Chairman Schaible and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in favor of SB 2141. I will be speaking specific to sections 1 through 5 on the bill, relating to scholarships, while my colleague Mr. Stan Schauer will be speaking on the other sections.

SB 2141 would remove the identification of a single vendor in North Dakota law and allow additional assessments to be used in order to meet the requirements of various scholarships, and expand opportunities for students.

I do want to speak quickly about section 5 of the bill, which references expanding the choice of testing options for students that graduated high school in 2009-2010 for the state scholarship. I believe that this section of code (15.1-21-02.7) could be repealed in its entirety, since it only applies to students that graduated in 2010, and their scholarship eligibility would be up anyways (must use the scholarship within 6 years of graduating from high school).

Chairman Schaible and Members of the Committee:

My name is Stanley Schauer, Director in the Office of Assessment with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in favor of SB 2141. I will be speaking specific to Sections 6 through 8 on the bill and the proposed amendment that include edits as well as two additional Sections, 9 and 10.

The Section 6 amendment, as I understand it, is essentially cleanup language with the removal of "shall" and addition of "may" found in Section 7 of the bill. Currently the ACT or WorkKeys assessments are not included in the list of assessments a parent directive would apply to. Removing the requirement to take the assessment also removes the need for it to be listed in the parent directive section of ND Century Code.

As mentioned above, section 7 removes the requirement for grade 11 students to take the ACT. In tandem with other sections of the bill, it also adds broadening language around which assessment may be taken. I do want to mention that each high school student still needs a summative assessment that is aligned to state content

and achievement standards. Schools can select the ACT or the NDSA and this is mandated by 15.1-21-08. This aligns with our State ESSA plan as well as federal and state accountability. With how things currently stand, if a school opted to use the NDSA to meet this requirement, an ACT was also mandated.

Section 8 also deals with summative assessment, but in relation to students pursuing a general educational development diploma. This section contains language that specified the ACT as the only summative assessment that may be taken as well as changed the responsibility of cost from the school district to the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The first edit of the proposed amendment deals with repealing 15.1-21-17, this area of NDCC refers to annually administered interim assessments in school districts. This change also relates to Sections 9 and 10. Section 9 is the actual repealing language and Section 10 refers to a study on interim assessment systems. The study would have collaboration between education stakeholders and the K12 Coordination Council. Benefits, cost, data standardization, compatibly with SLDS, and other aspects will be looked at from two different systems: local and statewide. Many innovations occurring in the assessment world revolve around interim assessments. I feel strongly about the purpose and use of interim assessments, and also feel that they are a great starting point to explore innovative and new ways to measure students and schools more effectively. The study and following implementations will hopefully

help strengthen this level of assessments in North Dakota. It is possible, after a plan is set forth, the language being repealed would be replaced. The two other changes brought forth in the proposed amendment removes the cost responsibility from the Superintendent of Public Instruction that are currently in Section 7 and Section 8 that deal with summative assessments.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide comment on Senate Bill 2141.

If passed, Senate Bill 2141 would cause certain students to be administered an alternate "equivalent nationally recognized standardized test" in grade 11, in place of the ACT or WorkKeys.

Empirical Data

While the ACT is not the sole standardized test used as a college entrance examination:

- The ACT is the only nationally recognized college entrance exam that has empiricallyderived college and career readiness benchmarks.
- The ACT is the only college entrance exam that provides a science score based on an actual science test. This ACT science score measures the skills college science instructors regard as critical for success in college level courses.
- The ACT is the only test to provide a predictive STEM score, which policy planners
 may aggregate and use to measure progress toward North Dakota STEM Network's
 goal to change and grow the state economy.
- The ACT is the only college entrance exam that has maintained a consistent score scale for decades, one that is recognized and valued by North Dakota students, parents, educators and postsecondary institutions.

In an ever-changing country, the ACT is a constant in student life and in student success: The consistency of North Dakota utilizing the ACT with all students has provided educators and policymakers with stable and reliable longitudinal data for many years, for all students and for specified subgroups of students. This consistency allows for clear and direct comparison among North Dakota districts and between the 17 other states that provide all public-school students with the ACT.

Workforce Success

The ACT is the only college entrance exam that provides an interest inventory to identify personally relevant career (educational and occupational) options, and predicts a student's success on WorkKeys assessments. The career readiness indicator is significant because success on WorkKeys assessments allows students to earn a National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC), which *Site Selection Magazine* identifies as one-third of the components that make up its workforce development rankings.



Not only do over 26,900 employers in the United States recognize the NCRC as a credential that certifies an applicant's ability to succeed, a 2018 study shows a correlation between NCRCs and higher wages. The NCRC that is earned from successful performance on the WorkKeys assessments stands alone as a nationally portable credential of foundational skills that leads to job attainment and higher rates of income security.

The stakes for students are high; the practical application an exam has on a student's future must be prioritized in any decision about assessments. Perhaps this is why North Dakota identified only the ACT and WorkKeys as the qualifying assessments for both the North Dakota Academic Scholarship and the Career and Technical Education Scholarship.

