

This legislation replaces the old boardinghouse definition with a more current assisted living definition similar to the definition the Department of Human Services uses when registering these facilities. Our department is responsible for licensing and inspecting these facilities. In the current biennium, these facilities are licensed as boardinghouses and pay a license fee similar to restaurants based on seating capacity. This legislation creates a new license category for assisted living facilities and sets that fee at \$75 which will generate slightly more revenue than the current fees paid by facilities. All other changes to this bill are housekeeping in nature and simply replace the term "boardinghouse" with a more appropriate term — "assisted living facility".

Madam Chair and members of the House Human Services Committee, I am Kenan Bullinger, director of the Division of Food and Lodging of the North Dakota Department of Health. The Division of Food and Lodging is primarily responsible for the licensing and inspection of various food and lodging establishments in North Dakota. I am here to testify in support of House Bill 1160.

The bill before you makes some important changes to Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code by bringing some new and more appropriate terminology to assisted living facilities licensed and inspected by the Department. During the last legislative session, the Department of Health was given the authority to license and inspect assisted living facilities. That authority was granted under Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code. It was felt that assisted living facilities met the definition of "boardinghouses," since they are facilities that provide lodging and meal accommodations to long-term boarders. In addition, our agency has the trained inspection staff to provide the annual inspections of those facilities.

Since the last legislative session, the Department of Health has continued to meet and serve on an Assisted Living Workgroup headed by the Department of Human Services. This workgroup is comprised of several industry representatives and various state agencies involved with assisted living facilities. One of the recommendations that came out of this workgroup since the last legislative session was to replace the term "boardinghouse" with the term "assisted living facility." The bill before you makes that change throughout Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code. In addition, a separate license category and fee were established for such facilities. The license fee is proposed at \$75 per year. We feel the proposed fee is justified since considerable time is spent during each visit conducting an inspection of the food service preparation area and ensuring that fire life safety provisions are maintained in the tenant living areas.

The Department of Health would appreciate your favorable response to House Bill 1160. I am happy to answer any questions the committee may have in relation to this bill.

Chairman Price and members of the House Human Services Committee. My name is Penni Weston and I am the Administrator of Edgewood Vista of Bismarck. Our facility has 58 assisted living apartments, 28 licensed basic care beds and a 14 bed Alzheimer's unit which was originally a pilot project and is now licensed as basic care.

I am here to offer testimony in support of HB 1160. While the original hope was that the boarding house license issued by the Health Department would solve the problems with long term care insurance companies that was not the case. There are several companies that did accept this license along with the registration of assisted living by the Department of Human Services; however, I have residents living in my facility who have tried without success to obtain consideration of their LTC policies using this rationale.

I believe that adding the terminology "assisted living" to the current statute will assist seniors in being able to at least be considered for benefits under their insurance policies. When I speak to claims analysts from insurance companies they find it unusual that North Dakota's assisted living does not have some type of license from the health department.

We have operated under the boarding house license for the past year and have found no problems in meeting these requirements for food and sanitation standards, fire safety standards and other health standards identified in this statute.

Thank you for your positive consideration of HB 1160 and I will answer any questions of the committee.

Chairperson Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee. my name is Penni Weston. I am the Administrator of Edgewood Vista in Bismarck which is has 58 assisted living apartments, 28 basic care beds and a .4 bed Alzheimer's unit.

I ask for your support for HB 1160 as it appears before you. During the last legislative session positive changes were made in relation to assisted living. The hope was that if assisted living facilities were licensed as boarding houses then Long Term Care insurance companies would recognize this option for consideration of benefits for those claimants who would meet the policy requirements. Even though this license addressed issues related to fire safety, food and sunitation safety as well as inspections for these processes, some companies would not consider facilities for benefit payments.

The use of the language of "boarding house" is an antiquated term and replacing it with "assisted living" reflects the current industry practice and standard, particularly in North Dakota. This bill continues to be important in that it allows for the inspection of food, sanitation and fire safety practices of the facility which many insurance companies require.

I also support the \$75 fee for licensing of assisted living under this section. This amount is reasonable and an anticipated business expense.

North Dakota Department of Health

Madam Chair and members of the Senate Human Services Committee, I am Kenan Bullinger, director of the Division of Food and Lodging of the North Dakota Department of Health. The Division of Food and Lodging is primarily responsible for the licensing and inspection of various food and lodging establishments in North Dakota. I am here to testify in support of House Bill 1160.

The bill before you makes some important changes to Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code by bringing some new and more appropriate terminology to assisted living facilities licensed and inspected by the Department of Health. During the last legislative session, the Department of Health was given the authority to license and inspect assisted living facilities. That authority was granted under Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code. It was felt that assisted living facilities met the definition of "boardinghouses," since they are facilities that provide lodging and meal accommodations to long-term boarders. In addition, our agency has the trained inspection staff to provide the annual inspections of those facilities.

Since the last legislative session, the Department of Health has continued to meet and serve on an assisted living workgroup headed by the Department of Human Services. This workgroup is composed of several industry representatives and various state agencies involved with assisted living facilities. One of the recommendations that came out of this workgroup since the last legislative session was to replace the term "boardinghouse" with the term "assisted living facility." The bill before you makes that change throughout Chapter 23-09 of the Century Code. In addition, a separate license category and fee were established for such facilities. The license fee is proposed at \$75 per year. We feel the proposed fee is justified since considerable time is spent during each visit conducting an inspection of the food service preparation area and ensuring that fire life safety provisions are maintained in the tenant living areas.

The Department of Health would appreciate your favorable response to House Bill 1160. I am happy to answer any questions the committee may have in relation to this bill.
