1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 15.1-01-04, 15.1-27-03.2, and 15.1-27-04.1 of

2 the North Dakota Century Code, relating to membership of the kindergarten through grade

3 twelve education coordination council, adjustments to school district size weighting factors, and

4 the education foundation aid funding formula transition maximum and payment rates; and to

5 provide an appropriation.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-01-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is
amended and reenacted as follows:

9 **15.1-01-04. Kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.**

- The state board of public school education shall oversee the creation and ongoing
 operation of the kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
- 12 2. The council consists of:
- a. Three members of the legislative assembly, one member of the majority party
 from each chamber of the legislative assembly, selected by the respective
 majority leader of the chamber, and one member of the minority party selected
 through collaboration between the respective minority leaders of each chamber;
- b. The governor or the governor's designee;
- 18 c. The superintendent of public instruction or the superintendent's designee;
- d. The president of the state board for career and technical education or the
 president's designee;
- e. The president of the board of the North Dakota council of educational leaders or
 the president's designee;
- f. The president of the board of North Dakota united or the president's designee;

1		g. The president of the board of the North Dakota school boards association or the
2		president's designee;
3		h. The president of the board of the North Dakota small organized schools or the
4		president's designee;
5		i. The president of the board of the North Dakota school counselor association or
6		the president's designee; and
7		j. The president of the North Dakota special education study council or the
8		president's designee;
9		k. The president of the North Dakota regional education association or the
10		president's designee; and
11		I. The following gubernatorial appointees:
12		(1) An individual representing the statewide longitudinal data system
13		committee;
14		(2) An individual representing a tribal school; and
15		(3) An individual employed as a public school administrator;
16		(4) An individual employed as a public school principal;
17		(5) An individual employed as a public school teacher ;
18		(6) A director of a special education unit; and
19		(7) A director of a regional education association.
20	3.	The term of office for a member appointed by the governor is four years. The governor
21		may stagger the initial appointments to the council so no more than three members'
22		terms expire in any year.
23	4.	The council shall select a presiding officer annually from among its members.
24	5.	A member of the council who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to
25		receive per diem compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each
26		day performing official duties of the council and to reimbursement for travel and
27		expenses as provided by law, to be paid by the legislative council. A member of the
28		council who is not a state employee is entitled to receive as compensation sixty-two
29		dollars and fifty cents per day and to reimbursement of expenses as provided by law
30		for state officers while attending meetings of the council, to be paid by the state board
31		of public school education. A state employee who is a member of the council is entitled

1		to re	eceive that employee's regular salary and is entitled to reimbursement for mileage		
2		and expenses, to be paid by the employing agency.			
3	6.	The council may hire an executive director.

13			recommendations for addressing those gaps or duplications.		
14		e.	Study and evaluate new and emerging educational initiatives and trends and		
15			provide recommendations for policy changes to state entities or the legislative		
16			assembly if necessary.		
17		f.	Support the implementation, dissemination, and communication of local or		
18			regional educational initiatives and practices, including innovative education		
19			programs, on a statewide level.		
20		g.	Establish a one-stop communication and Coordinate and communicate		
21			information hubavailable on state websites to provide the public and interested		
22			parties with seamless access to state entities that deliver education services and		
23			programs.		
24		h.	Develop and utilize subcommittees as needed.		
25		i.	Seek advice and input from interested parties not appointed to the council as		
26			needed.

1 Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall reduce the e. 2 baseline funding for any school district that becomes an elementary district 3 pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2012-13 school year. The reduction must 4 be proportional to the number of weighted student units in the grades that are 5 offered through another school district relative to the total number of weighted 6 student units the school district offered in the year before the school district 7 became an elementary district. The reduced baseline funding applies to the 8 calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district 9 becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter.
