Minutes:

Chairman Pollert opened the hearing on HB 1159, a Bill for an Act to authorize construction of a state correctional facility and related land acquisition; to require development of a prison facility master site plan and to require reports to the legislative council; to authorize the sale of department of corrections and rehabilitation land and buildings; and to provide an appropriation. All division members present: Representatives Larry Bellew, Vice Chairman, James Kerzman, Ralph Metcalf, Mary Ekstrom, Jon Nelson, Gary Kreidt, and Alon Wieland.

Alon Wieland, Representative from the 14th District in West Fargo, introduced HB 1159.

(Copy of written testimony is attached) He gave the reasons with an explanation for proposing new construction: 1. Efficiency of operation, 2. Efficiency of utilities; 3. Safety, 4. Costs, 5. Life of the Facility, 6. Design, 7. and Morale.

Alon Wieland stated the new facility could be constructed at a cost of \$105,000,000 which did not include land. Questions and discussion as to the sale of MCRR.

Representative Ron Carisle, a sponsor, also testified regarding the plans. Questions and discussion regarding the POD design ... 80 acres of land on present site ... prisoner load centralized ... segregation of hard core prisoners ... more paroled earlier ... water and utilities.

Handouts of maps were given showing possible locations and state owned land.

Representative Dave Weiler, District 30, testified to the current land sites. This plan, he stated, would be to get rid of the MRCC. There is 9000 ft of river frontage and the appraisal value of \$9.5 million. Continued questions and discussion on current penitentiary appraised at \$5 or \$6 million ... infrastructure costs ... cost of demolishing and impact ... rating of efficiences (energy, employee, et cetera) - now existing at 3; remodeled cell house (40% new and 60% inefficient) - rate 6 overall. He stated that the present facility is a "dinosaur."

Questions and discussion on cost of renovations during the past 10 years ... bonded amount ... future of Rough Rider Industry to be enhanced

Representative Nottestad, of the 43rd District, testified in support of the bill. Refer: 53:00. He stated there are future needs at the MRCC ... security ...facility near residential area ... cafeteria ... costs of renovation. Questions about the moving of MRCC.

Representative Metcalf testified in support of the bill. Refer: 59:40. He spoke on the proper treatment of 23% of the inmates having addiction problems ... new prison can help.

Representative Grande, 41st District, testified in support. She stated drug rehabilitation was a very aspect in the prospect of a new prison. There would be savings with maintenance, safety, and remodeling costs.

Representative Al Carlson, of District 41, testified in support and gave his prospective.

Refer: 070:10 He stated the interim committee had met with the governor ... did look at bonding debt ... have to look at long term costs and analyze. Stated there were 3 options: 1. Remodel what you have; 2. Build new on new location; and 3. New facility on same grounds.

Representative Glassheim, District 18, testified in a neutral view. Concerned about 65 million differential with no additional beds.

Jeff Goodale, with HDR Architecture based in Omaha, NB and with his office being in Chicago, IL, testified. He answered questions regarding the proposal for the \$116 for a new facility, \$105 million estimate for the expansion and remodel of the existing facility. He stated key factors in determining costs would be: location of existing utilities and not knowing what shape of land would be. Questions and discussion regarding inflationary factor ... building prisons ... pre-cast systems ... limited construction season ... security ... use of prison labor. Chairman Pollert stated no action today but more detailing next week.

Bill provides a specific amount to site and construct a 950 correctional facility to replace the existing NDSP and MRCC. Directs the DOCR to sell the NDSP and MRCC property and to hire a expert to develop a master site plan.

This fiscal note addresses ONLY the projected costs to construct a new facility and does NOT attempt to estimate the cost of operating, staffing or maintaining a new facility.

Although this bill provides for a specific amount (\$60 million appropriated in 07-09; \$45 million in legislative intent in 09-11) to site and construct a 950 bed correctional facility to replace the existing NDSP and MRCC, it is the DOCR's position that the amount specified in HB1159 (\$105 million) is not adequate.

