Rep. Porter: We will open the hearing on HB 1181.

Rep. Nathe: HB 1181 is a constituent bill, you will be hearing from the constituent who is well known to this committee. HB1181 lowers the age for applying for an antelope hunting license. I want to hand out the amendments to this bill. The bill was originally written in section 1 line 15-17, with the amendments we have stricken those out, the reason being because it relates solely to the youth hunting season. We are changing the bill so that the youth are able to apply for the antelope hunting season at the age of 12. That is basically what the amendments do. On the back page on page 2 lines 1-3 with the amendments it will read an individual who's twelfth Birthday occurs on or before the opening date of the antelope hunting season and younger than fourteen years old can apply for an antelope permit.

Rep. Porter: Are there any questions for Rep. Nathe?

Rep Hunskor: The bill is excellent, but we do face a season of deep snow. How does that fit in?

Rep. Nathe: We don't know if there will be an antelope hunting season this year. With or without a season this bill is still appropriate.

Ron Ness: I am a citizen from Bismarck. Antelope hunting is a great sport for kids. This bill does nothing more than let them into the lottery at age 12. They need to be drawn to get the tag. What you would do is find an area where there are doe kid tags. We stand in support of the bill.

Rep. Porter: Further testimony in support of HB 1181.

Mike Donahue: I am with the North Dakota Wildlife Federation. We concur with Rep. Nathe and the amendment he has proposed.

Rep. Porter: Further testimony in support.

Mike McEnroe: I represent the North Dakota Wildlife Society. The chapter supports HB 1181 as the proposed amendments provide that would 12 – 13 year olds to apply for the antelope season. Oil and gas development is expending outside the badlands habit where we don't find lots of antelope into the grasslands of Western North Dakota. (See attachment 1&2)

Rep. Porter: Further testimony in support of HB 1181?

Lester Ray Hager: I represent the Cass County Wildlife Club. We do support this HB1181 as amended.

Rep. Porter: Further testimony in support of HB 1181. Is there any opposition?

Roger Rostvet: I am deputy director of the North Dakota Game and Fish Department.

Rep Porter: A session or two ago Rep.Delzer had a bill that would change the law to if they turned the age during the season then they were legal to apply for a permit.

Roger Rostvet: The law right now is that you can apply for a license prior to the birthday if you are that age on the opening day. That would more than likely preclude the individuals that were up testifying because their birthdays aren't until into the season.

Rep. Porter: What would be the hang up of changing the date so that if the birthday is in that year they could apply?

Roger Rostvet: It wouldn't be an issue.

Rep. Anderson: Is the wildlife affected by the oil industry? Is it an issue?

Roger Rostvet: The wildlife is impacted. What the numbers are hard to gate.

Rep. Anderson: Are you watching that all?

Roger Rostvet: We survey areas and on an annual basis, there are also some studies going on up in those areas.

Rep. Nathe: In regards to the antelope herd, will we have a season this fall?

Roger Rostvet: we won't for sure until the middle of July.

Rep. Hunskor: Are antelope more susceptible to the snow and wildlife?

Roger Rostvet: Antelope are very susceptible to winter. Lots of times they migrate out of the state.

Chairman Lyson opened the hearing on HB 1181.

Representative Mike Nathe, District 30, introduced the bill.

Chairman Lyson: This would allow a 12 year old to use a high powered rifle?

Mike Nathe: Yes

Chairman Lyson: A rifle that can shoot 3400 ft/second and can kill up to three miles?

**Mike**: The youth will have gone through Hunter Safety and will be out there with their parents.

**Chairman Lyson**: Expressed concern that this is a weighty responsibility for a 12 year old and that not every parent is very attentive.

Senator Triplett: Have the sponsors of this bill consider maybe a lower-powered rifle?

Mike: That was not considered.

Ron Ness: Two years ago you passed legislation that allowed 12 year olds to hunt deer in North Dakota; you created a special season for them. You allowed 12 year olds to hunt with a high-powered rifle and it has been very successful. This bill would allow them to enter into the lottery. This would get youngsters interested in hunting before age 14 when they get interested in other things. What you did last session worked.

Chairman Lyson: Do we need a special season? Can't they just go with their parents?

Ron Ness: Not really, it is the difference between going to the game and being in the game.

Senator Bob Stenehjem, District 30, presented written testimony in favor of HB 1181. See Attachment #1. Hunting together is a great opportunity to build relationships between parents and youth.

Chairman Lyson again expressed concern that using a high powered rifle is a big responsibility for a 12 year old.

There was discussion about the merits of twelve year olds hunting.

Foster Ray Hager, representing Cass County Wildlife, stood in support of HB 1181.

There was more discussion about the merits of twelve year olds hunting.

Mike McEnroe, representing the ND Chapter of the Wildlife Society, spoke in support of HB 1181.

**Senator Triplett**: Would this be a good bill if you would limit the twelve year olds to carrying a shotgun?

**Mike**: No, hunting antelope with a shotgun would be almost impossible. You would be limited to using shotgun slugs which have an effective range of 50-75 yards. They would be extremely limited. Antelope hunting is out in the open country. A shotgun would not be adequate.

Mike Donahue, representing the ND Wildlife Federation, took a neutral position on HB 1181.

Roger Rostvet, Deputy Director of ND Game and Fish, was called back to the podium for a question.

Senator Triplett: Why did Game and Fish recommend the change from the original bill to what we have now?

Roger Rostvet: The Game and Fish had problems with it because if that law would have passed, the only people who would have gotten an antelope license would have been gratis landowners and youth. There are just not enough permits in most years to start having separate seasons. This was more of a consideration than fitting it into the schedule.

Senator Hogue: How many children participate in the youth deer and in the youth pheasant season?

