- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide for a legislative management study studies of oil and gas and
- 2 abandoned gravel pit reclamation practices and standards.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - RECLAMATION PRACTICES.

During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall study oil and gas and consider studying abandoned gravel pit reclamation practices. The study must may include the consideration of feasibility and desirability of utilizing state funds for the reclamation of oil and gas development impacted areas and abandoned gravel pits, natural erosion events, and financially difficult reclamation projects on state and county lands for the purpose of restoring land for farming, ranching, or clean water initiatives other economic enterprises. The study shall may emphasize consideration of the potential economic benefit of restored or repurposed land. The study shall may include consideration of current reclamation practices and standards for all North Dakota industries; use of the North Dakota outdoor heritage fund or other funds for financing; and input from departments, organizations, and associations with interest in reclamation practices. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - RECLAMATION STANDARDS.

During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying whether reclamation standards related to oil and gas development can be improved to ensure the successful reclamation of agricultural lands in this state, and to ensure that productivity of these agricultural lands following reclamation is as near as possible to the land's productivity before being used for oil and gas production. The study may include the consideration of whether performance standards found in North Dakota Administrative Code chapter 69-05.2 and used

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by the North Dakota public service commission for reclamation of surface coal-mined lands should be utilized by the North Dakota industrial commission for reclamation of lands used for oil and gas development. The study may examine whether additional and more detailed reclamation standards should be included in state law and administrative rule, what standards should be included, and in what manner such standards should be included. The study may consider input from representatives from the department of mineral resources, the school of natural resource sciences' department of soil science at North Dakota state university, the department of trust lands, the public service commission, the state department of health, landowner groups, and professional soil classifiers regulated by the state board of registration for professional soil classifiers. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.
