- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapter 13-13 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating
- 2 to residential mortgage loan servicers; and to provide a penalty.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. Chapter 13-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as
follows:

6 <u>13-13-01. Administration.</u>

- 7 The department of financial institutions shall administer and enforce this chapter. The
- 8 department has the power to promulgate rules and regulations having the force and effect of
- 9 law, reasonably necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter, in accordance with chapter
- 10 <u>28-32. Any hearing held and any orders issued pursuant to this chapter must be in accordance</u>
- 11 with chapter 28-32. In addition to those powers set forth in chapter 28-32, the department has

12 additional powers as set forth in this chapter.

13 <u>13-13-02. Definitions.</u>

- 14 <u>As used in this chapter, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:</u>
- 15 <u>1.</u> "Allowable assets for liquidity" means those assets that may be used to satisfy the
- 16 liquidity requirements in this chapter, including unrestricted cash and cash equivalents
- 17 and unencumbered investment grade assets held for sale or trade, which include
- 18 mortgage-backed securities, obligations of government-sponsored enterprises, and
- 19 <u>United States treasury obligations.</u>
- 20 2. "Board of directors" means the formal body established by an applicant or licensee
 21 that is responsible for corporate governance and compliance with this chapter.
- 22 <u>3.</u> <u>"Commissioner" means the commissioner of the department of financial institutions.</u>

1	<u>4.</u>	"Corporate governance" means the structure of the institution and how it is managed,
2		including the corporate rules, policies, processes, and practices used to oversee and
3		manage the institution.
4	<u>5.</u>	"Government-sponsored enterprises" means the federal national mortgage association
5		(fannie mae), the government national mortgage association (ginnie mae), and the
6		federal home loan mortgage corporation (freddie mac).
7	<u>6.</u>	"Interim serviced prior to sale" means the activity of collecting a limited number of
8		contractual mortgage payments immediately after origination on loans held for sale but
9		prior to the loans being sold into the secondary market.
10	<u>7.</u>	"Internal audit" means the internal activity of performing independent, objective
11		assurance and consulting to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of company
12		operations, risk management, internal controls, and governance processes.
13	<u>8.</u>	"Large servicer" means a residential mortgage servicer with servicing portfolios of
14		two thousand or more one-to-four unit residential mortgage loans serviced or
15		subserviced for others, excluding whole loans owned, and loans being "interim"
16		serviced prior to sale as of the most recent calendar year end, reported in the
17		nationwide multistate licensing system and registry mortgage call report, and that
18		operates in two or more states, districts, or territories of the United States either
19		currently or as of the prior calendar year end. For entities within a holding company or
20		affiliated group of companies' applicability must be at the large servicer level. This
21		definition excludes servicers solely owning or conducting reverse mortgage servicing,
22		or both, or the reverse mortgage portfolio administered by the large servicer.
23	<u>9.</u>	"Lender" means any person that extends money to a borrower with the expectation of
24		being repaid.
25	<u>10.</u>	"Liquidity risk" means the potential that the servicer will be unable to meet its
26		obligations as they come due because of an inability to liquidate assets or obtain
27		adequate funding or that it cannot easily unwind or offset specific exposures.
28	<u>11.</u>	"Mortgage call report" means the quarterly or annual report of residential real estate
29		loan origination, servicing, and financial information completed by companies licensed
30		in the nationwide multistate licensing system and registry.

