Merl Paaverud: Interim Superintendent of the Historical Society of ND. See attached.

Representative Wentz: Question on the 1,394,844 that is the total recommendation funding, but is that total for the Lewis and Clark enhancements? Do you have a total of general fund dollars for the other adjustments.

Merl Paaverud: Yes to the first question and we have 150,00 in capital funds. On page 14 you will find a break down on the Lewis and Clark planning.

Greg Hennessy: (1835) Chairman of the Friends of Fort Union, Fort Buford. See attached.

Marvin Kaiser: (2586) Board Member for the State of inflation catch up as well as support Historical Society. This agency is in need. We know this interest is real and people are coming. John Yon Rueden: Vice President of the State Historical Society. We are one of 50 accredited museums by the American Association of Museums. Things need to be maintained and this is

expensive. ND has much history. We want to go forward in offense. Give us the tools and we'll finish the job.

Kristi Frieze: (3390) Executive Director of the Lewis and Clark Center in Washburn, ND. The State Historical Society helps us out a lot. With the construction going on they have come to help store our great collection. They are always there to help.

Representative Wald: (3610) Your general funds money is increasing 267,000, and a dramatic increase in federal funds from 1.4 to 5.2 million. Have those funds been appropriated in Washington?

Merl Paaverud: Yes, they have been appropriated. We just need your approval to go ahead and except that money.

Representative Wald: What is the nature of the special funds of 286,704. If we found the funds which is the number one.

Merl Paaverud: That would be the money for Williston that was raised in that area to provide the match for the key money. We always have and must start with operating. That is something we must have to keep the sights open, so we can do the rest of the capital improvements and development.

Representative Wald: What kind of a plan do you have to work together with Parks and Rec. and tourism? What kind of interaction do you have with these agencies to avoid duplication overlapping.

Merl Paaverud: State Parks has been a long time partner in providing the recreation part of the Historic tours throughout ND. Tourism is there to promote everything we do. I don't see much over lap but cooperation.

#### HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE ACTION ON HB1020.

Rep. Pam Gulleson: HB1020 is regarding the expenses of the State Historical Society and we have a set of amendments that .0101. The budget request includes a \$535,000 increase in general fund or 3.9% which is directed toward salaries and benefits, maintenance costs and equipment, and utilities of the historical sites. Included also is a \$168,000 reduction in operating expenses or 19.2% reduction in anticipation of reduction of federal funds for activities of state historical advisory board and the research relating to the development of the Ft. Buford interpretive center. The request includes a \$4.5 million increase in federal and special funds or 274% increase, all of which is directed toward capital improvements, including the Lewis and Clark Bicentenial related capital projects. These capital improvement projects include repairs at Ft. Totten buildings, a confluence interpretive center at Ft. Buford, and Ft. Abercrombic reconstruction.

Budget includes general fund dollars of \$1.3 million for initatives relating to the Lewis and Clark. They are requesting two new FTE's for librarian and a historic site supervisor, the sub committee recommends allowing one FTE for the librarian, put retaining the other dollars that would have been allocated toward the other FTE, which only was \$17,000, and it was not to be started until the end of the biennium. That person would not have been added on until the very end, and what we decided to do, is allow those dollars to stay in the budget and allow the historic society to use those dollars. They have a position for untilled architect that they have not been able to fill in some time, they just have not been getting any interest in the position, and the salary is a big part of that, so we decided to direct those dollars towards that effort hoping they could fill the architect position. The Lewis and Clark dollars are designated for interpretive signage, public programming and interpretation, and exhibit development and two capital projects which include the Ft. Clark roadway and parking lot improvements and a Ft. Clark Archeology work. And that basically decribes the amendments and I would move the amendments for HB1020. Seconded by Rep. Wentz.

Rep. Mike Timm: Any discussion on the amendments?

Rep. Jeff Delzer: Could you give us some enlightment on what the public programming and interpretation and exhibit development amount to?

Rep. Pam Gulleson: In dollars? Response was no. It surrounds the whole idea of developing these projects.

Rep. Rex Byerly: On the construction projects, can you explain the \$150,000 in general funds for Ft, Totten when none of the other projects have any general funds associated with them?

Rep. Pam Gulieson: I believe that was as they looked at their budget and made some of these repairs throughout determing which projects these will select to repair in the biennium, this was

one that they felt they had put off as long as they could. It includes a brick wall that is collapsing that they felt was a safety issue and without making the necessary repairs puts the whole building in jeopardy.

Rep. Rex Byerly: That quite doesn't answer my question, again, none of the rest of the projects required the infusion of any general fund dollars, the Ft. Abercrombie, Ft. Buford, the confluence, only Ft. Totten required general fund dollars and I guess that's my question is that if you take Ft. Abercrombie for instance, are these donated funds? Are they Federal dollars.

Rep. Pam Gulleson: In the case of most of those other projects they have received considerable local fund match dollars and federal dollars to support them, this Ft. Totten one is not a grant initative, this is just repairs that needed to be taken care of on that property.

**Shella, OMB:** The \$150,000 is a required match from the state, if we don't provide the \$150,000 we will not get the \$350,000. The \$350,000 comes from the federal government.

Rep. James Kerzman: I cannot support these amendments at this time, if we are under budget constraints that we are lead to believe are out there, my priority is human service needs, If we want fluff we do that when there is excess not when there is a shortage.

Rep. Mike Timm: Any other discussion? We were discussing the amendments. We have a motion to amend. All those in favor of adopting these amendments say AYE. Voice vote. Motion passed. Amendments are adopted.

Rep. Eliot Glassheim: Does anybody have any estimate on the possible economic benefits to the state of spending this \$1.4 million on Lewis and Clark, are there estimates, or in testimony did they give any estimates of what they anticipate of coming in from the Lewis and Clark initative.

Rep. Pam Gulleson: I can't answer that very clearly, they have went through that a number of times and when they brought the Lewis and Clark initiative, they visited about that, but I couldn't quote numbers.

Rep. Janet Wentz: Tourism is a growing industry in this state and it does bring in dollars, I can't give you a specific dollar amount, but we do know that it is one of the growing industries.

Rep. Bob Martinson: There aren't any actual statistics on how many visitors they expect for Lewis and Clark, but the one thing really nice about the historical budget and the park and rec budget is, that those projects are sorely needed, and they will be then in place for many years to come, the repairs and such. When we did a survey on the Lewis and Clark sites and some of these other places, they were really in disrepair and it would have been an embarrasement to have visitors, and they were an embarrasement to our local citzens that go to these sites, my goodness out at Double Ditch, you couldn't even find the place, there weren't any markings or anything, so these are things that are really needed anyway, for the Lewis and Clark bicentenial or not.

Rep. Mike Timm: Any other discussion? I need a motion to adopt the bill. Moved by Rep.

Senator Nething opened the hearing on HB 1020, State Historical Society.

Merl Paaverud, Interim Superintendent of the State Historical Society, gave an agency overview and explained the General Budget overview (testimony attached).

Senator Nething: Were the adjustments made in the House satisfactory to you?

Merl Paaverud: The Interpret Center for one FTE was left out, this does concern us.

Senator Tallackson: \$17,000 was cut; who picks up the balance for this position? Fort Buford?

Merl Paaverud: Local assistance.

<u>Dave Krabbenhoft</u>, OMB, The reason it is \$17,000, it was for a limited time only and the last six months.

<u>David Borlaus</u>, ND L & C BF, spoke in favor of the bill stating the State Historical Society has many partners. Fort Clark is Lewis & Clark's wake of the expedition and closely tied to 3

carried.

Affiliated Tribes. There has been public and private work as well for 1,000 square foot Fort Clark as well as the Interpret Center. Task for you support of this appropriation.

John VonRueden, Vice-president, State Historical Board, spoke as a Board member, a citizen and for all the volunteers across the state. 



#### Introduction

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Merl Paaverud and I am the Interim Superintendent of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. I am a native North Dakotan and have worked for the State of North Dakota for the past 17 years. It is my great pleasure to have this opportunity to visit with you about the efforts of the State Historical Society to manage North Dakota historical record and our responsibilities to the people to give us the opportunity to perform this important service.

#### **Agency Overview**

The State Historical Society of North Dakota was established in 1895 to serve the needs as a statewide repository and collector of historic sites, artifacts and information. We have dutifully followed our charge over the years to the point where we are now the lead entity for promoting state his very, historic preservation, and education. The agency is a mixture of professional and support staff with varied responsibilities for operating, managing, developing, and promoting various aspects of history. They are dedicated to providing quality services for North Dakota. The Society is responsible for the operation of the North Dakota Heritage Center, the Pembina State Museum, 56 state historic sites, the State Archives and Historical Research Library, and the North Dakota State Historic Preservation Office. We provide interpretive programming for visitor enjoyment and learning opportunities. Over 180 volunteers assist us in providing services to the public at the Heritage Center and state historic sites.

