The bill creates and enacts a new subsection relating to a fee for a nonresident landowner trapping license, and amends and reenacts a section relating to trapping by nonresidents who own land in North Dakota.

The proposed bill would allow a nonresident landowner or any member of the nonresident's family residing customarily with the nonresident, to purchase a nonresident landowner trapping license for \$100 to trap on the land the nonresident owns. The new license would require IT programming changes to the licensing system for the validation of land ownership.

Unknown. We do not know how many landowners will apply for this option.

Chair Unruh: Opened the public hearing.

Senator Kannianen, District 4 (0:27-2:30) Introduced the bill, please see attachment #1, attachment #2 is submitted testimony, and attachment #3 is proposed amendments.

Chair Unruh: The fee for non-resident landowner trapping license of \$100, does that match other fees?

Senator Kannianen: That could be a moving target. What we looked at as an example, Minnesota allows a similar license for \$84, plus they have to pay another \$75 for a small game license. In terms of what North Dakota fees are, it's in same ballpark, that's the example we picked.

Senator Roers: Is there any expectation that you would have a certain amount of acreage before you would qualify as a non-resident to buy a resident license?

Senator Kannianen: That's not specified in here, I don't know if someone else could answer what the requirement is for other game for gratis license for landowner I'm not sure.

Senator Roers: I believe for gratis license you have to have owner-control of 160 acres.

Senator Piepkorn: On page 2, line 3, a non-resident who owns land in North Dakota or any member of the non-resident's family residing with the non-resident, that language seems loose and open to wide interpretation, is that on purpose?

Senator Kannianen: That's the way it came from legislative council. My intent was just the landowner; I didn't ask them about that. If it needs to be firmed up, it can.

Senator Piepkorn: I'm not sure how I feel about it.

Rick Tischaef, Self (6:00) Frank Kartch contacted me by email in my capacity as President of the Fur Trappers Association, he resides in Minnesota, and asked us to support his efforts to change this non-resident landowner trapping license. I have experience with working with the non-resident trapping license issue here in North Dakota. What makes this specific is Minnesota, they are the only one that does not allow North Dakota residents to trap in Minnesota unless they own land there. There's a reciprocity issue. Minnesota residents can't come to North Dakota and trap under a non-resident license, because North Dakotans can't go there. With Minnesota, if you own land in Minnesota, we'll allow you to come trap there and trap on your own land, that's the basis for this. Why wouldn't we let them do the same here. In that sense, I'm in favor. I see no reason to create another special license, we have a non-resident reciprocal trap license available to everybody else in the country. We have the license in place for that individual to be required to purchase that license, just like everyone else does. We don't have to get into the weeds about the amount of land owned, just require that the non-resident reciprocal trapper license be available for purchase and leave it at that.

Senator Roers: Is this nonresident reciprocal license available at a discount or same rate?

Rick Tischaef: That non-resident reciprocal license is a basic \$350 flat fee. There is so much variation in other states, this is a flat fee.

Senator Roers: If this bill passes, what would the fee be then?

Rick Tischaef: I'm asking it to be a flat \$350 fee, just like a normal reciprocal trapping license.

No opposing testimony, no agency testimony.

Chair Unruh: Closed the hearing.

Testimony on SB 2260

Senator Jordan Kannianen - District 4

To Chair Unruh, Vice-chair Kreun, member of the committee.

The purpose of this bill is to allow nonresident landowners and members of their household to trap on land they own in North Dakota. It is a property rights bill, and it is also an attempt to allow nonresident landowners the ability to control the furbearer population on their own land.

While up against a deadline, I submitted the bill not quite par with my intentions. I am therefore submitting a proposed amendment to the committee with the request that it be adopted. The bill as stands simply allows nonresidents to trap on their land with no restrictions or license. The amendment would create a nonresident landowner trapping license that must be purchased at a fee of \$100. This would allow for Game & Fish to track the number of licenses and provide for those administrative costs. It would also prevent a free-for-all.

Attached is the testimony of Frankie Kartch, a nonresident who owns land in my District, and he goes into further detail on the issue.

