1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 12-44.1 and two new sections to
 2 chapter 50-24.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to inmate medical care costs,
 3 inmate medical claims processing, and medicaid coverage to inmates in certain situations; ~~and~~
 4 to amend and reenact subsection 4 of section 12-44.1-01 and sections 12-44.1-12.1 and
 5 12-44.1-14 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to adequate medical care and payment
 6 of medical costs of inmates: to provide an appropriation; and to provide an effective date.

7 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

8 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 4 of section 12-44.1-01 of the North Dakota
 9 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

10 4. "Inmate" means any person, whether sentenced or unsentenced, who is detained or
 11 confined in a correctional facility. The term does not include an individual who is under
 12 the supervision of the correctional facility and is supervised under home detention,
 13 electronic monitoring, or a similar program that does not involve physical detention or
 14 confinement in the facility.

15 **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Section 12-44.1-12.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 16 amended and reenacted as follows:

17 **12-44.1-12.1. Establishment of inmate accounts - Withholding funds for inmate**
 18 **financial obligations - Health care costs - Payment of funds to inmate upon release.**

19 1. The correctional facility administrator shall establish an inmate account for each
 20 inmate.
 21 2. The correctional facility administrator may withdraw funds from an inmate's account to
 22 meet the inmate's legitimate financial obligations, including child support and
 23 restitution. ~~The correctional facility administrator may withdraw funds from the inmate's~~
 24 ~~account to pay~~ and for the inmate's medical, dental, and eye care costs while the

1 inmate is incarcerated in the correctional facility, and establish an administrative
2 procedure for an inmate to appeal the withdrawal of the funds. Before the funds may
3 be withdrawn, the inmate must first receive written notice and be provided a hearing
4 with the right to correctional facility staff assistance and the right to review by the
5 correctional facility administrator. No written notice or hearing is required if the
6 withdrawal of funds is being made to meet the inmate's child support obligation.

7 3. A correctional facility administrator may collect fees from inmates to offset health care
8 costs as follows:

- 9 a. For a medical visit, up to ten dollars per medical visit made at the request of an
10 inmate.
- 11 b. For self-inflicted injuries, the total amount of medical costs incurred.
- 12 c. For necessary health care services, the correctional facility may seek
13 reimbursement from the inmate up to the total amount of health care costs
14 incurred. If the inmate has health insurance coverage, a medical or health care
15 provider must file a claim for reimbursement from the health insurance coverage
16 carrier. A correctional facility may not assess an inmate for any costs associated
17 with an intake health care assessment and related testing or for an examination
18 of an inmate made at the request of the facility.
- 19 d. For elective health care requested by an inmate and as allowed by correctional
20 facility policy, the inmate is responsible for the amount of the costs incurred.
- 21 e. A correctional facility may not deny necessary and non-elective medical and
22 health care to an inmate who does not have health insurance or does not have
23 the ability to pay the costs of the medical or health care.

24 4.2. The correctional facility administrator shall pay an inmate all funds in the inmate's
25 account when the inmate is discharged from the correctional facility or when the
26 inmate is transferred to another correctional facility, less the inmate's outstanding
27 obligations to the correctional facility.

28 5.3. This section does not limit or alter the provisions of chapter 14-09 relating to income
29 withholding orders for child support.

30 **SECTION 3.** A new section to chapter 12-44.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
31 and enacted as follows:

1 **Inmate medical care costs.**

2 An inmate is financially responsible for the costs of medical or health care, except for an
3 intake health care assessment and related testing for an examination of the inmate made at the
4 request of the facility. The correctional facility may seek reimbursement from the inmate up to
5 the total amount of incurred medical or health care costs. If the inmate has health insurance
6 coverage, a medical or health care provider shall file a claim for reimbursement from the health
7 insurance provider. If the inmate does not have health insurance coverage and the inmate's
8 medical or health care costs are the responsibility of the correctional facility, the correctional
9 facility's responsibility may not exceed the rates paid under the federal medicare program. If
10 elective medical or health care is allowed by a correctional facility policy, the inmate must
11 arrange payment for elective medical or health care before receiving care.

12 **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Section 12-44.1-14 of the North Dakota Century Code is
13 amended and reenacted as follows:

14 **12-44.1-14. Inmate rights.**

15 Subject to reasonable safety, security, discipline, and correctional facility administration
16 requirements, the administrator of each correctional facility shall:

- 17 1. Ensure inmates have confidential access to attorneys and their authorized
18 representatives.
- 19 2. Ensure that inmates are not subjected to discrimination based on race, national origin,
20 color, creed, sex, economic status, or political belief.
- 21 3. Ensure equal access by male and female inmates to programs and services available
22 through the correctional facility.
- 23 4. Ensure access to mail, telephone use, and visitors.
- 24 5. Ensure that inmates are properly fed, clothed, and housed.
- 25 6. Ensure that inmates have adequate medical care. Adequate medical care means
26 necessary treatment for a medical or health condition for which serious pain or
27 hardship would occur if care is not given. A correctional facility may not deny adequate
28 medical care to an inmate who does not have health insurance or does not have the
29 ability to pay the costs of the medical or health care.
- 30 7. Ensure that inmates may reasonably exercise their religious beliefs.

1 **SECTION 5.** Two new sections to chapter 50-24.1 of the North Dakota Century Code are
2 created and enacted as follows:

3 **Processing of claims submitted on behalf of inmates.**

4 The department of human services shall process claims submitted by enrolled medical
5 providers on behalf of inmates at county jails. Each county shall pay the department a
6 processing fee for each claim submission. The department shall establish a processing fee that
7 may not exceed thirty dollars and shall update the fee annually on July first. The processing fee
8 must be based on the annual costs to the department of the claims processing operations
9 divided by the annual volume of claims submitted. The department shall invoice each county for
10 payment of the processing fee. Beginning July 1, 2011, the department of human services shall
11 increase the claims processing fee to recover the cost of the medicaid claims system changes.
12 The department shall deposit the portion of the fee associated with recovering the costs of the
13 medicaid claims system changes in the general fund.

14 **Department to expand medicaid coverage.**

15 After implementation of the medicaid management information system, the department of
16 human services shall expand medicaid coverage to include medicaid-covered services provided
17 to an inmate of the state penitentiary or a county jail who would be eligible for medicaid if the
18 inmate were not incarcerated and who is admitted to an inpatient hospital setting.

19 **SECTION 6. APPROPRIATION.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general
20 fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$149,094, or so much of the
21 sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of modifying
22 the department's medicaid claims system to process claims submitted by enrolled medicaid
23 providers on behalf of inmates of county jails under section 5 of this Act, for the biennium
24 beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013.

25 **SECTION 7. APPROPRIATION.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general
26 fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$36,162, or so much of the
27 sum as may be necessary, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income,
28 the sum of \$36,162, to the department of human services for the purpose of modifying the
29 department's eligibility systems to process inpatient hospital claims for inmates of the state
30 penitentiary and county jails under section 5 of this Act, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011,
31 and ending June 30, 2013.

1 **SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 5 of this Act becomes effective upon the
2 completion of the necessary changes to the department of human services' medicaid claims
3 processing and eligibility systems.