Recent information obtained from Ritterbush-Ellig-Hulsing / HDR Architecture, Inc. estimates the cost of 950 bed correctional facility, exclusive of land acquistion, to be \$116.3 million. This facility would be comparable in all areas (ie; bed space, security, medical, programming and treatment, industries, and auxillary services) to the "NDSP proposed building project complete" and the current MRCC.

The MRCC amount is per a 2/28/05 appraisal of the MRCC property completed by Dakota Appraisal and Consulting, LTD. The amount is based on 785 acres as-is market value (without riverbank stabilization easement)

The NDSP amount is per a 12/28/06 appraisal of the NDSP property completed by Dakota Appraisal and Consulting, LTD. The amount is based on 80 acres on only the underlying land's market value.

The NDSP demolition amount is an estimated amount per Ritterbush-Ellig-Hulsing / HDR Architecture, Inc.

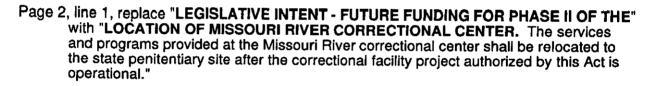

MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE. FOR THE RECORD, MY NAME IS ALON WEILAND, REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE 13TH DISTRICT IN WEST FARGO. I AM HERE TODAY TO INTRODUCE HB 1159, A BILL TO CONSTRUCT A NEW PENITIARY BUILDING OR COMPLEX.

FOLLOWING THE 59TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION, THE BUDGET COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS WAS ASKED TO DO A STUDY OF THE PERSON SYSTEM AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING THE FACILITIES HOUSING PRISONERS IN THE NORTH DAKOTA CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITAION SYSTEM. THE FINAL REPORT HAS BEEN FILED WITH LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AND I KNOW THAT YOU HAVE READ THE REPORT AND FAMILARIZED YOURSELF WITH THE FINDINGS THE MAJOR FINDING IN THE REPORT WAS TO RECOGNIZE THAT THE PENITANTIARY HAS SERIOUS PROBLEMS WITH THE PHSICAL PLANT AND IN AN 11-10 VOTE, RECOMMENDE TO REMODEL THE FACILITY WITH A PLAN ADOPTED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION AT AN ESTIMATED COST OF \$42,000,000. OTHER SOLUTIONS WERE DICUSSED

NEW FACILITY AS THE REMODEL PROPOSAL. HOWEVER, AN ESTIMATED COST HAS BEEN DEVELOPED WITH THE HELP OF THE DOCR ARCHITECT, AND IS AVAILABLE ON REQUEST.

THE REASONS FOR PROPOSING NEW CONSTRUCTION IS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. EFFICIENCY OF OPERATION: IT WAS ESTIMATED BY THE DOCR THAT
 3 CORRECTIONAL OFFICERS CAN BE SAVED EACH SHIFT. THIS IS
 ESTIMATED WITHOUT HAVING A BLUEPRINT. I BELIEVE IT COULD
 BE MORE. WITH THE HIGH TURNOVER, I BELIEVE THAT NO ONE
 WOULD LOSE THEIR JOB, AND EFFICIENCY OF OPERATION COULD
 BE IMPROVED IN OTHER WAYS.
- 2. EFFICIENCY OF UTILITIES: THE COST OF HEAT, ELECTRICAL, ETC.

 WOULD BE REDUCED: NOT JUST IN THE NEWLY REMODELED AREA,

 BUT IN THE ENTIRE FACILITY. WINDOWS WOULD BE AT A MINIMUM,

 AND OTHER COST SAVING IDEAS WOULD BE INCOPORATED. YOU

 MAY HEAR ABOUT A HEATING SOURCE THAT IS VERY EFFICIENT.
- 3. SAFETY: A NEW FACILITY HAS TO BE MUCH SAFER THAN A REMODELED FACILITY. THE DESIGN WOULD CERTAINLY INCOPORATE STATE OF THE ART COMMUNICATION, SECURITY CAMERA, LOCKS AND OTHER TYPES OF SAFETY ISSUES.
- 4. COSTS: WHEN REMODELING, OFTEN TIMES COSTS INCREASE.