1	<u>12.</u>	"Mortgage servicing rights" refers to the contractual right to service residential
2		mortgage loans on behalf of the owner of the associated mortgage in exchange for
3		specified compensation in accordance with the servicing contract.
4	<u>13.</u>	"Mortgage servicing rights investor" means entities that invest in and own mortgage
5		servicing rights and rely on subservicers to administer the loans on their behalf.
6		Mortgage servicing rights investors are often referred to as master servicers.
7	<u>14.</u>	"Nationwide multistate licensing system and registry" means the registry developed by
8		the conference of state bank supervisors and the American association of residential
9		mortgage regulators and owned and operated by the state regulatory registry, LLC, or
10		any successor or affiliated entity, for the licensing and registration of persons in
11		financial services industries.
12	<u>15.</u>	"Operating liquidity" means the funds necessary to perform normal business
13		operations, such as payment of rent, salaries, interest expense, and other typical
14		expenses associated with operating the entity.
15	<u>16.</u>	"Records" means books, accounts, papers, records, and files, no matter in what
16		format they are kept, which are used in conducting business under this chapter.
17	<u>17.</u>	"Residential mortgage loan servicing" means receiving any scheduled periodic
18		payments from a borrower pursuant to the terms of any federally related mortgage
19		loan, including amounts for escrow accounts under section 10 of the Real Estate
20		Settlement Procedures Act [12 U.S.C. 2609], and making the payments to the owner
21		of the loan or other third parties of principal and interest and such other payments with
22		respect to the amounts received from the borrower as may be required pursuant to the
23		terms of the mortgage servicing loan documents or servicing contract. In the case of a
24		home equity conversion mortgage or reverse mortgage as referenced in this section,
25		servicing includes making payments to the borrower.
26	<u>18.</u>	"Reverse mortgage" means a loan collateralized by real estate, typically made to
27		borrowers over fifty-five years of age, which does not require contractual monthly
28		payments and is typically repaid upon the death of the borrower through the sale of
29		the home or refinance by the heirs.

1 "Risk management assessment" means the functional evaluations performed under 19. 2 the risk management program and reports provided to the board of directors under the 3 relevant governance protocol. 4 "Risk management program" means the policies and procedures designed to identify, 20. 5 measure, monitor, and mitigate risk sufficient for the level of sophistication of the 6 residential mortgage loan servicer. 7 21. "Service or servicing a loan" means on behalf of the lender or investor of a residential 8 mortgage loan: 9 Collecting or receiving payments on existing obligations due and owing to the <u>a.</u> 10 lender or investor, including payments of principal, interest, escrow amounts, and 11 other amounts due; 12 Collecting fees due to the servicer; b. 13 Working with the borrower and the licensed lender or servicer to collect data and C. 14 make decisions necessary to modify certain terms of those obligations either 15 temporarily or permanently; 16 Otherwise finalizing collection through the foreclosure process; or <u>d.</u> 17 Servicing a reverse mortgage loan. <u>e.</u> 18 22. "Servicer" means the entity performing the routine administration of residential 19 mortgage loans on behalf of the owner or owners of the related mortgages under the 20 terms of a servicing contract. 21 23. "Servicing liquidity or liquidity" means the financial resources necessary to manage 22 liquidity risk arising from servicing functions required in acquiring and financing 23 mortgage servicing rights, hedging costs, including margin calls, associated with the 24 mortgage servicing rights asset and financing facilities, and advances or costs of 25 advance financing for principal, interest, taxes, insurance, and any other servicing-26 related advances. 27 24. "Subservicer" means the entity performing the routine administration of residential 28 mortgage loans as agent of a servicer or mortgage servicing rights investor under the 29 terms of a subservicing contract. 30 25. "Tangible net worth" means total equity less receivables due from related entities, less 31 goodwill, and other intangibles less pledged assets.

1	<u>26.</u>	"Whole loans" means loans where a mortgage and the underlying credit risk is owned			
2		and held on the balance sheet of the entity with all ownership rights.			
3	13-13-03. Residential mortgage loan servicing license required.				
4	Except as otherwise provided, a person other than a residential mortgage loan servicer				
5	licensed	l and authorized under this chapter may not engage in residential mortgage loan			
6	servicin	g, either as a servicer, subservicer, or mortgage servicing rights investor, in the state			
7	<u>without</u>	a residential mortgage loan servicer license issued by the commissioner. A person

21	<u>institutic</u>	ons and must contain any information which the department deems necessary and			
22	proper.	The department may further require any applicant to provide additional information that

27	<u>The</u>	application for license must be in writing, under oath, and in the form prescribed by the			
28	<u>commis</u>	sioner. The application must give the location or locations where the business is to be			
29	conducted and must contain any further information the commissioner requires, including the				
30	names and addresses of the partners, officers, directors, trustees, and the principal owners or				
31	member	rs, and will provide the basis for the investigation and findings contemplated under			