Roger Rostvet: The youth pheasant season is tough to determine because there is no specific license or registration for that. The youth deer season generally has about 2000 per year. That is for the 14 and older. I could get back to you with the numbers on the 12 and 13 year olds for last year.



# TESTIMONY OF MIKE McENROE NORTH DAKOTA CHAPTER OF THE WILDLIFE SOCIETY ON HB 1181 HOUSE ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURES COMMITTEE JANUARY 21, 2011

Chairman Porter and members of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee:

My name is Mike McEnroe and I represent the North Dakota Chapter of The Wildlife Society. The Chapter is a professional organization made up of over 320 biologists, land managers, university educators, and law enforcement officers in the wildlife and natural resource field.

amended

The Chapter supports HB 1181 providing for 12 and 13-years old to apply for the State's pronghorn antelope season. A mentored one-on-one adult and youth hunting trip, in the open country that characterizes western North Dakota will be a safe hunting experience for a beginning hunter.

Our only caution is that following a third hard winter, and with the rapid expansion of energy development, on-going and proposed, it may be a while before the State has an antelope season similar to the ones of three to ten years ago. Oil and gas development is rapidly expanding outside of the typical "badlands" habitats, the breaks along the Little Missouri River, into the rolling grasslands of western North Dakota. This is more typical antelope country.

Energy development, while a boon to the State, comes with a high external cost. It very likely will result in lower wildlife populations and reduced hunting opportunities that are highly valued by our citizens.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on HB 1181. I will answer any questions the committee may have.





The Wildlife Society promotes a certification program for its members that constitute official recognition that qualified members meet professional, educational, experience, and ethical criteria to be a "Certified Wildlife Biologist."

# COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

Chapter work is carried out by committees that focus on natural resource issues.

Examples of committees include: the <u>Endangered Species</u> committee, which is composed of expert biologists who make recommendations on rare species and their conservation.

The <u>Wetlands</u> committee takes an active role in working to preserve wetlands in North Dakota.


The Alternative Energy committee is composed of Biofuels and Wind subcommittees and is engaged in keeping the emerging industry of alternative energy compatible with natural resources.

A variety of natural resource issues are addressed through the Chapter's <u>Missouri</u> River committee.

The Chapter's <u>Education</u> committee is involved in a wide range of activities that include writing and updating the

elementary text books PROJECT WILD, the Junior Duck Stamp contest, and a number of other publications concerning natural resource management.

Examples of other committees include: Legislative, Wildlife Commercialization, Western Lands, Invasive Species, Tribal Wildlife, Prairie Resources, and Professional Women in Natural Resources.

was founded in 1963 and has played an active role in North Dakota wildlife management since that time.


# **CHAPTER MEMBERSHIP**

Association with the Chapter provides opportunities to be informed and participate in resolving conservation issues. Each member or affiliate receives the Chapter Newsletter.

# **ORGANIZATION**

The Chapter is governed by an elected Executive Board composed of a President, President-elect, Past President, four Executive Board members, and an appointed Secretary-Treasurer.

A Field Representative for the Central Mountains and Plains Section of The Wildlife Society represents the Chapter on regional and national levels.

During legislative sessions, the Chapter employs a legislative liaison to provide expert testimony on Senate and House bills relating to natural resource issues, and where appropriate lobbies for bills that promote natural resource conservation.

# CHAPTER PROGRAMS, ACTIVITIES, AND SERVICES

An annual winter meeting is held for the membership to elect and install new officers, for hearing of committee reports and for the general business meeting. The meeting also features research and management presentations, panel discussions of timely issues, and poster



sessions. An annual fundraiser provides for social time and raises funds targeted for Chapter programs and activities. A formal banquet includes annual awards, recognition of achievements, and special speakers or entertainment.

# **AWARDS**

The chapter presents awards to recognize and commend outstanding achievement in wildlife related activities in North Dakota.

- -The NORTH DAKOTA AWARD is presented to an individual for outstanding contribution to the profession of wildlife management in North Dakota.
- -The NORTH DAKOTA HABITAT AWARD is presented to an individual or group that has made an outstanding contribution toward preserving and/or establishing high quality wildlife habitat on the lands of North Dakota.
- -The NORTH DAKOTA CASE-OF-THE-YEAR AWARD is presented annually to the person or persons primarily responsible for the conviction of persons guilty of a serious natural resource violation in the state.
- -Other awards may be given to individuals or groups that show outstanding achievements in wildlife-related fields.

# DAKOTA PRAIRIE LEGACY ENDOWMENT

#### TESTIMONY OF SEN. STENEHJEM FOR HB 1181

March 10, 2011

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee. For the record, I am Senator Bob Stenehjem from District 30 in Bismarck. I come before you today to voice support for House Bill 1181. HB 1181 will allow for youth antelope hunting to occur in the state. Currently, there is no such provision in state law that allows for youth to hunt antelope in North Dakota. This bill would permit our state's youth of at least twelve years to apply for an antelope permit, provided that they hunt while accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Hunting has long been a passionate subject to the people of North Dakota. This piece of legislation will promote this important recreational activity by allowing youth to become involved in antelope hunting at an early age. Getting our youth interested and engaged in such a time honored pastime is vital to the future of North Dakota's recreational hunting.

Not only will allowing our state's youth to participate in the hunting of antelope promote early involvement throughout our state, it also has the potential to strengthen the family ties that are so important to the people of North Dakota. By requiring youth hunters to be accompanied by parents or guardians, we are providing for the necessary supervision that is required for proper hunting safety while allowing our youth to spend quality time with family members while taking part in a special recreational activity.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, I urge your consideration of support for HB 1181. Supporting youth hunting will only result in a more experience, better engaged group of future hunters.
