The term of office for a member appointed by the governor is four years. The governor 21 may stagger the initial appointments to the council so no more than three members' 22 terms expire in any year. 23 4. The council shall select a presiding officer annually from among its members. 24 5. A member of the council who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to 25 receive per diem compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each 26 day performing official duties of the council and to reimbursement for travel and 27 expenses as provided by law, to be paid by the legislative council. A member of the 28 council who is not a state employee is entitled to receive as compensation sixty-two 29 dollars and fifty cents per day and to reimbursement of expenses as provided by law 30 for state officers while attending meetings of the council, to be paid by the state board 31 of public school education. To determine the imputed average daily membership, the superintendent of 10 public instruction shall divide the school district's average daily membership by 0.60. 11 The superintendent of public instruction shall adjust the school district size weighting 12 factor for each school district that does not include a high school by multiplying the 13 school district size weighting factor determined under subsection 2 by ninety-two 14 percent. 15 <u>4.</u> The school district size weighting factor determined under this section and multiplied 16 by a school district's weighted average daily membership equals the district's weighted 17 student units. 18 4.5. Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the school district size weighting factor 19 assigned to a district may not be less than the factor arrived at when the highest 20 number of students possible in average daily membership is multiplied by the school 21 district size weighting factor for the subdivision immediately preceding the district's 22 actual subdivision and then divided by the district's average daily membership. 23 **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-04.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is 24 amended and reenacted as follows: 25 15.1-27-04.1. Baseline funding - Establishment - Determination of state aid. (Effective 26 through June 30, 2025) 27 To determine the amount of state aid payable to each district, the superintendent of 28 public instruction shall establish each district's baseline funding. A district's baseline 29 funding consists of:
 - All state aid received by the district in accordance with chapter 15.1-27 during the
 2018-19 school year;

1 An amount equal to the property tax deducted by the superintendent of public 2 instruction to determine the 2018-19 state aid payment; 3 C. An amount equal to seventy-five percent of the revenue received by the school 4 district during the 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types: 5 Revenue reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota school district 6 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the 7 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08; 8 (2) Mineral revenue received by the school district through direct allocation from 9 the state treasurer and not reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota 10 school district financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by 11 the superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 12 15.1-02-08; 13 Tuition reported under code 1300 of the North Dakota school district (3) 14 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the 15 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08, 16 with the exception of revenue received specifically for the operation of an 17 educational program provided at a residential treatment facility and tuition 18 received for the provision of an adult farm management program; 19 Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on the distribution and transmission (4) 20 of electric power; 21 (5) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on electricity generated from 22 sources other than coal; 23 (6) Revenue from the leasing of land acquired by the United States for which 24 compensation is allocated to the state under 33 U.S.C. 701(c)(3); and 25 d. An amount equal to the total revenue received by the school district during the 26 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types: 27 (1) Mobile home tax revenue; 28 (2) Telecommunications tax revenue; and 29 Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes and state reimbursement of the (3) 30 homestead credit and disabled veterans credit; and

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- 1 Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall reduce the 2 baseline funding for any school district that becomes an elementary district 3 pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2012-13 school year. The reduction must 4 be proportional to the number of weighted student units in the grades that are 5 offered through another school district relative to the total number of weighted 6 student units the school district offered in the year before the school district 7 became an elementary district. The reduced baseline funding applies to the 8 calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district 9 becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter. For districts that 10 become an elementary district prior to the 2020-21 school year, the 11 superintendent shall use the reduced baseline funding to calculate state aid for 12 the 2020-21 school year and for each year thereafter.
 - a. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in subsection 1 by the district's 2017-18 weighted student units to determine the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit.
 - b. For any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2017-18 school year, the superintendent shall adjust the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit used to calculate state aid. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in subsection 1 by the district's weighted student units after the school district becomes an elementary district to determine the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit. The superintendent shall use the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit in the calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter.
 - c. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year and for each school year thereafter, the superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. Each year the superintendent shall calculate the amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per weighted student unit provided in subsection 3. The superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit by fifteen percent of the

14	<u>(5)</u>	For the 2025-26 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
15		twenty percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit,
16		as established in subsection 2, plus seventy-five percent of the difference
17		between the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and
18		one hundred twenty percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
19		student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the
20		transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1
21		of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units
22		from the previous school year.
23	<u>(6)</u>	For the 2026-27 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
24		twenty percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit,
25		as established in subsection 2, plus ninety percent of the difference
26		between the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and
27		one hundred twenty percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
28		student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the
29		transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1
30		of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units

The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous
- After determining the product in accordance with subsection 3, the superintendent of
 - Subtract an amount equal to sixty mills multiplied by the taxable valuation of the school district, except the amount in dollars subtracted for purposes of this subdivision may not exceed the previous year's amount in dollars subtracted for purposes of this subdivision by more than twelve percent, adjusted pursuant to