1	section 13-13-05. At the time of making an application, the applicant shall include payment in			
2	the sum of four hundred dollars, which is not subject to refund, as a fee for investigating the			
3	application, and the sum of four hundred dollars for a license fee.			
4	<u>13-1</u>	3-07. Financial condition.		
5	<u>This</u>	section applies to large servicers as defined in subsection 9 of section 13-13-02.		
6	<u>1.</u>	A large servicer must maintain capital and liquidity in compliance with this section.		
7	<u>2.</u>	For the purposes of complying with the capital and liquidity requirements of this		
8		section, all financial data must be determined in accordance with generally accepted		
9		accounting principles.		
10	<u>3.</u>	A large servicer that meets the federal housing finance agency eligibility requirements		
11		for enterprise single-family seller or servicers for capital, net worth ratio, and liquidity,		
12		regardless of whether the servicer is approved for government-sponsored enterprises		
13		servicing, meets the requirements of subsections 1 and 2 of this section. Large		
14		servicers shall maintain written policies and procedures implementing the capital and		
15		servicing liquidity requirements of this section. Such policies and procedures must		
16		include a sustainable written methodology for satisfying the requirements of this		
17		subsection and be available to the commissioner upon request.		
18	<u>4.</u>	Large servicers shall maintain sufficient allowable assets for liquidity in addition to the		
19		amounts required for servicing liquidity to cover normal business operations. Large		
20		servicers shall have sound cash management and business operating plans that		
21		match the size and sophistication of the institution to ensure normal business		
22		operations. Management must develop, establish, and implement plans, policies, and		
23		procedures for maintaining operating liquidity sufficient for the ongoing needs of the		
24		institution. The plans, policies, and procedures must contain sustainable, written		
25		methodologies for maintaining sufficient operating liquidity and be available to the		
26		commissioner upon request.		
27	<u>13-1</u>	3-08. Financial condition for applicant or licensee not subject to 13-13-07.		
28	<u>1.</u>	An applicant or licensee not subject to 13-13-07 which is operating as an approved		
29		servicer by one or more government-sponsored enterprises must maintain liquidity to		
30		include operating reserves, and tangible net worth that meet the standards set by the		
31		entity. If approved by more than one entity, the applicant or licensee must meet the		

1	highest standard of the entities for which they are approved. Applicants or licensees
2	with a combined portfolio are subject to this standard.

- 3 <u>2.</u> <u>An applicant or licensee with a portfolio of loans not subject to any government-</u>
- 4 <u>sponsored enterprises requirements must maintain liquidity to include operating</u>
- 5 reserves of 0.00035 times the unpaid principal balance of the portfolio and maintain a
- 6 <u>minimum tangible net worth as set forth in paragraph a of this subsection or, in lieu of</u>
- 7 <u>the tangible net worth, maintain a one million dollar surety bond.</u>
- 8 <u>a.</u> <u>Minimum tangible net worth, based on nationwide portfolio:</u>
- 9 <u>0-199 loans</u> <u>\$100,000</u>
- 10 <u>200-299 loans</u> <u>\$200,000</u>
- 11 <u>300-399 loans</u> <u>\$300,000</u>
- 12 <u>400-499 loans</u> <u>\$400,000</u>

- 23 has a positive net worth and adequate operating reserves. For purposes of this
- 24 section, "operating reserves" are funds set aside in anticipation of future
- 25 payments or obligations and are included in liquidity.
- 26 c. Licensees subject to this section must annually or more frequently report, as
 27 prescribed by the commissioner, on liquidity, including operating reserves, and
 28 tangible net worth.
- 29 <u>13-13-09. Corporate governance.</u>
- 30 This section applies to large servicers as defined in section 13-13-02.

3		<u>spc</u>	onsored enterprise, or where these federal agencies have granted approval for a

16			provide a reliable evaluation of the servicer's internal control structure, risk
17			management, and governance.

