1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

2 human services; and to create and enact two new sections to chapter 50-06 of the North Dakota

3 <u>Century Code, relating to peer support specialist certification and the establishment of a</u>

4 <u>community behavioral health program; to amend and reenact section 50-24.1-37 of the North</u>

5 Dakota Century Code, relating to the Medicaid expansion program; to provide for transfers; to

6 provide for a legislative management report; to provide for a legislative management study; to

7 provide an exemption; and to declare an emergency.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

9 SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the 10 funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 11 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 12 other income, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying the expenses 13 of its various divisions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, as 14 follows:

14	SEC	CTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 50-24.1-37 of the North Dakota Century Code is
15	amende	d and reenacted as follows:
16	50-2	24.1-37. Medicaid expansion - Legislative management report. (Effective
17	Januar y	/ 1, 2014, through July 31, 2019 - Contingent repeal - See note)
18	1.	The department of human services shall expand medical assistance coverage as
19		authorized by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act [Pub. L. 111-148],
20		as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 [Pub.
21		L. 111-152] to individuals under sixty-five years of age with income below one hundred
22		thirty-eight percent of the federal poverty level, based on modified adjusted gross-
23		incomeline published by the federal office of management and budget applicable to
24		the household size.
25	2.	The department of human services shall inform new enrollees in the medical
26		assistance expansion program that benefits may be reduced or eliminated if federal
27		participation decreases or is eliminated.
28	3.	The department shall implement the expansion by bidding through private carriers or
29		utilizing the health insurance exchange.
30	4.	The contract between the department and the private carrier must:

1		a. Provide a reimbursement methodology for all medications and dispensing fees
2		which identifies the minimum amount paid to pharmacy providers for each
3		medication. The reimbursement methodology, at a minimum, must:
4		(1) Be available on the department's website; and
5		(2) Encompass all types of pharmacy providers regardless of whether the
6		pharmacy benefits are being paid through the private carrier or contractor or
7		subcontractor of the private carrier under this section.
8		b. Provide full transparency of all costs and all rebates in aggregate.
9		c. Allow an individual to obtain medication from a pharmacy that provides mail order
10		service; however, the contract may not require mail order to be the sole method
11		of service and must allow for all contracted pharmacy providers to dispense any
12		and all drugs included in the benefit plan and allowed under the pharmacy
13		provider's license.
14		d. Ensure that pharmacy services obtained in jurisdictions other than this state and
15		its three contiguous states are subject to prior authorization and reporting to the
16		department for eligibility verification.
17		e. Ensure the payments to pharmacy providers do not include a required payback
18		amount to the private carrier or one of the private carrier's contractors or
19		subcontractors which is not representative of the amounts allowed under the
20		reimbursement methodology provided in subdivision a.
21	5.	The contract between the department and the private carrier must provide the
22		department with full access to provider reimbursement rates. The department shall
23		consider provider reimbursement rate information in selecting a private carrier under
24		this section. Before August first of each even-numbered year, the department shall
25		submit a report to the legislative management regarding provider reimbursement rates
26		under the medical assistance expansion program. This report may provide cumulative
27		data and trend data but may not disclose identifiable provider reimbursement rates.
28	6.	Provider reimbursement rate information received by the department under this
29		section and any information provided to the department of human services or any
30		audit firm by a pharmacy benefit manager under this section is confidential, except the

1	department may use the reimbursement rate information to prepare the report to the
2	legislative management as required under this section.
3	SECTION 6. FUNDING TRANSFERS - EXCEPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding
4	section 54-16-04, the director of the office of management and budget shall transfer
5	appropriation authority between line items within subdivisions 1, 2, and 3 of section 1 of this Act
6	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, as requested by the
7	department of human services. The department of human services shall notify the legislative
8	council of any transfer made pursuant to this section. The department shall report to the budget
9	section after June 30, 2020, any transfer made in excess of \$50,000 and to the appropriations
10	committees of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly regarding any transfers made pursuant to
11	this section.
12	
13	FUND. Of the funds appropriated in section 1 of this Act, \$37,779,159 is from the tobacco
14	prevention and control trust fund for the purpose of defraying expenses of the department of
15	human services, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.
16	SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - HEALTH CARE TRUST FUND. Of the funds-
17	appropriated in section 1 of this Act, \$1,686,191 is from the health care trust fund for the
18	purpose of defraying expenses of long-term care services programs, for the biennium beginning
19	July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.
20	
21	appropriated in section 1 of this Act, \$18,000,000 is from the community health trust fund for the
22	purpose of defraying expenses in the medical services division, for the biennium beginning
23	July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.
24	SECTION 7. FUNDING TRANSFERS - EXCEPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding
25	section 54-16-04, the director of the office of management and budget shall transfer
26	appropriation authority from line items within subdivisions 1, 2, and 3 of section 1 of this Act to
27	subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending
28	June 30, 2021, as requested by the department of human services. The department of human
29	services shall notify the legislative council of any transfer made pursuant to this section. The
30	department shall report to the budget section after June 30, 2020, any transfer made in excess

