under this section, each regional education association  
2           must:
  - 3           a. Enter a contract with an individual to serve as a coordinator, on a full-time or a  
4               part-time basis, for a duration of at least twelve months; and
  - 5           b. Provide from other revenue sources at least thirty percent of the total  
6               compensation payable to the coordinator.
- 7       2. The maximum grant payable to a regional education association under this section  
8           during each year of the biennium is the lesser of \$50,000 or seventy percent of the  
9           total compensation payable to the coordinator.

10       **SECTION 29. APPROPRIATION.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general  
11 fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$150,000, or so much of the  
12 sum as may be necessary, to the department of commerce for the purpose of providing grants  
13 in the amount of \$1,200 on behalf of individuals seeking a child development associate  
14 credential, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013.

15       **SECTION 30. APPROPRIATION.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general  
16 fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$460,000, or so much of the  
17 sum as may be necessary, to the superintendent of public instruction for the purpose of  
18 providing payments to eligible school districts that offer alternative education programs to  
19 students in grades six through eight, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending  
20 June 30, 2013. In order to determine the payment per student, the superintendent of public  
21 instruction shall multiply the number of full-time equivalent students in grades six through eight  
22 who are enrolled during the 2012-13 school year in an average of at least fifteen hours per  
23 week of alternative education programming by a weighting factor that may not exceed 0.20.

24       **SECTION 31. APPROPRIATION - SCHOOL DISTRICT DEFERRED MAINTENANCE AND**  
25 **PHYSICAL PLANT IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.**

- 26       1. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not  
27           otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$7,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be  
28           necessary, to the superintendent of public instruction for the purpose of awarding to  
29           eligible school districts deferred maintenance and physical plant improvement grants,  
30           in accordance with the provisions of this section, for the biennium beginning July 1,  
31           2011, and ending June 30, 2013.

- 1       2. If the office of management and budget determines by April 30, 2012, that the  
2       June 30, 2012, ending balance of the state general fund will be more than  
3       \$30,000,000 in excess of the amount predicted by the office of management and  
4       budget at the conclusion of the 2011 legislative session, the superintendent of public  
5       instruction shall forward to each eligible school district:
  - 6       a. Ten thousand dollars; plus
  - 7       b. The school district's pro rata share of the remaining appropriation, calculated by  
8       using the latest available average daily membership of each school district.
- 9       3. If the general fund balance requirements of subsection 2 are not met and if the office  
10      of management and budget determines by April 30, 2013, that the June 30, 2013,  
11      ending balance of the state general fund will be more than \$30,000,000 in excess of  
12      the amount predicted by the office of management and budget at the conclusion of the  
13      2011 legislative session, the superintendent of public instruction shall forward to each  
14      eligible school district:
  - 15     a. Ten thousand dollars; plus
  - 16     b. The school district's pro rata share of the remaining appropriation, calculated by  
17     using the latest available average daily membership of each school district.
- 18     4. Each school district accepting funds under this section shall apply those funds toward  
19     deferred maintenance and physical plant improvements and shall, by June 30, 2014:
  - 20     a. Submit to the superintendent of public instruction documentation indicating the  
21     appropriate expenditure of the funds; or
  - 22     b. Return the funds to the superintendent of public instruction for deposit in the  
23     general fund.
- 24     5. For purposes of this section, an "eligible school district" is a school district that:
  - 25     a. Has a general fund levy equal to at least one hundred fifty mills, before any  
26     reduction for property tax allocations under chapter 57-64;
  - 27     b. Is not precluded from receiving state aid by the provisions of section  
28     15.1-27-35.3; and
  - 29     c. Provides an equal monetary match for any amount received under this section.

30       **SECTION 32. CONTINGENT MONEY.** If any money appropriated to the superintendent of  
31      public instruction for state aid payments to school districts remains after the superintendent

1 complies with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the biennium beginning July 1,  
2 2011, and ending June 30, 2013, the superintendent shall use the remaining moneys to provide  
3 additional per student payments on a prorated basis according to the latest available average  
4 daily membership of each school district.

5 **SECTION 33. CONTINGENT TRANSFER BY BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA FOR SPECIAL**  
6 **EDUCATION.** If during the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013, the  
7 superintendent of public instruction determines that, using all available sources, there are  
8 insufficient funds with which to fully reimburse school districts for the excess costs of serving the  
9 one percent of special education students statewide who require the greatest school district  
10 expenditures in order to be provided with special education and related services, the industrial  
11 commission shall transfer from the earnings and accumulated and undivided profits of the Bank  
12 of North Dakota the amount the superintendent of public instruction certifies is necessary to  
13 provide the statutorily required level of reimbursement. The superintendent of public instruction  
14 shall file for introduction legislation requesting that the sixty-third legislative assembly return any  
15 amount transferred under this section to the Bank of North Dakota.

16 **SECTION 34. ALL-DAY KINDERGARTEN - IMPACT REPORT.** Before December 31,  
17 2011, and December 31, 2012, each school district that provided full-day kindergarten during  
18 the previous school year shall file a report with the superintendent of public instruction indicating  
19 the nature and extent of any measurable academic growth experienced by the students who  
20 were enrolled in the program.

21 **SECTION 35. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - TEACHER COMPENSATION**  
22 **REFORM.** During the 2011-12 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying ways  
23 to reform the manner in which teacher compensation is determined, with a view to recruiting,  
24 developing, and retaining a high-quality teaching workforce capable of significantly improving  
25 student performance. The legislative management shall report its findings and  
26 recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to  
27 the sixty-third legislative assembly.

28 **SECTION 36. REPEAL.** Section 15.1-27-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.

29 **SECTION 37. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 18 of this Act becomes effective on July 1, 2013.