 ELECTRICAL WIRES ARE FOUND THAT ARE SUBSTANDARD,

 SAGGING WALLS ARE FOUND, PLUMBING PROBLEMS ARE FOUND.

- THIS CAN INCREASE COSTS. WHEN THE REMODELING IS

 COMPLETED, AND THE \$42,000,00 IS SPENT, THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO

 NEW CONSTRUCTION IN THE FUTURE IS LOST. AND THE ENTIRE

 PRISON WILL BE REBUILT OVER TIME, AND PROBABLY AT A MUCH

 HIGH COST THAN IF CONSTRUCTED TODAY.
- 5. LIFE OF THE FACILITY: SOME OF THE CURRENT FACILITY IS 100
 YEARS OLD. WITH THE REMODELING, THE FACILITY IS ESTIMATED
 TO LAST UNTIL 2014. IN BETWEEN, OTHER MAINTENANCE ITEMS
 ARE ANTICIPATED TO BE REPAIRED OR REPLACED. IF PROJECTIONS
 SHOW THAT POPULATIONS ARE INCREASING, MORE ADDITIONS OR
 CHANGES WILL BE NEEDED. A NEW FACILITY, WITH A DESIGN TO
 ADD BEDS ONLY, COULD LAST UP TO ANOTHER 100 YEARS
 WITHOUT ADDITIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE CHANGES.
- 6. DESIGN: THE ARCHITECT HAS DESIGNED THE REMODELING
 PROJECT IN POD FORM. BUT THAT STILL LEAVES MUCH OF THE OLD
 FACILITY TO BE OF LINEAR OR OTHER DESIGN. POD DESIGNS
 ALLOW A FACILITY TO CLOSE DOWN A POD IF POPULATIONS GO
 DOWN, ADD TO THE FACILITY IF POPULATIONS INCREASE AND, ALL
 WITH OUT AFFECTING SAFETY, BUT MUCH EASIER TO DO. ALSO, A
 NEW FACILITY WOULD BE ON 1 FLOOR, WHICH AGAIN INCREASES
 SAFETY AND EFFICIENCY.
- 7. MORALE: I BELIEVE THAT A NEW FACILITY WOULD HAVE A
 DRAMMATIC EFFECT ON MORALE OF CORRECTIONS OFFICERS.

KNOWING THAT STAE OF THE ART SECURITY AND COMMUNICATIONS ARE PRESENT CREATES A CONFIDENCE IN THE ABILITY TO DO ONES JOB.

THE AGENCY ARCHITECT WAS GIVEN THE ASSIGNMENT, I BELIEVE, TO DO PLANS AND SPECS FOR THE REMODELING BECAUSE THE CURRENT COST IS CHEAPER, AND WOULD HAVE A BETTER CHANCE OF GETTING DONE. THE ORIGINAL ESTIMATES FOR REMODELING WERE \$38,000,000 FOR THE REMODELING, AND \$120,000,000 FOR A NEW 2,000 BED FACILITY. NOW THE ESTIMATES ARE \$41,000,000 FOR THE REMODELING AND \$116,000,000 FOR A NEW 950 BED FACILITY. I BELIEVE THAT A NEW FACILITY COULD BE CONSTRUCTED FOR \$105,000,000 AND THAT IS THE AMOUNT IN THE BILL. THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE LAND. HOWEVER, IT IS AN ESTIMATE, AND WHEN AND IF FINAL PLANS WERE TO BE PREPARED, IT MIGHT HAVE TO BE ADJUSTED AGAIN. IT WOULD BE A POD DESIGN WHICH ALLOWS FLEXIBILITY IN OPERATION, EXPANSION, REDUCTION, AND EFFICIENCY OF OPERATION.