19		auc	lited financial statements and audit reports conducted by an independent public
20		acc	countant annually, including at a minimum:
21		<u>a.</u>	Annual financial statements, including balance sheet, statement of operations or
22			income statement, cashflows, notes, and supplemental schedules prepared in
23			accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

1	<u>4.</u>	License	es subject to this section shall establish a risk management program under the					
2		<u>oversig</u> l	nt of the board of directors that identifies, measures, monitors, and controls risk					
3		<u>sufficier</u>	sufficient for the level of sophistication of the servicer. The risk management program					
4		<u>must:</u>						
5		<u>a. Ha</u>	ve appropriate processes and models in place to measure, monitor, and					
6		mit	igate financial risk and changes to the risk profile of the servicer and assets

13			obligations as they come due because of an inability to liquidate assets or					
14			obtain adequate funding or that it cannot easily unwind or offset specific					
15			exposures.					
16		<u>(3)</u>	Operational risk. The risk resulting from inadequate or failed internal					
17			processes, people, and systems or from external events.					
18		<u>(4)</u>	Market risk. The risk to the servicer's condition resulting from adverse					
19			movements in market rates or prices.					
20		<u>(5)</u>	Compliance risk. The risk of regulatory sanctions, fines, penalties, or losses					
21			resulting from failure to comply with laws, rules, regulations, or other					
22			supervisory requirements applicable to the servicer.					
23		<u>(6)</u>	Legal risk. The potential that actions against the institution that result in					
24			unenforceable contracts, lawsuits, legal sanctions, or adverse judgments					
25			can disrupt or otherwise negatively affect the operations or condition of the					
26			servicer.					
27		<u>(7)</u>	Reputation risk. The risk to earnings and capital arising from negative					
28			publicity regarding the servicer's business practices.					
29	<u>5.</u>	<u>License</u>	es subject to this section shall conduct a risk management assessment on an					
30		annual	pasis, concluding with a formal report to the board of directors. Evidence of risk					

1		management activities throughout the year must be maintained and made part of the	
2		report, including findings of issues and the response to address those findings.	
3	<u>6.</u>	Licensees subject to this section must maintain the audits, policies and procedures,	
4		and assessment results as part of their books and records available to the	
5		commissioner upon request.	
6	<u>13-</u>	13-10. Expiration and renewal of license.	
7	<u>All I</u>	icenses required under this chapter expire on December thirty-first of each year and	
8	<u>may be</u>	renewed. Renewals are effective the succeeding January first. Applications for renewal	
9	<u>must be</u>	submitted no later than thirty days before the expiration of the license and must be	
10	accomp	anied by the required annual renewal fee, which is not subject to refund. The renewal	
11	<u>fee mus</u>	t equal five hundred dollars or two dollars and forty cents per one hundred thousand	
12	dollars of	of North Dakota mortgage loans serviced, whichever is greater. The renewal fee shall be	
13	based o	n the average mortgage loans serviced over the previous four quarters ending June	
14	thirtieth of the current year as reported on the mortgage call report. The renewal fee may not		
15	exceed one hundred thousand dollars. Fees must be paid to the department of financial

18	renewal	application may be denied upon the same grounds as would justify denial of an initial	
19	<u>applicat</u>	ion. When a licensee has been delinquent in renewing its license, the department of	
20	<u>financia</u>	l institutions may charge an additional fee of fifty dollars for the renewal of the license. A	
21	resident	ial mortgage loan servicer license is not transferable. If the commissioner determines	
22	that an	ownership change has occurred in a sole proprietorship, partnership, limited liability	
23	partners	ship, corporation, or limited liability corporation that was previously granted a residential	
24	mortgag	e loan servicer license, the commissioner may require a new application from the	
25	purchas	er. The application must be filed within forty-five days from the date change of	
26	ownerst	nip is consummated. The residential mortgage loan servicer license granted to the	
27	previous	s owner continues in effect to the new purchaser until the application is either granted or	
28	<u>denied.</u>		
29	<u>13-</u>	13-11. Powers of the department of financial institutions.	
30	The	department of financial institutions has the power to:	