With the unprecedented challenges meeting the North Dakota students who are the class of 2020, 2021, and 2022 through 2029, the importance of ensuring that every child has a clear path to a successful college and career is clear. ACT helps educators create this path by providing a holistic and empirically based framework of college and career readiness to help ensure North Dakota students are prepared to achieve their dreams of education and career success after high school.

Please Vote No to SB 2141

For the aforementioned reasons, I write with strong concern about the unintended consequence of SB 2141 if enacted, which is to introduce the option of substitute examinations without regard for the advantages that North Dakota's students will forfeit as a result. For this reason, I ask that you vote "No" on SB 2141.



Good afternoon Chairman Owens and House Education Committee. For the record My name is Senator Don Schaible, District 31. I am here to day to introduce SB 2141.

What you will first notice in this bill is adding the phrase "or an equivalent nationally recognized standardized test approved by the state board of higher education anywhere the references the ACT test.

This is suggested because we does not think that we should list a single vendor in North Dakota law and allow additional assessments to be used in to meet the requirements of various scholarships and expand opportunities for students. Giving the state options to choose from the best product that is out or yet to come.

There are also several references to the WorkKeys assessments where we have added "or an equivalent score on a nationally recognized standardized test" which would be approved by the department of career and technical education. This wording was added for the same reasons as before.

Section 6 is talking about a Report that is required and ACT or WorkKeys are not included in the list of assessments a parent directive would apply, so having them listed on the report makes no sense and seems reasonable to remove them.

Section 7 removes the requirements for grade 11 students to take the ACT test. With language of other sections of this bill it also gives more flexibility on which assessment may be taken. I do need to mention that each high school student still needs a summative assessment that aligned to state content and achievement standards. Schools can select to use the ACT test or

the North Dakota State Assessment test. This aligns with our state's "Every Student Succeed Act" plan as well as federal and state accountability. Without the language in SB 2141 if a school would choose to use the ND State Assessment test to meet this requirement, an ACT would also be mandated at a cost to the state.

Section 8 gives our students pursuing a GED diploma the same choices of summative assessment choices as other students.

Section 9 removes the requirement for a state interim assessment. This however does not limit how school locally conduct interim assessment as they see fit.

Section 10 refers to study on interim assessment. This study would include education stakeholders and the K-12 Coordination Council. The benefits, cost, data standardization, compatibly with SLDS and other aspects will be looked at from two different systems- local and statewide. If we are going to use interim assessments, they should be targeted for a real purpose, provide data points the mean something and can produce valuable information for future planning.

Chairman Owens and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in favor of SB 2141. I will be speaking specific to sections 1 through 5 on the bill, relating to scholarships, while my colleague Mr. Stan Schauer will be speaking on the other sections.

SB 2141 would remove the identification of a single vendor in North Dakota law and allow additional assessments to be used in order to meet the requirements of various scholarships, and expand opportunities for students.

I do want to speak quickly about section 5 of the bill, which references expanding the choice of testing options for students that graduated high school in 2009-2010 for the state scholarship. I believe that this section of code (15.1-21-02.7) could be repealed in its entirety, since it only applies to students that graduated in 2010, and their scholarship eligibility would be up anyways (must use the scholarship within 6 years of graduating from high school).

- 7 in our state.

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- 8 In the amended version, the funding that provided for the ACT or Workkeys test (one or the other)
- 9 to be taken at no cost to the schools or families has been removed. This causes concern in the
- 10 field. Yesterday, I surveyed the ND Secondary School Principals to seek their input. In 24 hours,
- I heard from about 50% of the districts. Here were the general themes that resonated:
 - 63% of the principals shared concern about having the funding removed.
 - O Their chief concern was parents who may wish for their son or daughter to take the test, and if it is not the test the school uses for accountability through ESSA, the cost of the test would be shifted to either the school or the family.
 - Some families from lower socio-economic background cannot afford the additional cost of the test. This was large-in-part why the state began paying for it from the beginning.
 - The contract with ACT reduced the cost vs. the non-contracted price that schools and families would now pay. That contract also covered every student in ND ensuring home school and non-public school students had the opportunity to take it as well. That was not an additional cost rather it was part of the contract.
 - o Furthering that concern would be putting potential undue challenges on students based on affordability to compete for the state scholarship.
 - Choice Ready requirements in the state do indicate the need to perform on the ACT test.
 - Principals would prefer to have the contract in place with flexibility meaning that
 not all students would be "required" to take the test only those who wished to take
 it would need to take advantage of the ACT or Workkeys opportunity.
 - Regarding the interim assessment removal the majority of principals were not concerned about this. Furthermore, the majority would continue to do interim assessments.
- Again, NDCEL believes the language in this bill has some positive pieces. We would recommend a strong consideration of putting the funding back in place for the test, however. Thank you.

Chairman Owens and Members of the Committee:

My name is Stanley Schauer, Director in the Office of Assessment with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in favor of SB 2141. I will be speaking specific to Sections 6 through 8 on the bill and the proposed amendment that include edits as well as two additional Sections, 9 and 10.

