Chairman Weisz opened the hearing on HB 1362. All Representatives were present.

HB 1362 relates to out-of-state snowmobile registration fees.

**Arik Spencer**, Parks and Recreation Department, spoke in support of the bill. See written testimony.

Chairman Weisz: Is there an issue of enforcement or harassment of whether or not you have a permit.

**Spencer:** We don't anticipate that there will be any issues with this. This is similar to a fishing license. If you are stopped at a checkpoint, you just produce your paper permit and show to the officers at the checkpoint.

**Todd Thronson,** Trail Maintenance of Snowmobile North Dakota, spoke in support of the bill. See written testimony.

**Rep. Owens:** The title of the permit would be out of state, you don't think that is going to confuse some of the in-state as far as going on public land because the way I read it, it said we this to correct one confusion about being on public land vs. private land, so the out-of-state permit is not going to confuse basically our local citizens?

Thronson: From what I understand, out-of-state, that won't affect in-state snowmobilers.

**Rep. Thorpe:** In state riders will have a North Dakota license on the snowmobile, so the out-of-state people coming in, can buy the permit and wouldn't have to get a sticker put on their sled and anybody patrolling and wondering if they are legal or not, may not see a North Dakota registration.

**Thronson:** If you have an out-of-state license with you, you will more than likely get checked if there is law enforcement around.

There was no further support for the bill. There was no opposition to the bill.

**Senator Gary Lee** opened the hearing on HB 1362 relating to out-of-state snowmobile registration fees.

Representative Jon Nelson introduced HB 1362. This bill allows vendors to be involved in the sales of out-of-state snowmobile permits. At the present time, these permits are sold over the internet. Selling through vendors in addition to internet will allow more convenience for people coming into the state to be able to access the permits through vendors. The vendors will receive a small fee for providing this service.

**Doug Prchal**, Director of the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department appeared in support of HB 1362. His written testimony is enclosed.

**Senator Bakke** asked who monitored or checked people to see if they have this registration and are in compliance.

**Mr. Prchal** said that they do periodical checkpoints so that when the machines come through they are stopped and checked for insurance and registration. This monitoring would not complicate the system.

Senator Bakke asked what the penalty was if they don't have their permit.

Mr. Prchal replied that the penalty is fifteen dollars.

**Senator Potter** said in Line 6 "If a snowmobile is exempt from registration under subdivision b or c." who are those people being exempted?

**Mr. Prchal** said that private land owners or people snowmobiling on private land are exempted from permits. That is the reference you referred to in line 6.

**Senator Potter** asked if an out-of-state person is able to buy the permits on the ND Parks and Recreation web site or on the individual vendors' website.

Mr. Prchal said they will be able to purchase the permits on ND Parks and Recreation website and also for sale at private vendors for more convenience. It will work just like a fishing license.

Senator Potter asked how this would be marketed.

Mr. Prchal said we have already been in discussions on this and Snowmobilers have stepped up along with venders and we will work with them and do whatever other notices are necessary.

**Senator Lee** asked if he wanted to become a vendor, should he just contact your office and you will give him the training and materials he needs.

Mr. Prchal said that is correct.

Senator Lee asked how out-of-state snowmobilers know that they need a permit.

**Mr. Prchal** said that since they have implemented the program there has been advanced marketing out-of-state.

Mr. Chairman and members of the House Transportation Committee, my name is Todd Thronson and I am the Trail Maintenance Inspector for Snowmobile North Dakota which represents an association of snowmobile enthusiasts in North Dakota. I appear today in support of House Bill 1362 relating to registration for out-of-state snowmobiles.

Snowmobile North Dakota recommends a vote of Do Pass to ensure the out-of-state snowmobile pass is more widely available to welcomed visitors to North Dakota. By providing an administrative incentive to the seller, Snowmobile North Dakota and its members feel businesses will have more initiative to sell the passes. This in turn will make the passes become easier to purchase for out-of-state snowmobilers wanting to enjoy the great snowmobile trails our state has to offer.

Changing the name of the permit to the "out-of-state public trails and lands access permit" clarifies the permit is not needed for riding on private land, but is needed to ride on North Dakota's state trail system or in roadway right-of-ways which are frequently designated as part of a trail system.
- 2. Removing the need for a decal to be displayed on the snowmobile, allows riders to purchase the permit on-line and print out a paper permit similar to what is received when someone buys a fishing license on-line.
- 3. Allowing snowmobile dealers and other businesses (convenience stores) to sell the permit and keep \$1.00 for each permit sold to recover costs associated with selling the permit will remove obstacles out of state rides have encountered. Currently, sales of the permit are limited to state park facilities statewide.

This last provision will allow for local economies to benefit. Out of state riders who stop in local businesses for the permit will also purchase other goods or services The fiscal impact to the snowmobile trail fund from allowing businesses to keep \$1.00 is very small when compared to the increase in permit sales which will come from increased availability.

In closing, the proposed changes to section 39-24-04 of the century code are necessary to make the out-of-state permit easier to buy for those who come to our state on the spur of the moment due to the sporadic nature of snow fall throughout our region. # HB 1362 Summary

Senator David P. O'Connell

HB 1362 relates to out-of-state snowmobile registration fees.

If a snowmobile is exempt from registration under subdivision b or c of subsection 2, the owner is required to purchase an out-of-state public trails and lands access permit received upon payment of a fifteen dollar per year fee.

Dealers or other agents authorized by the director of the parks and recreation department who sell out-of-state public trails and lands access permits may retain one dollar of the fifteen dollar per year fee and the remainder of the fees collected under this subsection must be deposited in the state snowmobile fund.