Please move the amendment and then please give the amended bill a Do Pass Recommendation. Thank you.

Frankie Kartch Testimony on SB 2260

Madam Chairwoman and members of the Natural Resources Committee, thank you for taking the time to listen to me today. I am here in support of SB 2260. I am a nonresident, ND landowner currently living in MN (unfortunately) and that prevents me from trapping in ND. I have no problem with ND's ban on MN trappers or residents of states that do not offer reciprocity; that's not what I am testifying about.

The current ND regulation against MN residents trapping in ND also prevents MN residents from trapping their own land in ND. I cannot legally control furbearers on my property under current ND law. This is only because I am a MN resident.

I know some of ND's ban on MN residents trapping in ND is based on MN law banning all nonresident trapping. However, MN does allow nonresident landowners to trap their own land in MN. Similar to a ND gratis license.

This license cost \$84 and can be found on page 47 of the 2018-2019 MN Hunting and Trapping Regulations. It reads: "Nonresidents may trap only on land they own in Minnesota with nonresident trapping and small game licenses."

In talking with NDGF Dept. Chief Game Warden, Bob Timian, the following ND statute (20.1-03-07, para 2) bears scrutiny:

2. Trap, catch, attempt to catch, take, or kill any protected fur-bearing animal, except that nonresidents holding a valid nonresident fur-bearer and nongame hunting license may hunt only fox and coyote and except that residents of a state that allows North Dakota residents to trap within that state may purchase a nonresident reciprocal trapping license to trap in this state. However, a nonresident holding a valid nonresident reciprocal trapping license may not trap, catch, attempt to catch, take, or kill bobcats.

This statute offers some clear answers: That reciprocity is key to getting a nonresident furbearer trapping license. As mentioned above, MN allows nonresident landowners to trap their own land in MN. If I was a ND resident, I could legally trap my own land in MN with the appropriate, nonresident landowner trapping license. I believe there is already reciprocity for me to get a license to trap my own land in North Dakota based on MN's law allowing nonresidents to trap their own land in MN. North Dakota has just not created the appropriate nonresident landowner trapping license yet.

I am respectfully asking you to pass this bill amending the language that currently prohibits residents of MN who own land in North Dakota from trapping their own land in North Dakota. I highly doubt if there will be a significant increase in posted land or nonresident purchases of land because of what I am proposing. It may involve a new type of furbearers or trapping license but it does not open the floodgates to MN trappers. The vetting of MN or nonresident

landowners is easily done as they already do it for nonresident gratis deer hunting applications. Therefore, the impact to the NDGF Dept. is minimal.

A reciprocal trapping license for nonresident landowners from states that allow nonresident landowners to trap land they own in ND is not an unreasonable right. Currently, I have to rely on others to manage my property for predators, beaver damage, etc. This is very difficult to do. A nonresident trapping license to trap in ND is \$350 and you can trap statewide. A separate, less expensive license to trap my own land is not burdensome or unreasonable.

It seems ironic that I can apply for a nonresident gratis deer license every year, but I cannot trap a coyote or beaver or any other furbearer on my land. In talking to NDGF Dept. Chief Warden, Robert Timian, the only furbearer I can currently legally trap is a skunk. I would like to manage my land for all predators because I like to shoot ducks and grouse and deer. This benefits everyone. It also keeps rabies and other furbearing diseases in check. I can also legally shoot a coyote on my land with a furbearer license, but I cannot trap them. The absurdity of this escapes me.

In closing, newly-elected South Dakota Governor Kristi Noem floated a proposal to begin a bounty program on predators in her state. I am not advocating for a bounty but rather outlining the relevance of the issue; that predators should be controlled and landowners are the first initiator in completing that task. Your favorable support of this measure would be appreciated, and I would welcome any dialogue on this topic.

Senator Jordan Kannianen - District 4

To Chairman Porter, Vice-chair Damschen, committee members.

The purpose of this bill is to allow nonresident landowners and members of their household to trap on land they own in North Dakota.
