A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision

3 services - school for the blind; to create and enact a new section to chapter 25-06 and a new

4 section to chapter 25-07 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the school for the blind

5 fund and the school for the deaf fund; to repeal section 6-09-45 of the North Dakota Century

6 Code and section 13 of chapter 49 of the 2015 Session Laws, relating to a required transfer

7 from the Bank of North Dakota and a contingent appropriation; to provide exemptions; to

8 provide for a transfer; to provide for a legislative management study; and to declare an

9 <u>emergency</u>.

## 10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

**SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of public instruction, the school for the deaf, North Dakota vision services - school for the blind, and the state library for the purpose of defraying the expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019, as follows:

1	The 2017-19 one-time funding amounts are not a part of the entity's base budget for the
2	2019-21 biennium. The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North Dakota
3	vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the
4	sixty-sixth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning
5	July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019.
6	SECTION 4. TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND TO STATE TUITION FUND.
7	During the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019, the office of
8	management and budget shall transfer \$4,282,905 from the public instruction fund to the state
9	tuition fund for the purpose of providing funding for integrated formula payments.
10	SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT. The sum of
11	\$219,134,000 \$305,546,905, included in the integrated formula payments line item in
12	subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any
13	additional amount in the state tuition fund that becomes available for distribution to public
14	schools is appropriated to the department of public instruction for that purpose for the biennium
15	beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019.
16	SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The
17	estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes \$270,000,000 from
18	the foundation aid stabilization fund for integrated formula payments. Of the total provided,
19	\$160,000,000 is considered to be one-time funding.
20	SECTION 7. FUNDING TRANSFER - EXEMPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding
21	section 54-16-04, the superintendent of public instruction may transfer up to \$1,200,000 from
22	the integrated formula payments line item to the grants - special education line item and up to
23	\$108,000 from the integrated formula payments line item to the grants - transportation line item,
24	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The superintendent of
25	public instruction shall notify the office of management and budget of any transfer made
26	pursuant to this section.
27	SECTION 8. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION
28	CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY. The superintendent of public instruction may
29	expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education
30	contracts-line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in payment of grants for educational
31	services that were due in the 2015-17 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly

1 If any of the amount appropriated for this purpose remains after the superintendent of 2. 2 public instruction has awarded grants to all eligible recipients, the superintendent shall 3 distribute that amount as an additional per student payment on a prorated basis, 4 according to the latest available average daily membership of each school district. 5 SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION. Notwithstanding section 6 54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its 7 operating account. 8 SECTION 14. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The line item entitled grants in 9 subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$2,033,000\$1,737,528 for aid to public libraries, of 10 which no more than one-half is to may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. 11 SECTION 15. FEES DEPOSITED IN NORTH DAKOTA VISION SERVICES - SCHOOL 12 FOR THE BLIND OPERATING FUND. Any moneys included in the estimated income line item 13 in subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act, collected for subscription fees or braille fees, must be 14 deposited in the North Dakota vision services - school for the blind operating fund in the state 15 treasury and may be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly. 16 SECTION 16. SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION INTERPRETER GRANT 17 **PROGRAM.** The grants line item contained in subdivision 3 of section 1 of this Act is for the 18 purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher 19 education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or 20 hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019. Moneys 21 appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Funds must be distributed 22 pursuant to the provisions of this section: 23 The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for 1. 24 which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on an uniform hourly 25 reimbursement. 26 To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the 2. 27 deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the 28 amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf 29 or hard of hearing. 30 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount 31 appropriated during the first year of the biennium.

1 If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the 4. 2 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the 3 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level. 4 5. At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education, 5 the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding 6 the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs. 7 SECTION 17. OTHER GRANTS - REPORTING. The superintendent of public instruction 8 shall continue reporting on the cost per participant and the outcomes of other grants and report 9 to the sixty-sixth legislative assembly regarding participation, cost, and outcomes of these 10 grants. 11 SECTION 17. PASSTHROUGH GRANTS - APPLICATION - DISTRIBUTION -12 **REPORTING.** The line item entitled grants - passthrough grants included in subdivision 1 of 13 section 1 of this Act includes \$2,378,000 for passthrough grants. The superintendent of public 14 instruction shall determine the manner in which each passthrough grant is distributed. 15 Grantees, as a condition of receiving the grant, must establish performance measures to be 16 reviewed by the superintendent of public instruction. Grantees shall report to the superintendent 17 of public instruction regarding performance based on the measures before October 1, 2018. 18 The superintendent of public instruction shall report to the appropriations committees of the 19 sixty-sixth legislative assembly regarding funds granted, performance measures established for 20 each grantee, and whether grantees met performance expectations. 21 SECTION 18. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS. 22 During the 2017-18 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the feasibility 23 and desirability of combining services for any or all English language learner programs, 24 distance learning programs, regional education agencies, teacher center networks, adult 25 learning centers, career and technical education programs, education technology services, 26 continuing education for counselors, the North Dakota leadership and educational 27 administration development center, and the teacher mentoring program. The legislative 28 management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation 29 necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-sixth legislative assembly. 30 **SECTION 19.** A new section to chapter 25-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 31 and enacted as follows:

9	The school for the deaf fund is a special fund in the state treasury. All moneys received
10	pursuant to section 2 of article IX of the Constitution of North Dakota and all revenues received
11	from the lease of buildings and the provision of meals and services, including interpreter
12	services, must be deposited in the fund. Moneys in the fund are to be used pursuant to
13	legislative appropriation for provision of services under this chapter.
14	SECTION 21. REPEAL. Section 6-09-45 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.
15	SECTION 22. REPEAL. Section 13 of chapter 49 of the 2015 Session Laws is repealed.
16	SECTION 23. EMERGENCY. Sections 7 and 22 of this Act are declared to be emergency
17	measures.