11	SEC	TION 10. ESTIMATED INCOME - TOBACCO PREVENTION AND CONTROL TRUST	
12	FUND.	The estimated income line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum	
13	of \$6,00	0,000 from the tobacco prevention and control trust fund for defraying expenses in the	
14	medical	services division.	
15	SEC	TION 11. PLACEMENT OF INDIVIDUALS IN INSTITUTIONS FOR MENTAL	
16	DISEAS	E - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT. During the biennium beginning	
17	July 1, 2	2019, and ending June 30, 2021, the department of human services shall develop and	
18	implement a statewide plan to address acute psychiatric and residential care needs. The		
19	statewid	e plan must address the following:	
20	1.	The size and use of the state hospital;	
21	2.	The use of state-operated or private acute facilities in areas of the state outside the	
22		city of Jamestown;	
23	3.	The potential to expand private providers' offering of acute psychiatric care and	
24		residential care to fulfill the identified need, including how the implementation of	
25		services authorized by the sixty-sixth legislative assembly affects the balance of	
26		inpatient, residential, and community-based services; and	
27	4.	The impact of department efforts to adjust crisis services and other behavioral health	
28		services provided by the regional human service centers.	
29	If neces	sary to implement the plan's provisions, the department shall submit applicable state	
30	Medicai	d plan amendments and apply for applicable state Medicaid plan waivers, including the	
31	Medicai	d demonstration waiver. Prior to October 1, 2020, the department shall report to the	

legislative management on the statewide plan, along with any legislation required to implement
 the plan.

3 SECTION 12. MENTAL HEALTH VOUCHER PROGRAM - LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT 4 **REPORT.** Subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$1,050,000 for the 5 department to establish and administer a voucher program by July 1, 2020, to address gaps in 6 the state's unified mental health delivery system pursuant to section 50-06-01.7 and to assist in 7 the payment of mental health services provided by mental health providers, excluding human 8 service centers. The department may spend up to \$300,000 of the amount identified in this 9 section for administering the voucher system. Clinical services eligible for the voucher program 10 include only those for mental disorders recognized by the "Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of 11 Mental Disorders", American psychiatric association, fifth edition, text revision (2017). The 12 department of human services shall ensure that a provider accepting vouchers under this Act 13 collects and reports process and outcome measures. The department of human services shall 14 ensure vouchers under this Act are only used for individuals who are between seventeen and 15 twenty-five years of age with serious emotional disturbance or serious mental illness. The 16 department of human services shall develop requirements and provide training and technical 17 assistance to a private provider accepting vouchers under this Act. A private mental health 18 provider accepting vouchers under this Act shall provide evidence-based services. Before 19 July 1, 2020, the department of human services shall provide a report to the legislative 20 management regarding the rules adopted to establish and administer the voucher system to 21 assist in the payment for mental health services provided by mental health providers.

SECTION 13. SCHOOL BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAM. Subdivision 2 of section 1 of
 this Act includes the sum of \$300,000 for a school behavioral health program. The department
 of human services shall use a portion of this funding for behavioral health pilot projects in a rural
 school and a tribal school.

SECTION 14. EXEMPTION. The amount appropriated for the replacement of the Medicaid
management information system and related projects in chapter 50 of the 2007 Session Laws
and chapter 38 of the 2011 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11.
Any unexpended funds from these appropriations approved under section 54-44.1-11 for
continuation into the 2009-11 biennium, then the 2011-13 biennium, then the 2013-15 biennium,
then the 2015-17 biennium, and then the 2017-19 biennium are available for the completion of

the Medicaid management information system and related projects during the biennium
beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 15. EXEMPTION. The amount appropriated for the modification of the
department of human services' eligibility systems in chapter 578 of the 2011 Special Session
Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from
this appropriation approved under section 54-44.1-11 for continuation into the 2013-15
biennium, then the 2015-17 biennium, and then the 2017-19 biennium are available for the
completion of the modification of the eligibility systems project during the biennium beginning
July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 16. EXEMPTION. The amount appropriated for the development of the electronic
health records system in chapter 12 of the 2013 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of
section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation approved under section
54-44.1-11 for continuation into the 2015-17 biennium and then the 2017-19 biennium are
available for the completion of the electronic health records system during the biennium
beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 17. EXEMPTION. The sum of \$3,000,000 of federal funds appropriated for the
development of the child care licensing and data system in chapter 11 of the 2017 Session
Laws is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this
appropriation are available for the completion of the child care licensing and data system during
the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 18. EXEMPTION. The sum of \$40,800,000 of federal and other funds
appropriated for the development of the health information network and care coordination
project in chapter 11 of the 2017 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of section
54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation are available for the completion of
the health information network and care coordination project during the biennium beginning
July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

SECTION 19. EXEMPTION. The amount appropriated for the development of the electronic
visit verification project in chapter 11 of the 2017 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions
of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation are available for the
completion of the electronic visit verification project during the biennium beginning July 1, 2019,
and ending June 30, 2021.

