1	A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new subsection to section 15.1-06-04, a new section to
2	chapter 15.1-07, a new section to chapter 15.1-13, and a new section to chapter 15.1-21 of the
3	North Dakota Century Code, relating to virtual learning, school calendar length, reading
4	competency requirements, and teacher professional development and licensure; to amend and
5	reenact section 15.1-01-04, subsection 4 of section 15.1-06-04, subdivision e of subsection 1 of
6	section 15.1-06-06, section 15.1-06-13, subsection 2 of section 15.1-09.1-02.1, and sections
7	15.1-20-01, 15.1-27-03.2, 15.1-27-04.1, 15.1-27-35, and 15.1-31-07 of the North Dakota
8	Century Code, relating to membership of the kindergarten through grade twelve education
9	coordination council, adjustments to school district size weighting factors, the education
10	foundation aid funding formula transition maximum and payment rates, student attendance and
11	enrollment, school approval, school compliance, regional education association services,
12	average daily membership, and school calendars; to provide for a legislative management
13	study; to provide a legislative management report; to provide an appropriation; and to provide
14	an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-01-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

 - The state board of public school education shall oversee the creation and ongoing operation of the kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
 - The council consists of:

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a. Three members of the legislative assembly, one member of the majority party from each chamber of the legislative assembly, selected by the respective

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- 1 4. The council shall select a presiding officer annually from among its members.
 - 5. A member of the council who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to receive per diem compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each day performing official duties of the council and to reimbursement for travel and expenses as provided by law, to be paid by the legislative council. A member of the council who is not a state employee is entitled to receive as compensation sixty-two dollars and fifty cents per day and to reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers while attending meetings of the council, to be paid by the state board of public school education. A state employee who is a member of the council is entitled to receive that employee's regular salary and is entitled to reimbursement for mileage and expenses, to be paid by the employing agency.
 - 6. The council may hire an executive director.
 - 7. The council shall:
 - a. Assist in the implementation, dissemination, and communication of the statewide strategic vision and evaluate progress toward meeting the identified goals and strategies.
 - Perform a continuous review of the effectiveness and efficiency of access and delivery of education services and programs in the state.
 - Identify opportunities for increased collaboration among state education entities and stakeholders.
 - Identify gaps or duplications in education services and programs and provide recommendations for addressing those gaps or duplications.
 - e. Study and evaluate new and emerging educational initiatives and trends and provide recommendations for policy changes to state entities or the legislative assembly if necessary.
 - f. Support the implementation, dissemination, and communication of local or regional educational initiatives and practices, including innovative education programs, on a statewide level.
 - g. Establish a one-stop communication and Coordinate and communicate
 information hubavailable on state websites to provide the public and interested
