Minutes:

CHAIRMAN KEISER OPENED THE HEARING ON HB 1468; A BILL RELATING TO WIDTH AND LENGTH LIMITATIONS FOR TRUCK-MOUNTED HAYSTACK MOVING EQUIPMENT.

REPRESENTATIVE LUNDGREN, Dist. 28, introduced HB 1468. She said that it is a simple bill allowing more length at a 14 foot maximum width.

REP. WEISZ asked what truck mounted means.

REP. THORPE asked if longer and narrower is safer than what we presently have.

REP. LUNDGREN said that yes it is. Most accidents are caused by width rather than length.

LEANN WALD, North Dakota Highway Patrol, testified in opposition to HB 1468. She stated concerns of the Highway Patrol over the steer ability of such a vehicle. Safety is a problem as it may well impede the right of way. There is a chance of losing bails without knowledge of it on

the longer loads as well and the weight distribution will surely be a problem. Extending loads again has the tendency to overload the axle as well. There is no logic in making the trucks longer than they already are.

REP. LEMIEUX asked how many axles are on the trucks?

LEANN said five or six.

REP. LEMIEUX asked if you couldn't also put one ten foot trailer behind the other axle?

LEANN said you could but it would also impede driving and turning corners.

REP. GRUMBO questioned allowing these on the interstate system.

LEANN said no they wouldn't be able to because of the clearance in underpasses and such.

DOYLE SCHULZ, North Dakota Highway Patrol, also testified in opposition to HB 1468 on a specific note.. He said that the intent was to extend the load to 14 feet but the bill said that it extended the equipment instead.

CHAIRMAN KEISER CLOSED THE HEARING ON HB 1468.

Minutes:

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM opened the hearing on HB 1468. Committee members present included: Sens. Bob Stenehjem, R. Schobinger, D. Mutch, D. Cook, D. O'Connell, V. Thompson, and D. Bercier.

REPRESENTATIVE DOUG LEMIEUX, DISTRICT 9 testified in favor of HB 1468. This bill extends the length on truck mounted stack movers. The bill also limits the width if the length is extended to 65 feet. Some people feel that it would be safer to move hay if the mover was longer and not as wide. Right now at 56 feet there is no width limitation. The engrossed version allows 56 feet but at 65 feet you must maintain a 14 foot width.

SENATOR COOK Shouldn't there be a width limitation for 56 foot long truck?

REPRESENTATIVE LEMIEUX If they are three wide and six foot bales, it is a minimum of 18 feet wide. They can be up to 20 feet wide sometimes. There has been some concern that length would get excessively long. The design of the truck should be safer.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM The restrictions doesn't mean that there won't be a tractor cab of a different design and a trailer of a different design. Those differences may not be safe.

REPRESENTATIVE LEMIEUX This is a truck mounted stack mover. Senator Cook pointed out that narrowing up the load will make it safer. I contend that when you are in the business you design the equipment for the job and to the best of your capability.

RAY ZINK, DEPUTY DIRECTOR FOR ENGINEERING FOR DOT testified in opposition of HB 1468. This design is not legal in any surrounding states. It is used in a very limited basis in the state of Nebraska. A concern in Nebraska is the maximum width is 18 feet. We raise questions on whether this becomes a vehicle of husbandry. Under present law, there is no width and hay stack movers are defined under law as vehicles of husbandry. There is no need for this unit in ND. We are concerned with the overhang of the back when they turn.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM Currently, what would be the maximum width?

RAY ZINK Under current law, they can't be longer than 65 feet but there is no width limitations because they are vehicles of husbandry.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM If they can go to a longer length they are willing to give up the width in this bill.

RAY ZINK Yes. This bill does limit the length to 14 feet. It gets to be tough when you start measuring hay bales.

HOWARD LEMIEUX As a farmer, the width hauling bales 3 at a time is very difficult. I'm not sure one could handle a 65 foot truck.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM What's the normal semi-trailer length?

RAY ZINK 75-80 foot range.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM Could this be a one unit?

RAY ZINK It would be a single unit.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM We will close HB 1468.

SENATOR SCHOBINGER I motion for a Do Not Pass.

SENATOR COOK I second.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM I have no doubt that this truck can operate but the next truck with different configurations may handle differently. It is an awful long single unit.

SENATOR BERCIER Ray Zink said it's not legal in ND. I have a hard time envisioning a 65 foot piece of equipment.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM I thought we would have a tractor unit with a pivot but it is not. It is all one solid unit.

SENATOR O'CONNELL I don't have any trouble with it because of the license for doubles and triples, but there is no pivot.

The roll call was taken (6 Yeas, 1 Nay and 0 Absent and Not Voting).

Subject: House Bill 1468

I listened, with interest, when the House Transportation Committee was considering action on House Bill 1468.

It is my judgement that the committee believed North Dakota should allow 65 feet on haystack movers since both South Dakota and Montana allow this length. I have checked on this, and neither South Dakota nor Montana allows 65 feet. Present law allows 60 feet in South Dakota and 55 feet in Montana.

I suspect that the manufacturers want to get 65 feet in North Dakota and asked for this length in Montana and South Dakota "since North Dakota has allowed 65 feet."

The following information was compiled to answer further questions regarding HB 1468. Please note below what other states allow relative to the size of truck-mounted haystack movers.

The county sheriff issues permits for truck-mounted haystack movers. They issue very few permits. This type of equipment in not used a lot in Nebraska. Most hay hauled on truck-tractor semi-trailer combinations. They were unable to provide very little information regarding load movements with this type of equipment.

Minnesota recognizes this vehicle as an implement of husbandry. Truck-mounted haystack movers can only be used by farmers within 75 miles of their farm. This vehicle cannot be used to haul hay commercially.