1	SECTION 20. CONVEYANCE OF LAND AUTHORIZED - STATE HOSPITAL -
2	EXEMPTION. The state of North Dakota by and through the department of human services may
3	convey real property associated with the state hospital in Stutsman County to the department of
4	corrections and rehabilitation. The department of human services may convey building 2404,
5	formerly known as the nursing residence building and Tompkins building, and surrounding
6	property on the terms and conditions determined appropriate by the department of human
7	services and the attorney general. Sections 54-01-05.2 and 54-01-05.5 do not apply to this
8	conveyance.
9	SECTION 21. CAPITAL PROJECTS AND PAYMENTS. During the period beginning with
10	the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2021, the department of human services is
11	authorized to expend funds for the following capital projects and payments:
12	1. The construction of a heating system and plant building at the state hospital;
13	2. The renovation of the cedar grove and maplewood buildings at the life skills and
14	transition center, including the construction of a structure to connect the buildings;
15	3. The demolition of the refectory and pleasant view buildings at the life skills and
16	transition center; and
17	4. The payment of special assessments at the state hospital.
18	SECTION 22. DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES CASE MANAGEMENT. The department
19	of human services shall provide case management services for individuals with a
20	developmental disability within the ratio provided pursuant to North Dakota Administrative Code
21	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. If case management
22	services for individuals with a developmental disability exceed the ratio requirement provided in
23	the North Dakota Administrative Code, the department of human services may hire temporary
24	staff or the department of human services may propose a change to North Dakota
25	Administrative Code to meet the ratio requirement.
26	SECTION 23. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROVIDER PROCESS AND OUTCOME
27	MEASURES. Behavioral health service providers that receive funding from the department of
28	human services shall submit process and outcome measures to the department of human
29	services for programs and services supported by state funding during the biennium beginning
30	July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

1 SECTION 24. TELEPHONE SUPPORT AND DIRECTORY SERVICES. The vendor of 2 telephone and directory services, under contract with the department of human services, shall 3 include private behavioral health service providers in the vendor's directory at no cost to the 4 private behavioral health service providers during the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and 5 ending June 30, 2021. 6 SECTION 25. ADULT COMPANION SERVICES. The department of human services shall 7 include adult companion services as an allowable service under the home and community-8 based services Medicaid waiver, effective for dates of service on or after January 1, 2020. 9 SECTION 26. ADULT RESIDENTIAL RATES - REBASING. The department of human 10 services shall rebase adult residential rates, effective for dates of service on or after January 1, 11 2020. The department of human services shall request cost information from adult residential 12 providers who are enrolled as Medicaid home and community-based waiver providers and 13 serve clients who receive memory care services or have a traumatic brain injury. 14 SECTION 27. TARGETED CASE MANAGEMENT - SERIOUS EMOTIONAL 15 **DISTURBANCE.** The department of human services shall expand the types of providers 16 recognized as Medicaid providers of targeted case management for individuals with a serious 17 emotional disturbance beginning on or after October 1, 2019. If this expansion results in 18 expenditures that exceed the amount appropriated to the department of human services for this 19 service, the department shall request a deficiency appropriation from the sixty-seventh 20 legislative assembly for any shortfall. 21 SECTION 28. TARGETED CASE MANAGEMENT - SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESS. The 22 department of human services shall expand the types of providers recognized as Medicaid 23 providers of targeted case management for individuals with a serious mental illness beginning 24 on or after October 1, 2019. If this expansion results in expenditures that exceed the amount 25 appropriated to the department of human services for this service, the department shall request 26 a deficiency appropriation from the sixty-seventh legislative assembly for any shortfall. 27 SECTION 29. WITHDRAWAL MANAGEMENT. The department of human services shall 28 include withdrawal management as a covered service in the Medicaid state plan during the 29 biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. 30 **SECTION 30. IMPLEMENTATION OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH STUDY** 31 **RECOMMENDATIONS - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.** Before August 1, 2020,

- 1 the department of human services shall provide a report to the legislative management
- 2 regarding the implementation of the human services research institute report recommendations.

3 SECTION 31. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - HEALTH CARE DELIVERY

- 4 **SYSTEM.** During the 2019-20 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the
- 5 delivery of health care in the state. The study must review the needs and future challenges of
- 6 the North Dakota health care delivery system, including rural access to primary health care, the
- 7 use of emergency medical services, strategies to better serve residents, and the role of health
- 8 care services in the future development of the state. The legislative management shall report its
- 9 findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the
- 10 recommendations, to the sixty-seventh legislative assembly.
- 11 SECTION 32. EMERGENCY. The sum of \$6,770,665 in subdivision 3 of section 1 of this
- 12 Act for capital projects at the state hospital and life skills and transition center and section 21 of
- 13 this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.
