Good morning Chairman Ruby and members of the committee. I am Brad Schaffer, Director of Driver License for the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT).

I am here today on behalf of the NDDOT in opposition of House Bill 1406, a bill that removes the requirement of an applicant's social security number (SSN) on the operator's application.

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 383.153 requires the SSN be provided on the application for any applicant applying for a Commercial Learner's Permit or Commercial Driver's License.

In addition, the Real ID Act requires the applicant to provide physical proof of their SSN that contains their full SSN in order to be scanned to the database to remain in compliance.

All applicants SSN's are verified with the Social Security Online Verification (SSOLV) to ensure credentials are issued to the correct individuals. In the event of suspected fraud, applications may be used as evidence and the provided social security number may be used in the investigation.

Chairman Ruby and members of the Transportation Committee, I am Jim Fleming, Director of the Child Support Division of the Department of Human Services (Department). Due to the impact House Bill 1406 would have on the state's Child Support and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) programs, I ask for a "do not pass" recommendation on House Bill 1406.

Knowing a parent's social security number is very important to locating a parent who owes child support and his or her assets, and in taking child support enforcement actions without risk of mistaken identity. In recognition of this, as a condition of participating in the Child Support and TANF programs, federal law since 1996 has required states to have a number of laws to ensure effectiveness of the Child Support program, including use of a parent's social security number:

In order to satisfy section 654(20)(A) of this title, each State must have in effect laws requiring the use of the following procedures, consistent with this section and with regulations of the Secretary, to increase the effectiveness of the program which the State administers under this part: ...

(13) Recording of social security numbers in certain family matters

Procedures requiring that the social security number of--

- (A)** any applicant for a professional license, driver's license, occupational license, recreational license, or marriage license be recorded on the application;
- (B)** any individual who is subject to a divorce decree, support order, or paternity determination or acknowledgment be placed in the records relating to the matter; and

- (C) any individual who has died be placed in the records relating to the death and be recorded on the death certificate.

42 United States Code Section 666.

The fiscal note on this Bill reflects the very real impact this Bill would have on the services the State offers to low-income families. If this Bill is passed, the federal government will disallow North Dakota's state child support plan, rendering North Dakota ineligible for federal funds. Because having an approved child support plan is a condition of receiving TANF block grant funds, TANF funds are also at risk.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, many of us instinctively resist being told what to do by the federal government. But in this case, the State has a long history of carefully safeguarding social security numbers and using them carefully to help support North Dakota's families. We would ask for a "Do Not Pass" recommendation on House Bill 1406. This concludes my testimony, and I would be happy to answer any questions you may have.

The Office of Child Support Enforcement has learned that North Dakota's Legislature plans to introduce legislation to eliminate the state mandate that an applicant include a Social Security Number (SSN) on the application for an operator's license (driver's license).

Section 466(a)(13) of the Social Security Act requires all states to have in effect and use laws and procedures requiring that the SSN of any applicant for a professional license, driver's license, occupational license, recreational license, or marriage license be recorded on the application.

Since the inception of the Child Support Enforcement Program, certain laws and procedures have measurably increased the efficiency and effectiveness of some states' programs. To improve the nationwide child support effort, Congress required states to implement the particular laws and procedures responsible for the success of those state programs. The state plan provision at section 454(20) of the Act requires states to have in effect and use the laws and procedures specified in section 466 of the Act to improve the effectiveness of child support enforcement programs.

A state must also have an approved state IV-D plan in order to receive federal funding under title IV-D pursuant to section 455(a)(1)(A) of the Act. As stated in OCSE-AT-97-05, dated April 28, 1997, a state plan disapproval would result in immediate suspension of all federal payments for the state's child support program. For federal fiscal year (FFY) 2017, the federal share of expenditures for North Dakota's IV-D program, including incentive payments, was \$13,105,712.

In addition, section 402(a)(2) of the Act provides that the chief executive officer of a state must certify that the state will operate a child support program under an approved IV-D plan as a condition for eligibility for a Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant under title IV-A of the Act. Therefore, North Dakota should know that TANF funds might also be at risk. For FFY 2017, the TANF block grant to North Dakota was \$26,312,690.

The federal Office of Child Support Enforcement has offered states the following guidance on complying with this mandate:

We interpret the statutory language in section 466(a)(13) of the Act to require that States have procedures which require an individual to furnish any social security number that he or she may have. Section 466(a)(13) of the Act does not require that an individual have a social security number as a condition of receiving a license, etc. We would advise States to require persons who wish to apply for a license who do not have social security numbers to submit a sworn affidavit, under penalty of perjury, along with their application stating that they do not have a social security number.

Engrossed House Bill 1406 authorizes the affidavit option for applicants who do not have a social security number. The federal Office of Child Support Enforcement has confirmed to the Department that the current bill, if enacted, would satisfy federal law.