THE LOCATION IS INTENDED TO BE OFF THE CURRENT SITE, BUT LOCATED IN THE BISMARCK-BURLEIGH COUNTY AREA, CLOSE TO BISMARCK. IT IS INTENDED TO INCLUDE MRCC, WHICH ALLOWS THE SALE OF THAT PROPERTY FOR RECOUPING SOME OF THE COSTS. THIS WILL BE DISCUSSED BY OTHERS. THE BILL INTENDS TO LEAVE IN OPERATION JRCC IN JAMESTOWN, THE WOMANS PRISON IN NEW ENGLAND, AND THE TREATMENT CENTER IN RUGBY. I HOPE WE CAN KEEP AN OPEN MIND ON

THIS BILL. YES, IT COSTS MORE NOW, BUT I BELIEVE IT WILL SAVE MONEY FOR THE PEOPLE OF NORTH DAKOTA IN THE LONG RUN, BOTH IN MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION. THE AGENCY ARCHITECT HAS STATED THAT OVER TIME, THE ENTIRE PENITENTIARY WILL BE REBUILT, SO IF WE REMODEL, THIS IS JUST THE START. SEVEN YEARS GOES BY FAST AND THEN, I BELIEVE, THAT THE NEXT PHASE OF THE REMODELING WILL BE SOUGHT.

