1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to provide an appropriation to the Bank of North Dakota; to create and enact 3 a new section to chapter 6-09, four new sections to chapter 15-10, section 15-10-48.2, and 4 section 15-18.2-06.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to an economic diversification 5 research fund, matching grants for agricultural research and extension, the Bismarck state 6 college polytechnic center, a report on higher education trends, disclosure of financial condition, 7 and a minimum amount payable; to amend and reenact sections 15-10-38.1, 15-10-38.2, 8 15-10-38.3, subdivision c of subsection 1 of section 15-10-48, subdivision c of subsection 1 of 9 section 15-10-49, subsection 2 of section 15-10-49, sections 15-10-57 and 15-10-63, 10 subdivision k of subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-02, subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-05, section 11 15-54.1-02, subsection 1 of section 15-62.4-03, subdivision c of subsection 2 of section 12 54-07-12, and section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the skilled 13 workforce student loan repayment program, the skilled workforce scholarship program, 14 matching grants for the advancement of academics, the workforce development council, higher 15 education capital projects, state aid for institutions of higher education, the university system 16 capital building fund, student financial assistance grants, the digitization of documents relating 17 to Theodore Roosevelt, and the cancellation of unexpended appropriations; to repeal sections 18 15-10-48.1 and 15-10-58 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to matching grants for 19 legal education and the workforce education advisory council; to provide for a transfer; to 20 provide for a legislative management study; to provide loan authorization for the Mayville state 21 university old main project; to provide for a report; to provide an exemption; to provide 22 legislative intent; and to declare an emergency.

#### 1 SECTION 3. ADDITIONAL FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS -

2 **APPROPRIATION - EXEMPTION.** All funds, in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of 3 this Act, from federal, private, and other sources for competitive grants or other funds that the 4 legislative assembly has not indicated the intent to reject, including tuition revenue, received by 5 the state board of higher education and the institutions and entities under the control of the 6 state board of higher education, are appropriated to the board and those institutions and 7 entities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. All additional funds 8 received under the North Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium 9 beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, are appropriated to the state board of higher 10 education for reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board. Notwithstanding 11 section 48-01.2-25, an institution receiving funds for capital projects in excess of the amounts 12 appropriated in section 1 of this Act may spend those funds for the capital project. 13 SECTION 4. USE OF EXTRAORDINARY REPAIRS FUNDING - MATCHING FUNDS. The 14 capital assets line items in subdivisions 2 through 12 of section 1 of this Act include funding 15 from the general fund for institution extraordinary repairs. An institution, excluding the university 16 of North Dakota and North Dakota state university, shall provide one dollar of matching funds 17 from operations or other sources for each one dollar of extraordinary repairs funding used for a 18 project. The university of North Dakota and North Dakota state university shall provide two 19 dollars of matching funds from operations or other sources for each one dollar of extraordinary 20 repairs funding used for a project. 21 SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS 22 FUND. The grand total special funds line item in subdivision 15 of section 1 of this Act includes