- Over 225,000 people visit our museums and historic sites each year.
- Nearly 6,000 students access the SEND Trunks (Suitcase Exhibits of North Dakota Programs).
- Nearly 25,000 people enjoy interpretive programs at our museums and historic sites.
- Museum staff provided reference services to the state's extensive artifact collection of over 50,000 artifacts and 1.5 million archeological items.
- The State Archives and Historical Research Library staff handled over 25,000 requests in the last two years from family history researchers, historians for use of the government records, manuscripts, oral historics, photographs, and other materials.
- The State Historic Preservation Office receives 30% state funding to match 70% from the federal government to operate a variety of historic preservation programs including:
  - The National Register of Historic Places.
  - Cultural Resource Site files for contractor use.
  - Maintenance of data bases for historic and archeological sites.
  - Administration of the Tax Credits for Rehabilitation and the North Dakota Renaissance Zone credit programs. Since 1978, the federal historic rehabilitation credit program has assisted in the creation of 1046 housing units in 58 projects totaling over \$60 million in North Dakota construction activity. The combined total investment for Renaissance Zone rehabilitation projects is \$1,320,200. (As municipalities receive approval for Renaissance Zones, historic rehabilitation projects are expected to dramatically increase in the next biennium.)

This biennium, we had the opportunity to visit with communities throughout North Dakota in what we called Community Conversations. These meetings were very important to identify and prioritize what our public was looking for in the way of services from the agency. Just recently this past October, November, and December, we visited the Indian Reservations in the state to ask for their input for services. There were many similar observations and requests to provide more services to the reservations. Two reservations expressed great interest in being involved with the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial celebration.

#### General Budget Overview

A number of new projects were started during the lest biennium including:

- Restoration of an 1870's era officers quarters located on Fort Totten State Historic Site. The building exterior was returned to its original appearance. The interior rooms of the building were restored and prepared for an adaptive use as a historic inn where visitors will be able to stay when they visit the site.
- Inter-agency cooperation was demonstrated when the North Dakota National Guard assisted the State Historical Society by removing an obsolete roadway at Fort Buford State Historic Site. The Guard also constructed a new access road and cull-de-sac at Double Ditch Indian Village State Historic Site.
- Conceptual architectural planning was completed for the proposed Confluence Area Interpretive Center near Fort Buford. This project will combine TEA-21 funding with federal funds and local match dollars. Planning and research also began to restore the field officers quarters on the site.
- Plans were also started for the restoration and development of Fort Abercrombie State Historic site. This involves the rebuilding of the 1930-40's log block house, palisades reconstruction, and restoring the original guardhouse on the site.
- A plan for standardized signage for state historic sites was developed and implemented.
- A structural assessment of the Chateau de Mores Interpretive Center was completed and the main water line for the Chimney Park in Medora was replaced.
- Restoration of the Camp Hancock State Historic Site officer's quarters exterior was completed.
- Fort Clark Trading Post State Historic Site entrance structure was installed, the 1930's era CCC shelter was repaired, and an archeological field school on the site was completed. Interpretive signage is now being developed from the information gathered during the field school program.
- Extraordinary repairs funding was used to replace five roofs on five buildings at Fort Totten and to repaint all buildings at Chateau de Mores State Historic Site.

#### Optional Adjustments - Operating

Optional adjustments or enhancements to the current society budget were recommended in the Executive Budget in the following areas:

#### Salaries and Wages:

- 1. \$58,122 Additional funding for temporary salaries to raise the hourly rate from the current \$5.15 to an average of \$6.00.
- 2. \$55,270 Additional funding for permanent salaries to provide equity adjustments for experienced staff below the mid-point of their range. These funds represent approximately 50% of the amount necessary to achieve full equity ased on current ranges.

#### **Operating Expenses:**

- 1. \$72,000 Additional funding to offset increased and on-going maintenance and utilities costs for the historic sites program.
- 2. \$20,000 Additional funding to maintain the ODIN computer library system which was implemented with support from the state library.

### **Equipment:**

1. \$113,500 - Additional funding for historic sites equipment. Upgrades for mowers, tractors, and other equipment that is in excess of ten years old.

### Optional Adjustments - Capital Improvements

The Agency executive budget contains recommendations for the following capital improvements at state historic sites totaling.

#### Capital Improvements:

1. \$2,598,160 - Additional authority to allow for the expenditure of federal and other funds for the construction of a Confluence Interpretive Center at the confluence of the Yellowstone and Missouri Rivers at Fort Buford State Historic Site.

- 2. \$945,000 Additional authority to allow for the expenditure of federal and other funds for the reconstruction of a barracks building at the Fort Buford State Historic Site.
- 3. \$500,000 Additional general funding of \$150,000 and federal authority for \$350,000 to allow for the stabilization of a section of building between buildings #11 and #12 and for the completion of renovation of building #4 at the Fort Totten State Historic Site.
- 4. \$480,000 Additional authority to allow for the expenditure of federal funds for the completion of phases I and II of the master plan for the Fort Abercrombie State Historic Site.
- 5. \$59,365 Additional general funding for extraordinary repairs at the state historic sites. Extraordinary repairs allow for the general upkeep and repair of the historic sites infrastructure. Current funding is equivalent to less than 2% of the building and infrastructure asset value. Current building inventory asset value is \$3,810,350 and infrastructure is valued at \$3,162,052.

#### Optional Adjustments - Lewis and Clark Enhancements

#### Lewis and Clark:

1. \$467,499 - Additional Lewis and Clark funding is recommended as outlined in the Lewis and Clark Planning Report prepared by the Lewis and Clark Advisory Committee dated July 2000. The total funding recommendation is \$1,394,844 and includes funding dedicated to Historic Sites infrastructure, exhibit development, public programming and operational enhancements.

• Providing access to information on cultural resources in the state to federal and state agencies, local governments, cultural resources contractors, scholarly researchers, private organizations and individuals through maintenance of cultural resources site files, manuscript collections, and the finding aids necessary for efficient retrieval of information.

#### 5. Historic Preservation Planing/Technical Information

• Providing technical information, on-site consultation, and liaison between federal government and private property owners utilizing federal investment tax-credits to rehabilitate significant historic buildings for commercial purposes.

#### 6. National Register of Historic Places Program

• Assisting federal and state agencies, local governments, private organizations and individuals in preparation of nominations to the Register.

#### 7. Certified Local Government Program

• Assisting county and municipal officials in certifying their governments to participate in the federal historic preservation program.

#### 8. <u>Historic Preservation Planing/On-site Inspections</u>

• Providing on-site inspections and written reports to property owners who have previously been awarded preservation grants to assist them in preserving historic properties.

#### 9. State Historic Sites Registry Program

• Assisting in preparation of nominations to the State Historic Sites Registry.














## PROPOSALS AND RECOMMENDATIONS


The two-hundredth anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition offers a continuing opportunity for North Dakota to commemorate its history, share its natural beauty, better understand its native peoples, and reinvest in all the resources along the trail.

The following proposals and recommendations illustrate how local private and public organizations as well as local, state, and federal government agencies are gearing up to identify, manage, use and market the state's Lewis and Clark Trail resources for the commemoration and in the years beyond.

#### STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF NORTH DAKOTA

The Society's approach to continued Lewis and Clark Bicentennial preparations is four-fold: improving historic site infrastructure, creating exhibits, developing public programming and interpretation, and making operating, seasonal, and maintenance enhancements. Following is a brief review of each area in consideration of the 2001-2003 and 2003-2005 biennia.





#### Sakakawea

Sakakawea has become a recognized name as part of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Although her name is known, only a few facts remain documenting her life and contributions to this voyage. When Lewis and Clark met Sakakawea in 1804 she was a young woman, about systeen years old, married to the fur trader Touscant Charbonneau. Sakakawea became a valuable member of the Corps of Discovery. when Lewis and Clark hired Charbonneau as an interpreter to accompany the expedition on their journey West

On April 7, 1805, carrying her infant son on her back, Sakakawea set out with the Lewis and Clark expedition, providing translation and contacts with the Showhone living west of the Mandan and Hidatsa Lewis acknowledged her importance in a journal entry, noting that she was "our only dependence for friendly negocition with the State Indians," Lewis was referring to the Shoshone, who had horses they hoped to acquire for the mountain portage. Her recognition of fundmarks in southwestern Montana encouraged the Corps as they made their way through uncharted territory, and Clark (calized that Sakakawea and her baby offered another important service. In an entry top October 15, 1805, he wrote "The sufe of Shabono JC harbonneau Jour interpreter we find reconsiles all the Indians as to our friendly intentions. A worsain with a party of men is a token of peace."

Sakakawea has been the subject of much debate, from the spelling of her name to the time and place of her death. According to Charbonneau, her Hidatsa name meant "Bird Woman," North Dakota adopted the anglicized spelling for easier pronunciation and call her "Nakakawea." Other common spellings are Saranwea and Sacagawea. Most scholars, relying on William Clark's writing and other evidence, beneve Sakakawea died at Fort Manuel in December 1812, on the Missouri Piver, just wouth of the border between With and South Dakota

# Sakakawea




Sakakawea lived with the Hidatsa people in an carthlodge village on the Knife River in North Dakota. She was about sixteen years old when Lewis and Clark arrived at her village in 1804. Sakakawea was married to French trader Toussaint Charbonneau. They traveled with the Lewis and Clark Expedition when Charbonneau was hired as an interpreter. Sakakawea carried her baby on the long journey to the Pacific Ocean and back to the Knife River. The journey took eighteen months. A bronze statue on the North Dakota capitol grounds is a tribute to Sakakawea and her son, Jean Baptiste.



Totten State Historic Site


Supervisor from 1983 to 1987.



Site Plan










Present day view of the Fort Clark locality during the geophysical surveys.