- 11. Robert W. Henderson WMA 566 acres 6 miles east of Bismarck on Highway 10

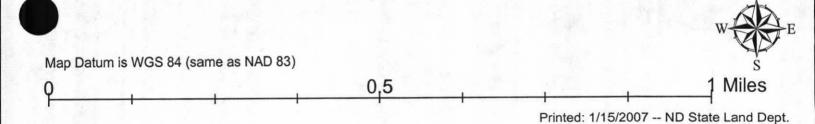

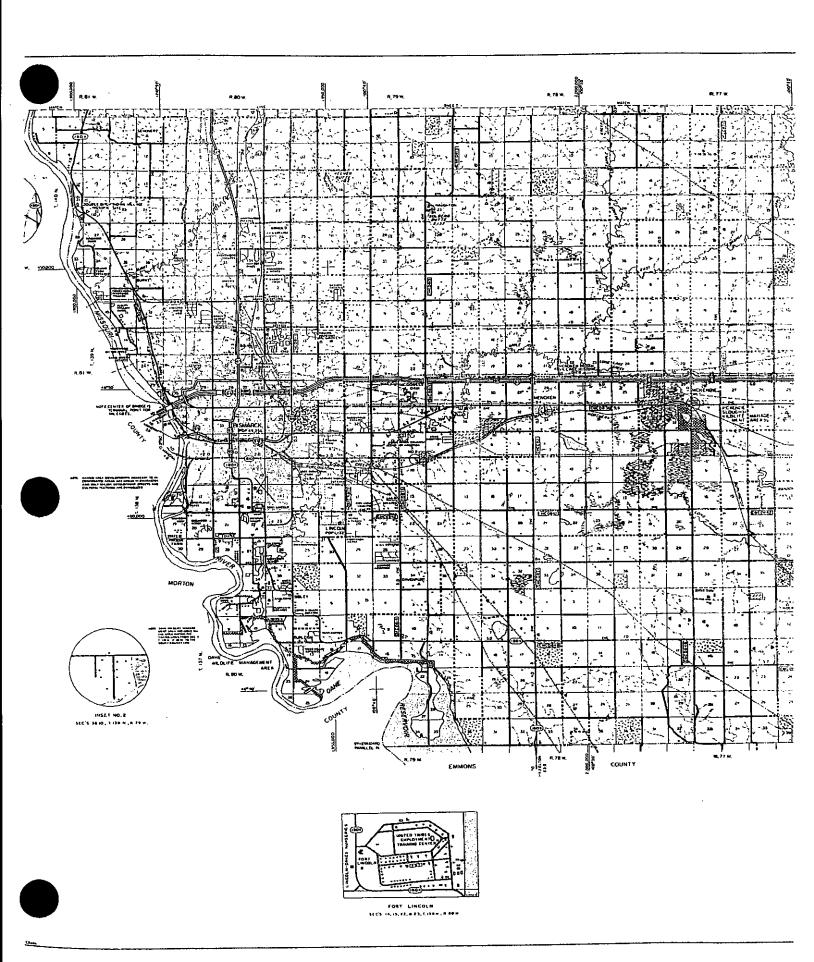

presented information regarding the authority used to provide an early retirement payment to the former director of the department. A copy of the information presented is on file in the Legislative Council office. Ms. Bertsch said NDCC Section 54-23.3-03 provides that the Governor shall set the salary of the director for the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and the early retirement payment for the former director was directed and authorized by the Governor. She said further statutory authority to provide the early retirement payment to the former director is provided for in Sections 54-52-27 and 54-52-29, which provide for the purchase of sick leave credits and employer service purchases.

In response to a question from Representative Carlson, Ms. Bertsch said the funds for the early retirement payment made to the former director of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation came from the department's 2005-07 biennium budget.

Representative Delzer said although there was legal authority for the early retirement payment made to the former director, it was not the intent of the 2005 Legislative Assembly that funds appropriated to the department for the 2005-07 biennium be used for that purpose.

Future Facility Needs

At the request of Chairman Carlson, Mr. Tim Schuetzle, Director, Prisons Division, Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, presented information regarding recommendations for future facility needs for the department, including the number and type of beds needed and the recommended locations. A copy of the information presented is on file in the Legislative Council office. Mr. Schuetzle said he believes the committee needs to concentrate on the following three main issues during its study of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and the future need for prison beds:

- What is the present value and expected usefulness of the existing physical plants versus constructing a new, all-encompassing prison to meet the future needs.
- Corrections is just one facet of the criminal justice system and in order to get control of incarceration costs to the state, the committee should be looking at the bigger picture. There could be changes made throughout the criminal justice system that would impact projected population growth and the need for future prison space. This committee needs to combine with members of both the executive and judicial branches of government to enact these changes.
- What is the cost benefit of privatizing corrections or building prisons as "economic development," considering the economies of scale, availability and cost of services, and the need

to maintain equity of services throughout the prison system.

Mr. Schuetzle said advantages of building a new 2,000-bed prison facility include:

- A new building design would be safer for both the inmates and the staff.
- Security staffing costs could likely be reduced due to new cellblock designs with improved site-lines.
- One facility for the entire state would have built-in economies of scale.
- A new facility would likely be more energyefficient.
- The department would save transportation costs that are currently incurred due to the need to deliver and move inmates between the existing facilities.
- Sale of the existing land would help defray the cost of construction.

Mr. Schuetzle said a disadvantage to building a new 2,000-bed facility for both male and female inmates of all security levels would be the initial cost of construction, which is estimated to be approximately \$119 million. He said another disadvantage with building a new facility is that the three existing prison facilities still have usefulness and value. He said the condition of the prison buildings was thoroughly analyzed during the 2001 study conducted by Security Response Technologies, Inc., and that Volume III of the report illustrates that the state has invested over \$31 million in new construction and renovation in all three prison facilities over 20 years. He said the report states that "Each of the facilities is generally in good condition and can expect to provide useful service for the next fifteen to thirty years with reasonable care and maintenance being provided."

Mr. Schuetzle said a disadvantage to renovating the existing facilities is that older buildings will require more maintenance costs than a new building. He said if the renovation option is chosen, the state should consider adding additional bed space to the existing facilities to meet the need presented by the growing number of inmates and the east cellhouse and the administrative building at the State Penitentiary need to be replaced. He said an architectural study was completed during the 2003-04 interim new 175-bed recommended а orientation/reception unit, a new 90-bed administrative segregation unit, the infirmary needs to be expanded and moved from the administrative building. and the east cellhouse should be demolished. He said this recommendation from the architect's study would cost approximately \$30 million and would increase the capacity at the State Penitentiary by 148 beds.

Mr. Schuetzle said his recommendations regarding the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility needs are:
