CHAIRMAN NICHOLAS: Committee Members, we will open on HB 1093. Representative Brandenburg, do you want to present your amendments?

REPRESENTATIVE BRANDENBURG: What the proposed amendment says is that on January 31. On the seventh day after Jan. 31 there should be a late fee of twenty five dollars. If that goes for 14 days that goes to fifty dollars. And if it goes top the 21st day the fee then goes to one hundred dollars. If is is 28 day late in February or 30 days late on other months it would cap out at two hundred fifty. That way if someone is late they now what the fines are. We are talking about the tonnage and fees and setting up fines mentioned earlier. The fines takes out the penalty.

REPRESENTATIVE ONSTAD: Do they have to send out a late notice every week.

REPRESENTATIVE BRANDENBURG. No we would not be sending out notices every week. That all they would get done is send out notices.

REPRESENTATIVE ONSTAD: Maybe the way you would be doing it you would be increasing the over all fees.

CHAIRMAN NICHOLAS: Are there any other questions from Rep. Brandenburg?

REPRESENTATIVE ONSTAD: It seems like the whole proposal. The reasoning for that was to put a little teeth into the whole thing. What we are accomplishing here is not what they are asking for.

Minutes:

Chairman Flakoll opened the hearing on HB 1093, a bill relating to the registration and licensing of pet food and commercial feed and inspection of commercial feed; and to provide a penalty. Senator Taylor was absent.

**Jeff Olson,** North Dakota Agriculture Department, testified in favor of the bill. (written testimony)

Senator Klein asked if payment is required only if the fee is more than \$10.

Mr. Olson said if the fee is less than \$10, the required payment would be \$10.

**Senator Klein** said if someone owes \$1, they must not be very large producers. That is a very large increase.

Mr. Olson said those that come in less than \$10 are specialty pet food processors. They are the higher end of the market and are higher priced. The inspection fee is 20 cents per ton of feed sold. You have to sell quite a bit of pet food to make a ton.

Senator Klein said the fiscal note shows a fiscal effect of \$7750 in fees and penalties.

Mr. Olson said that is a very liberal estimate.

**Senator Urlacher** asked when the penalty comes into effect. (meter 3333)

Mr. Olson said they send pre notices and the processors have 31 days to file their report. 90 - 95% comply. There is no penalty now. This is an incentive to get it in on time.

**Senator Urlacher** asked how the maximum penalty of \$250 was arrived at.

Mr. Olson said the \$250 maximum was amended on by the house. The Agriculture Department proposed 10% late charge. Representative Brandenburg preferred to put a cap at the upper end. The Agriculture Department has gone back and evaluated past late reports and has found they would never reach the \$250 level.

**Senator Flakoll** asked if moist pet food manufacturers ever complain about paying an inspection fee based on weight since their product has more water than dry foods.

**Mr. Olson** said they have not had any complaints.

**Senator Klein** asked if it wouldn't be just as easy not to file if the fee was less than \$10.

Mr. Olson said the Agriculture Department effort is the same, even if the fee is less than \$10.

**Senator Klein** said regardless of what amount they are producing, it is still the responsibility of the Agriculture Department to check on them.

Mr. Olson said yes.

**Senator Flakoll** asked what is involved with a pet food inspection.

Mr. Olson said they pull a random feed sample and purchase bags of pet foods and analyze to be sure the contents match the label. They do the same for livestock feeds, minerals and mixed feed.

Senator Flakoll asked if it is for domesticated pets.

Mr. Olson said its not bird feed, but rather dog food, cat food, lizard food and hamster feed.

Livestock feed is also included

Senator Klein asked if Purina is included or if that is covered by some federal guideline.

Mr. Olson said yes, they buy bags of Purina or other brands off the shelf. They send a sample to the Health Department lab to analyze for nutrient content. There are a handful of processors in North Dakota and they check those too.

Senator Urlacher asked if they check bulk livestock feeds.

**Mr. Olson** said yes they do, they sample blends, probe bags of soybean meal. They analyze feed for cattle, horses, pigs, sheep.

Senator Urlacher asked how often this is done.

Mr. Olson said the inspectors that check pesticides also do the feed and fertilizer inspections so if they are in an area with a pet food processor or feed mill, they will stop by when they are in the area.

Chairman Flakoll closed the hearing on HB 1093.

**Senator Seymour** moved a do pass on engrossed HB 1093.

Senator Erbele seconded the motion.

The motion passed on a roll call vote 5-0-1.

Senator Seymour will carry the bill.
