- A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the state industrial commission and the agencies under the management of the industrial commission; to create and enact a new section to chapter 15-02 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the authority of the board of university and school lands; to provide legislative intent; to provide for a legislative management study; to provide an appropriation; to provide a contingent
- appropriation; to authorize transfers; to provide for budget section approval; and to declare an
 emergency.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the state industrial commission and agencies under its control for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state industrial commission and agencies under its control, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013, as follows:

19	SECTION 3. A new section to chapter 15-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
20	and enacted as follows:		
21	Authority to accept Lake Sakakawea lands.		
22	If, through federal legislation, the United States ar	rmy corps of e	ngineers returns excess
23	lands around Lake Sakakawea above an elevation of one thousand eight hundred fifty-four feet		
24	[565.098 meters] mean sea level and excess lands around Lake Oahe about one thousand six		
25	hundred twenty feet [493.766 meters] mean sea level, the board of university and school lands		
26	may accept the land on behalf of the state of North Dakota.		
27	SECTION 4. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - BOND PAYMENTS. The amount of \$25,389,733		
28	included in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in the grants - bond payments line item must be		
29	paid from the following funding sources during the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending		
30	June 30, 2013:

15	SECTION 5. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - LAND PURCHASE. It is the inten	t of the	
16	sixty-second legislative assembly that to the best of its ability the Bank of North Dakota ensure		
17	that properties adjacent to Bank of North Dakota property northwest of west street are		
18	developed for uses that are consistent with the mission and purpose of the Bank of North		
19	Dakota.		
20	SECTION 6. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY. During the 2011-1	2 interim, the	
21	legislative management shall consider studying primacy in the administration of federal		
22	environmental protection agency regulations.		
23	SECTION 7. APPROPRIATION. In addition to the amount appropriated	to the housing	
24	finance agency in subdivision 5 of section 1 of this Act, there is appropriated any additional		
25	income or unanticipated income from federal or other funds which may become available to the		
26	agency for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013.		
27	SECTION 8. APPROPRIATION - EMERGENCY COMMISSION APPRO	VAL. In addition to	
28	the amount appropriated to the state industrial commission in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this		
29	Act, there is appropriated, with the approval of the emergency commission, funds that may		
30	become available to the commission from bonds authorized by law to be issued	ued by the state	
31	industrial commission for the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending Iuly 1, 2011, and endi	une 30, 2013.	

1 SECTION 9. CONTINGENT DEPARTMENT OF MINERAL RESOURCES FUNDING -2 PERMANENT OIL TAX TRUST FUND - EMERGENCY COMMISSION APPROVAL. Of the 3 funds appropriated in the mineral resources contingency line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 4 of this Act, \$743,972 is from the permanent oil tax trust fund. If funds are required due to the 5 drilling rig count exceeding one hundred eighty for at least thirty consecutive days, the oil and 6 gas division may spend up to \$192,393 of these funds and hire one full-time equivalent position, 7 upon emergency commission approval, and further if funds are required due to the drilling rig 8 count exceeding one hundred ninety for at least thirty consecutive days, the oil and gas division 9 may spend up to an additional \$192,393 of these funds and hire one full-time equivalent 10 position, upon emergency commission approval. If funds are required due to the total number of 11 oil wells in the state exceeding nine thousand three hundred, the oil and gas division may spend 12 up to \$359,186 and hire two full-time equivalent positions, upon emergency commission 13 approval. 14 **SECTION 10. TRANSFER.** The sum of \$488,211, or so much of the sum as may be 15 necessary, included in the special funds appropriation line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of 16 this Act, may be transferred from the entities within the control of the state industrial commission 17 to the industrial commission fund for administrative services rendered by the commission. 18 Transfers shall be made during the biennium beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013, 19 upon order of the commission. Transfers from the student loan trust must be made to the extent 20 permitted by sections 54-17-24 and 54-17-25. 21 SECTION 11. APPROPRIATION - TRANSFER. The funds appropriated in subdivision 3 of 22 section 1 of this Act must be transferred by the Bank of North Dakota to the partnership in 23 assisting community expansion fund; the agriculture partnership in assisting community 24 expansion fund; the beginning farmer revolving loan fund; and the biofuels partnership in 25 assisting community expansion fund. The Bank of North Dakota may not be construed to be a 26 general fund agency because of the appropriation made by subsection 3 of section 1 of this Act. 27 SECTION 12. LIGNITE RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT, AND MARKETING PROGRAM -28 **APPROPRIATION - LIGNITE MARKETING FEASIBILITY STUDY.** The amount of \$1,500,000, 29 or so much of the amount as may be necessary, included in the grants and special funds 30 appropriation line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is appropriated from the lignite 31 research fund for the purpose of contracting for an independent, nonmatching lignite marketing

- 1 feasibility study or studies that determine those focused priority areas where near-term,
- 2 market-driven projects, activities, or processes will generate matching private industry
- 3 investment and have the most potential of preserving existing lignite production and industry
- 4 jobs or that will lead to increased development of lignite and its products and create new lignite
- 5 industry jobs and economic growth for the general welfare of this state. Moneys appropriated
- 6 pursuant to this section may also be used for the purpose of contracting for nonmatching
- 7 studies and activities in support of the lignite vision 21 program; for litigation that may be
- 8 necessary to protect and promote the continued development of lignite resources; for
- 9 nonmatching externality studies and activities in externality proceedings; or other marketing,
- 10 environmental, or transmission activities that assist with marketing of lignite-based electricity
- and lignite-based byproducts. Moneys not needed for the purposes stated in this section are
- 12 available to the commission for funding projects, processes, or activities under the lignite
- 13 research, development, and marketing program.
- 14 SECTION 13. TRANSFER TO OIL AND GAS RESEARCH FUND FROM PERMANENT
- 15 OIL TAX TRUST FUND GRANTS BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL. During the biennium
- beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2013, the director of the office of management and
- 17 budget shall transfer \$4,000,000 from the permanent oil tax trust fund to the oil and gas
- 18 research fund for the oil and gas research program. The moneys may be transferred only if the
- industrial commission has awarded grants totaling \$4,000,000 from the oil and gas research
- 20 fund during the 2011-13 biennium and upon approval by the industrial commission and budget
- 21 section.
- 22 SECTION 14. CARBON DIOXIDE STORAGE FACILITY ADMINISTRATIVE FUND USE
- 23 **OF FUNDING.** The carbon dioxide storage facility administrative fund line item in subdivision 1
- of section 1 of this Act includes \$532,000 from the general fund that the industrial commission
- 25 may deposit in its carbon dioxide storage facility administrative fund for the purpose of hiring
- one full-time equivalent position for up to three years until fee income is sufficient to provide
- 27 funding for the administration of the provisions of chapter 38-22. The industrial commission shall
- 28 use this funding to provide a timely response to the environmental protection agency's rules
- 29 relating to carbon dioxide sequestration and develop a coordinated response from state
- 30 agencies with the goal of the state of North Dakota having class VI primacy for carbon dioxide
- 31 storage in North Dakota.

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- 1 SECTION 15. EMERGENCY. Section 14 and the related funding included in subdivision 1
- 2 of section 1 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.
