ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1538

1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 20.1-02 and a new section to

2 <u>chapter 20.1-03 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to fishing contests, surcharge fees,</u>

3 and the fishing conservation fund; to amend and reenact subsection 20 of section 20.1-02-05 of

4 the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the powers of the director of the game and fish

5 department; and to create and enact a new section to chapter 20.1-02 of the North Dakota-

6 Century Code, relating to fishing contests to provide a continuing appropriation; and to provide

7 <u>an effective date</u>.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

9 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 20 of section 20.1-02-05 of the North Dakota

10 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

11 20. Adopt rules and issuelssue permits for conducting fishing contests involving public

12 waters of the state <u>in accordance with section 2 of this Act</u>. The director by rule shall

13 define the term "fishing contest" and shall set criteria for which a fishing contest permit-

14 is required. The director may deny permits. NoA person may not conduct a fishing

15 contest on public waters without first receiving a permit issued by the director.

SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 20.1-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
and enacted as follows:

18 Fishing contests.

- 191.A "fishing contest" means an event at which a prize or cash is given to a contestant for20catching fish from waters open to the public. The term includes high-value tag
- 21 <u>contests, fishing tournaments, biggest fish contests, contests providing a prize for the</u>
- 22 largest number or weight of fish, and fishing leagues and tournaments comprised of
- 23 <u>multiple fishing events which have a cumulative fee of fifty dollars or more per event.</u>
- 24 <u>The term does not include:</u>

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1		<u>a.</u>	A fishing event with fewer than fifty participants or fewer than fifteen boats for		
2			which an entry or participation fee of less than fifty dollars is charged.		
3		<u>b.</u>	<u>A fishing event with fewer than fifty participants and fewer than fifteen boats.</u>		
4		<u> </u>	An individual big fish promotion for which an entry or participation fee is not		
5			charged.		
6	<u>d.c.</u>		An organized youth fishing event if participants are under the age of nineteen or		
7			enrolled in a high school.		
8	ť	a. d.	An online contest not held on a single body of water.		
9	<u>2.</u>	<u>A fis</u>	shing contest may not include a conservation fee. A if the fishing contest is held by		
10		<u>a no</u>	onprofit veterans organization, charitable organization, educational organization,		
11		<u>relic</u>	gious organization, fraternal organization, civic and service organization, andor

15	<u>3.</u>	<u>An (</u>	organization desiring to hold a fishing contest shall submit an application to the		
16		<u>dire</u>	ctor at least thirty days before the start of the contest. A permit application fee may		
17		<u>not</u>	exceed two thousand five hundred dollars for an event held on a single body of		
18		wat	er. A permit application fee may not exceed seventy-five dollars for a nonprofit		
19		<u>orga</u>	anization listed in subsection 2 or a youth event held on a single body of waterThe		
20		<u>app</u>	lication must list the recipient of the conservation fee and include a seventy-five		
21		doll	ar application fee. A conservation fee must be negotiated between the organization		
22		<u>des</u>	iring to hold the fishing contest and a representative of the fishing league or fishing		
23		<u>tour</u>	nament.		
24	<u>4.</u>	<u>The</u>	e director may deny or revoke a permit if:		
25		<u>a.</u>	The director believes the fishing contest does not or will not comply with the rules		
26			of the department or could be harmful to the fishing resource;		
27		<u>b.</u>	An agency with jurisdiction deems the public use facilities such as a boat ramp,		
28			parking area, campground, or related facilities are inadequate to support the		
29			<u>contest; or</u>		
30		<u>C.</u>	The committee or sponsors have failed to submit timely reports.		

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1	<u>5.</u>	A permittee shall submit a report to the director within thirty days after completion of			
2		the fishing contest. The report must include the number of contest participants, the			
3		<u>quantity and species of fish taken in the contest, the gross and net proceeds for the</u>			
4		tournament, and the percentage of the entry fees awarded to the participants as			
5		prizes and the total amount and recipient of the conservation fee. Failure to submit this			
6		report is justification for denial of future fishing contest permits.			
7	<u>6.</u>	The director may adopt rules to administer this section.			
8	SEC	SECTION 3. A new section to chapter 20.1-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is created			
9	and ena	and enacted as follows:			
10	Nor	Nonresident license surcharge - Fishing conservation fund - Continuing			
11	appropriation.				
12	1.	Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the director shall establish a surcharge of			
13		five dollars on each nonresident fishing license issued under section 20.1-03-12. The			
14		collected surcharge fees must be deposited with the state treasurer and credited to the			
15		fishing conservation fund.			
16	2.	There is created in the state treasury a special fund known as the fishing conservation			
17		fund. The fund consists of all money deposited in the fund pursuant to this section. All			
18		money deposited in the fund is appropriated as a continuing appropriation to the game			
19		and fish department for the purpose of fishery conservation, public access projects,			
20		and grant programs relating to fish and wildlife conservation. The game and fish			
21		department may adopt rules in accordance with chapter 28-32 for the purpose of			
22		administering the fishing conservation fund.			
23	SEC	CTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act becomes effective on April 1, 2024.