The Section 6 amendment, as I understand it, is essentially cleanup language that corresponds with the removal of "shall" and addition of "may" found in Section 7 of the bill. Currently the ACT or WorkKeys assessments are not included in the list of assessments a parent directive would apply to. Removing the requirement to take the assessment also removes the need for it to be listed in the parent directive section of ND Century Code.

As mentioned above, section 7 removes the requirement for grade 11 students to take the ACT and the cost responsibility that was associated with the Superintendent of Public Instruction. It is worth noting that funding for the ACT was removed from HB 1013 (NDDPI budget bill). In the scenario that "may" was

changed back to "shall" without addressing cost responsibility, the cost would fall onto families, if local schools elected not to responsibility of the cost. In tandem with other sections of the bill, it also adds broadening language around which assessment may be taken. I do want to mention that each high school student still needs a summative assessment that is aligned to state content and achievement standards. Schools can select the ACT or the NDSA and this is mandated by 15.1-21-08. This aligns with our State ESSA plan as well as federal and state accountability. With how things currently stand, if a school opted to use the NDSA to meet this requirement, an ACT was also mandated. The listing of a specific vendor in NDCC hinders and impacts flexibility and contract negotiations.

Section 8 also deals with summative assessment, but in relation to students pursuing a general educational development diploma. This section contains language that specified the ACT as the only summative assessment that may be taken. I believe that this section could be repealed, if I understand correctly it is not mandating anything and essentially is saying that a GED earner "may" take a summative assessment like the ACT or equivalent. Language of cost responsibility is removed.

The first edit of the proposed amendment deals with repealing 15.1-21-17, this area of NDCC refers to annually administered interim assessments in school districts. This change also relates to Sections 9 and 10. Section 9 is the actual repealing

language and Section 10 references a study on interim assessment systems. The study would have collaboration between education stakeholders and the K12 Coordination Council. Benefits, cost, data standardization, compatibly with SLDS, and other aspects will be looked at from two different systems: local and statewide. Many innovations occurring in the assessment world revolve around interim assessments. I feel strongly about the purpose and use of interim assessments, and also feel that they are a great starting point to explore innovative and new ways to measure students and schools more effectively. The study and following implementations will hopefully help strengthen this level of assessments in North Dakota.

Lastly, it is worth noting that some unintended impacts on educational research efforts may occur. ACT results are often used in studies and research and it is possible that removing the requirement for all students to take the ACT or WorkKeys would reduce the robustness of the data set. It is possible the level of confidence, which is currently relatively high, would be reduced. Research and studies would not be totally hindered, but possibly would need to be revised. There is a steady increase in the trend of schools electing to use the ACT for high school accountability, this would help counteract any loss in confidence or robustness effects. We anticipate there will be approximately 66% of juniors who will be using the ACT in this manner in 2021.

Chairman Owens and members of the committee, my name is Tracy Friesen, Academic Advancement Coordinator at Light of Christ Catholic Schools and I am speaking to you on behalf of the State Association of Nonpublic Schools. We are in opposition of the original bill but in support of the amendment Representative Heinert has introduced.

The amendment before you is about giving equity in the options. Public schools have the option to have the ACT funded for juniors if they opt to use this as an accountability measure. In the current year, 66.58% have used the ACT. The current bills unintentionally excludes private schools, homeschools, and BIA schools. The presented amendment would maintain the status quo current access to all students taking the ACT.

This option should be equitably available to all juniors in the state of North Dakota to promote college and career readiness and state scholarship opportunities.

Removing a state funded ACT test for a specific class of high school juniors who attend private schools, homeschools, or BIA schools is unfair and puts a burden on some parents and not on others in the public system.

Ultimately, equity for readiness opportunities post high school is what is being sought for ALL students in North Dakota.

This amendment, if adopted, will continue to preserve the status quo. The State Association of Nonpublic Schools supports Representative Heinert's amended version.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide comment on Senate Bill 2141 and for the opportunity to serve the students and educators of North Dakota.

Flexibility in your ability to provide North Dakota with the best tools to support their growth and achievement is important. While ACT recognizes the importance of this flexibility, I would like to provide an overview of what makes the ACT distinct from other standardized exams.

- The ACT is the only nationally recognized college entrance exam that has empiricallyderived college and career readiness benchmarks. These benchmarks not only predict a student's ability to succeed in college, but allow educators to align curricula to address gaps that are identified through testing data.
- The ACT is the only college entrance exam that provides a science score based on an actual science test. This ACT science score measures the skills college science instructors regard as critical for success in college level courses.
- The ACT is the only test to provide a predictive STEM score, which policy planners may aggregate and use to measure progress toward North Dakota STEM Network's goal to change and grow the state economy.

The ACT is the only college entrance exam that provides an interest inventory to identify personally relevant career (educational and occupational) options, and predicts a student's success on WorkKeys assessments. The career readiness indicator is significant because success on WorkKeys assessments allows students to earn a National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC), which *Site Selection Magazine* identifies as one-third of the components that make up its workforce development rankings.
