1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

2 commerce; to amend and reenact sections 6-09.18-01, 6-09.18-02, 6-09.18-03, 6-09.18-04,

3 6-09.18-05, 6-09.18-06, and 6-09.18-07, subsection 4 of section 21-10-13, sections 10-30.5-04,

4 10-30.5-05, 54-60-22, 54-60-28, 54-60-29, 54-60-29.1, 54-60.2-01, and 54-60.2-02 of the North

5 Dakota Century Code and subsection 35 of section 1 of chapter 550 of the 2021 Special

6 Session Session Laws, relating to the legacy investment for technology program, the North

7 Dakota development fund, the workforce enhancement council, the administration of uncrewed

8 aircraft system programs, workforce development grants to tribally controlled community

9 colleges, and a North Dakota development fund grant program; to provide a transfer; to provide

10 an exemption; and to provide for a report; and to declare an emergency.

#### 11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

12 **SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds 13 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 14 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 15 other income, to the department of commerce for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the 16 department of commerce, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, 17 as follows:

the 2025-27 biennium. The department of commerce shall report to the appropriations
committees of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the
biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 3. TRANSFER - INTERNSHIP FUND. The office of management and budget
 shall transfer \$1,006,896 of the amount appropriated in the operating expenses line item in
 section 1 of this Act to the internship fund for the purpose of administering the operation intern
 program, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

 SECTION 4. TRANSFER - LEGACY EARNINGSSTRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND

 IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO LEGACY INVESTMENT FOR TECHNOLOGY FUND 

- 27 INNOVATION TECHNOLOGY LOANS. Pursuant to the designation of funding for other
- 28 legislative purposes under subdivision c of subsection 4 of section 21-10-13, the The office of
- 29 management and budget shall transfer the sum of <u>\$20,000,000</u>\$10,000,000 from the legacy
- 30 <u>earnings</u>strategic investment and improvements fund to the legacy investment for technology

- 1 fund for the purpose of providing legacy investment technology loans, for the biennium
- 2 beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 5. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO
NORTH DAKOTA DEVELOPMENT FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer
the sum of \$30,000,000\$65,000,000 from strategic investment and improvements fund to the
North Dakota development fund for programs under chapter 10-30.5, during the biennium
beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

- 8 SECTION 6. TRANSFER STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO
   9 NORTH DAKOTA DEVELOPMENT FUND FERTILIZER DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY
   10 COUNCIL EXEMPTION.
- 11 1. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$120,000,000 from the
   12 strategic investment and improvements fund to the North Dakota development fund 13 under chapter 10-30.5 for the purpose of a fertilizer development grant program,
   14 during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.
- 15 2. Notwithstanding any other provision under chapter 10-30.5, the board of directors shall 16 distribute grant funding to entities to support the development of fertilizer plants in the 17 state based on recommendations from the fertilizer development advisory board. In 18 consultation with the advisory board, the board of directors shall develop program 19 guidelines including eligibility criteria.
- 3. To be eligible for a grant, a fertilizer development project must be located within the
   state, and the owner of the fertilizer development project must be an entity domiciled in the United States or Canada. Fifty percent of the grant awards must be designated for one or more fertilizer development projects that use hydrogen produced by the electrolysis of water, and fifty percent of the grant awards must be designated for one or more fertilizer development projects that use natural gas or lignite resources.

13	SECTION 6. ESTIMATED INCOME - FEDERAL WEATHERIZATION AND ENERGY
14	ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS - FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITIONS. The estimated income
15	line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$120,000,000 from federal funds derived from the
16	Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and the Inflation Reduction Act for weatherization and
17	energy assistance programs. Of the full-time equivalent positions included in section 1 of this
18	Act, three positions are for the administration of weatherization and energy assistance
19	programs for the 2023-25 biennium. The full-time equivalent positions identified in this section
20	are considered one-time positions.
21	SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS
22	FUND - LEGISLATIVE INTENT. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes
23	the sum of <u>\$98,500,000</u> \$68,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund, of
24	which <u>\$7,000,000</u> is for the rural workforce housing grant program, \$5,000,000 is for
25	the tourism marketing awareness initiative, \$25,000,000 is for the tourism destination
26	development initiative- <del>grant</del> program, <u>\$30,000,000</u> \$26,000,000 is for the beyond visual line of
27	sight uncrewed aircraft system program, <u>\$28,000,000</u> and <u>\$10,000,000</u> is for the enhanced use
28	lease grant program <del>, \$2,000,000 is for new Americans workforce development and training</del>
29	grants, and \$1,500,000 is for a workforce safety grant to an organization that provides
30	workforce safety. It is the intent of the sixty-eighth legislative assembly that the department of
31	commerce not hire a third-party consultant when determining how funding for the tourism

1	destination development initiative grant program will be spent. The department of commerce			
2	may provide funding for the tourism destination development initiative program in the form of			
3	program grants or grants for interest rate buydowns but may not award more than \$5,000,000			
4	for a project under this program.			
5	SECTION 8. RURAL WORKFORCE HOUSING GRANT PROGRAM. The grants line item			
6	in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,500,000\$1,500,000 from the generalstrategic
