Minutes:

SENATOR NETHING: Opened the hearing on SB 2011; a BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the office of the securities commissioner.

SYVER VINJE: Director of Securities Commissioner (Interim Commissioner). Budget has large percentage increase from prior biennium. We are asking to have 2 investigative positions restored (3 exhibits). Vinje took office in January, and in March office initiated investigation and rescued \$2.6 million of investor funds from South Dakota which was fraudulently collected. Other major change: put \$70,000 into general fund to replace money that was spent out of Securities and Protection Fund; \$500,000 received in settlement from Prudential Securities for providing enhancements and technology and investor protection and education; \$45,000 went to new computers and other funds towards investment funding education. (tape 665)

SENATOR NETHING: These two investigators, are these two more other than those that are authorized or are these the same two?

SYVER VINJE: These are same two, they would replace the positions that were given away in 1993. Just returning staff to the level that it was a 1993.

SENATOR BOWMAN: Does the FBI and other organizations work on these when money is being transferred from one state to another, and does other law enforcement also help you because this seems like more of a law enforcement problem than your office problem? (tape 727)

SYVER VINJE: We are a law enforcement agency, we enforce the securities fraud. Criminal prosecution is referred to state's attorneys in the various counties and work in cooperation with them to development of those criminal cases. Expertise to do investigation is within the office.

SENATOR TALLACKSON: I noticed that you have fees that are charged but it doesn't show any income in your budget, do they go directly into general fund? (tape 865)

SYVER VINJE: Our income goes directly into the general fund. Revenues to be about \$8.4 million and in HB 1144 we have asked for some fee increases to bring us up to the averages in the region and also to provide for any additional money that we might spend through this budget.

SENATOR LINDAAS: What comprises that income?

SYVER VINJE: Fee for registration of small securities offerings, every mutual fund company in the country that sells mutual funds in North Dakota pays fees to the state for the privilege of doing business hear in lieu of other taxes, we also license broker dealers (\$50 each) to do business in North Dakota, and charge fees for those people who sell franchises in North Dakota. Fines and forfeitures as well, although that is a reasonably small part of the budget.

SENATOR LINDAAS: Do the fines and forfeitures also go into the income portion of your budget?

SYVER VINJE: They are also general fund revenues of the state.

SENATOR NETHING: Closed the hearing on SB 2011. (tape 1380)

We have assessed nearly \$500,000 in uncollected civil penalties against various out-of-state entities.

The probability of collection varies significantly from case to case, from poor to fairly good.