1	<u>1.</u>	Det	termine the qualifications of all applicants based on financial responsibility, financial
2		<u>cor</u>	ndition, business experience, character, and general fitness which must reasonably
3		wa	rrant the belief that the applicant's business will be conducted lawfully and fairly. In
4		<u>det</u>	ermining whether this qualification is met, and for the purpose of investigating
5		<u>cor</u>	npliance with the chapter, the commissioner may review and consider the relevant
6		bus	siness records and capital adequacy of the applicant and the competence,
7		<u>exp</u>	perience, integrity, and financial ability of a person who is a member, partner,
8		dire	ector, officer, or twenty-five percent or more shareholder of the applicant.
9	<u>2.</u>	<u>Est</u>	ablish codes of ethical conduct for licensees.
10	<u>3.</u>	<u>The</u>	e commissioner may:
11		<u>a.</u>	Order or direct the licensee subject to this chapter to satisfy additional conditions
12			necessary to ensure that the institution will continue to operate in a safe and
13			sound manner and be able to continue to service loans in compliance with state
14			and federal law or regulation where risk to the institution or borrower is extremely
15			high, as determined by a formal review.
16		<u>b.</u>	Provide notice that all or part of this chapter is not applicable to an institution
17			where risk to the institution is extremely low, as determined by a formal review.
18		<u>C.</u>	Provide public notice of a temporary suspension of all or certain sections of this
19			chapter where economic, environmental, or societal events are determined to be
20			of such severity to warrant a temporary suspension.
21	<u>13-</u>	13-12	2. Manner in which records to be kept.
22	<u>Eve</u>	ery re	sidential mortgage loan servicer licensed under this chapter shall keep a record of
23	all sums	s coll	ected and all loans serviced by the residential mortgage loan servicer for a period
24	<u>of six ye</u>	ears f	rom the date of last entry. If the records can be reproduced upon request by the
25	<u>departm</u>	nent o	of financial institutions within the required statutory time period provided in this
26	<u>section,</u>	the I	records of a licensee may be maintained electronically. When a licensee ceases
27	<u>operatio</u>	ons fo	or any reason, the licensee shall inform the department of the location of the
28	records	<u>. In a</u>	ddition, the licensee shall provide the name of the individual responsible for
29	mainten	ance	of the records. The licensee shall notify the department within ten business days
30	of the c	hang	e of the location of the records or the change of the individual responsible for
31	mainter	ance	e of the records.

1	<u>13-</u>	3-13. Revocation of license - Suspension of license - Surrender of license.		
2	<u>1.</u>	The commissioner may issue upon any licensee an order suspending or revoking a		
3		licensee's license if the commissioner finds that:		
4		a. The licensee has failed to pay the annual license fee under this chapter or any		
5		examination fee imposed by the commissioner under the authority of this chapter.		
6		b. The licensee, either knowingly or without the exercise of due care to prevent the		
7		same, has violated any provision of this chapter or any regulation or order		
8		lawfully made pursuant to and within the authority of this chapter.		
9		c. Any fact or condition existing at the time of the original application for such		
10		license which clearly would have warranted the department of financial		
11		institutions in refusing originally to issue such license.		
12		d. The licensee has failed to maintain the required bond.		
13		e. The licensee has failed to maintain registration with the secretary of state if so		
14		required.		
15	<u>2.</u>	The order must contain a notice of opportunity for hearing pursuant to chapter 28-32.		
16	<u>3.</u>	If a hearing is not requested within twenty days of the date the order is served upon		
17		the licensee, the order is final. If a hearing is held and the commissioner finds that the		
18		record warrants, the commissioner may enter a final order. The final order is final		
19		suspending or revoking the license.		
20	<u>4.</u>	If the commissioner finds that probable cause for revocation of any license exists and		
21		that enforcement of the chapter requires immediate suspension of the license pending		
22		investigation, it may, upon issuance, enter an order suspending the license pending		
23		the holding of a hearing as prescribed in this chapter.		
24	<u>5.</u>	Any licensee may surrender its license, but surrender does not affect the licensee's		
25		civil or criminal liability for acts committed before the surrender.		
26	<u>13-</u>	3-14. Suspension and removal of residential mortgage loan servicer officers and		
27	<u>employ</u>	ees.		
28	<u>1.</u>	The commissioner of financial institutions may issue upon a current or former		
29		residential mortgage loan servicer officer or employee and upon the licensee involved		
30		an order stating:		

1		<u>a.</u>	The current or former officer or employee is engaging or has engaged in any of
2			the following conduct:
3			(1) Violating a law, rule, order, or written agreement with the commissioner.
4			(2) Engaging in harassment or abuse, the making of false or misleading
5			representations, or engaging in unfair practices involving servicing activity.
6			(3) Performing an act of commission or omission or practice which is a breach
7			of trust or a breach of fiduciary duty.
8		<u>b.</u>	The term of the suspension or removal from employment and participation within
9			the conduct or the affairs of a residential mortgage loan servicer.
