1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of 2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision 3 services - school for the blind; to create and enact a new section to chapter 25-06 and a new 4 section to chapter 25-07 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the school for the blind 5 fund and the school for the deaf fund; to repeal section 6-09-45 of the North Dakota Century 6 Code and section 13 of chapter 49 of the 2015 Session Laws, relating to a required transfer 7 from the Bank of North Dakota and a contingent appropriation; to provide exemptions; to 8 provide for a transfer; to provide a statement of legislative intent; to provide for a legislative 9 management study; and to declare an emergency.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of public instruction, the school for the deaf, North Dakota vision services - school for the blind, and the state library for the purpose of defraying the expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019, as follows:

27 The 2017-19 one-time funding amounts are not a part of the entity's base budget for the

28 2019-21 biennium. The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North Dakota

29 vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the

30 sixty-sixth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning

31 July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019.

1	SECTION 4. TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND TO STATE TUITION FUND.
2	During the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019, the office of
3	management and budget shall transfer \$4,282,905 from the public instruction fund to the state
4	tuition fund for the purpose of providing funding for integrated formula payments.
5	SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT. The sum of \$305,546,905,
6	included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is
7	from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund
8	that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of
9	public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30,
10	2019.
11	SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The
12	estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes
13	\$270,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund. Of this amount, \$100,000
14	is for regional education association merger grants and \$295,000,000 is for integrated formula
15	payments. Of the total provided, <u>\$160,000,000</u> \$185,100,000 is considered to be one-time
16	funding.
17	SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - ONE-TIME FUNDING - STUDENT LOAN TRUST
18	FUND. The estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes
19	\$220,000 from the student loan trust fund for the purpose of providing a one-time grant for
20	North Dakota governor's school science, technology, engineering, and mathematics programs.
21	SECTION 8. FUNDING TRANSFER - EXEMPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding
22	section 54-16-04, the superintendent of public instruction may transfer up to \$1,200,000 from
23	the integrated formula payments line item to the grants - special education line item and up to
24	\$108,000 from the integrated formula payments line item to the grants - transportation line item,
25	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The superintendent of
26	public instruction shall notify the office of management and budget of any transfer made
27	pursuant to this section.
28	SECTION 9. EXEMPTION - ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM FUNDING. The
29	unexpended amount remaining from the transfer of \$1,252,627 from the 2013-15 biennium, as
30	authorized in section 32 of chapter 137 of the 2015 Session Laws to enhance the delivery of
31	and the participation of students and teachers in advanced placement courses during the

1	2015-17 biennium, is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11 at the end of the						
2	2015-17 biennium and may be continued into the 2017-19 biennium for the purpose of program						
3	grants, including leveraging the senior year, leadership program, continuing education grants,						
4	preschoo	ol continuing education grants, curriculum alignment grants, and teacher and principal					
5	evaluatio	on system grants.					
6	SEC	TION 10. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION					
7	CONTR	ACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY. The superintendent of public instruction may					
8	expend	funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education line					
9	items in	subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in payment of grants for educational services that					
10	were due	e in the 2015-17 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly supported by

1	SECTION 16. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION. The
2	integrated formula payments line item included in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes
3	\$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education
4	associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019. An annual
5	grant of \$31,250 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,
6	2017. Regional education associations that merge during the 2017-19 biennium are entitled to
7	the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.
8	SECTION 17. EXEMPTION - INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION. Notwithstanding section
9	54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its
10	operating account.
11	SECTION 18. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The line item entitled grants in
12	subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,528 for aid to public libraries, of which no
13	more than one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018.
14	SECTION 19. FEES DEPOSITED IN NORTH DAKOTA VISION SERVICES - SCHOOL
15	FOR THE BLIND OPERATING FUND. Any moneys included in the estimated income line item
16	in subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act, collected for subscription fees or braille fees, must be
17	deposited in the North Dakota vision services - school for the blind operating fund in the state
18	treasury and may be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.
19	SECTION 20. SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION INTERPRETER GRANT
20	PROGRAM. The grants line item contained in subdivision 3 of section 1 of this Act is for the
21	purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher
22	education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or
23	hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019. Moneys
24	appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Funds must be distributed
25	pursuant to the provisions of this section:
26	1. The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for
27	which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on an uniform hourly
28	reimbursement.
29	2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the
30	deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the

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1	amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf
2	or hard of hearing.

- 3 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount
 appropriated during the first year of the biennium.
- 5 4. If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the
 6 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the
 7 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.
- 8 5. At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education,
 9 the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding
 10 the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.

11 SECTION 21. PASSTHROUGH GRANTS - APPLICATION - DISTRIBUTION -

12 **REPORTING.** The line item entitled grants - passthrough grants included in subdivision 1 of 13 section 1 of this Act includes \$2,378,000\$2,100,000 for passthrough grants for writing projects. 14 an entrepreneur program, and a mentoring program. The superintendent of public instruction 15 shall determine the manner in which each passthrough grant is distributed. Grantees, as a 16 condition of receiving the grant, must establish performance measures to be reviewed by the 17 superintendent of public instruction. Grantees shall report to the superintendent of public 18 instruction regarding performance based on the measures before October 1, 2018. The 19 superintendent of public instruction shall report to the appropriations committees of the 20 sixty-sixth legislative assembly regarding funds granted, performance measures established for 21 each grantee, and whether grantees met performance expectations.

SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - TEACHER AND ADMINISTRATOR MENTORING.

- 9 services and leases, and contributions must be deposited in the fund. Moneys in the fund are to
- 10 be used pursuant to legislative appropriation for the provision of services under this chapter.
- 11 SECTION 25. A new section to chapter 25-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
- 12 and enacted as follows:

13 School for the deaf fund.

- 14 The school for the deaf fund is a special fund in the state treasury. All moneys received
- 15 pursuant to section 2 of article IX of the Constitution of North Dakota and all revenues received
- 16 from the lease of buildings and the provision of meals and services, including interpreter
- 17 services, must be deposited in the fund. Moneys in the fund are to be used pursuant to
- 18 legislative appropriation for provision of services under this chapter.
- 19 **SECTION 26. REPEAL.** Section 6-09-45 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.
- 20 **SECTION 27. REPEAL.** Section 13 of chapter 49 of the 2015 Session Laws is repealed.
- 21 SECTION 28. EMERGENCY. Sections 78 and 2227 of this Act are declared to be
- 22 emergency measures.
