# Testimony of Garrison Diversion Conservancy District HB 1218 NAWS Authority House Energy and Natural Resources Committee Bismarck, North Dakota – January 19, 2023

Representative Porter and members of the Energy and Natural Resources

Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 1218, the creation of a Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) authority. I am Merri Mooridian, Administrative Officer for the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District.

As a supporter of the NAWS project, Garrison Diversion also supports the creation of a NAWS authority.

Garrison Diversion operates the Snake Creek Pumping Plant out of which the water intake for the NAWS project is located. Therefore, our involvement with NAWS will be ongoing. Garrison Diversion has always maintained a seat on the NAWS advisory board, but will not be receiving water from NAWS; therefore, we support the proposal for a representative of Garrison Diversion to serve as a nonvoting member of the NAWS advisory board.

# Testimony HB 1218—Department of Water Resources House Energy and Natural Resources Representative Todd Porter, Chairman January 19, 2023

Chairman Porter, and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee—I am Andrea Travnicek, the Director of the Department of Water Resources and the Secretary to the State Water Commission. I am here today to provide testimony in support of HB 1218.

The Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) project's purpose is to address long-standing water supply and poor water quality problems in northern North Dakota by delivering high quality Missouri River water to the region. NAWS was authorized by the Garrison Diversion Reformulation Act of 1986 and the Dakota Water Resources Act of 2000. Construction of NAWS began in April 2002, with a main line and associated features being built between the City of Minot and Lake Sakakawea. Later in 2002, lawsuits were initiated, delaying the project for years. After 17 years of litigation, the construction of NAWS started again in 2019. Currently, with various projects under construction that will move water from Lake Sakakawea to the City of Minot by Fall of 2024, there is a need to update and modernize the project's oversight.

In 1991, the 52<sup>nd</sup> Legislative Assembly passed N.D.C.C. ch. 61-24.6 creating the NAWS Advisory Committee and gave the State Water Commission (SWC) the authority to construct, operate, and manage the project. In 2021, the 67<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly passed HB 1063 that modified the Advisory Committee and refined the project area. The NAWS project area was modified to only include areas to be served by the project as it is currently envisioned. The initial project area included a ten-county area; however, some of the areas were eliminated as other water systems have begun to serve those areas since the authorizing legislation was passed. Representatives from the City of Williston and the Three Affiliated Tribes were removed, as neither entity will receive water from the project. The

representatives from the rural water districts, county water resource districts, and municipalities in the service area outside of Minot were also modified to remove Williams, Divide, and Mountrail Counties. Currently, the NAWS Advisory Committee consists of one person representing each of the following: Minot, water resource districts, SWC, Turtle Mountain, rural water, other municipal, Garrison Diversion Conservancy District, and an at-large member.

This Bill, HB 1218, would further adjust the make-up of the Committee and elevate the Advisory Committee to an Authority. The other larger regional water projects across the state, such as Western Area Water Supply, Southwest Pipeline Project, and Red River Valley Water Supply project, all have Authorities that assist with project oversight. This would put the NAWS project in line with the other regional water systems.

HB 1218 proposes to have four representatives from Minot recommended by the Minot City Council, one of whom shall represent North Prairie Regional Water District; one representative of All Seasons Water Users District, recommended by the All Seasons board of directors; one representative of the Upper Souris Water District, recommended by the Upper Souris board of directors; two representatives of cities other than the city of Minot with direct water service from NAWS; one representative from the SWC; one representative from the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District as a nonvoting member; and one representative of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians as a nonvoting member. Please see the last page of this testimony for a table outlining the previous and proposed changes. This proposed make-up provides equitable representation of all user groups.

The Department would like to suggest an amendment to page 1 line 12 replacing "<u>rural</u>" with "<u>regional</u>" to accurately reflect the name of the water district North Prairie Regional Water District.

The bill also provides length of terms for serving on the Authority, the role of the State Water Commission, and the Department of Water Resources providing staffing and support. The State Water Commission and the Department of Water Resources have worked with the member entities and the NAWS Advisory Committee to develop HB 1218.

#### **HB 1218**

Good afternoon, Chairman Porter and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources Committee. My name is Dan Jonasson and I am the Director of Public Works for the City of Minot.

Minot is in favor of the creation of the NAWS Authority to oversee the general operations and oversight of the NAWS system.

As you may be aware, NAWS is a complicated system with many different facets that need to be coordinated and maintained.

First, there is a biota treatment facility, with a federal interest in the construction and operations. Second, there is a municipal water plant in Minot that is owned and operated by the city of Minot. Finally, there are numerous tanks, pipelines and storage structures, which were constructed with Federal, State and Minot funds.

We feel the development of the NAWS authority is a great step forward in having an entity to coordinate and provide oversight in the operation and maintenance of these numerous facilities and capital investments.

We are, however, concerned with the proposed makeup of the authority proposed in HB 1218 and feel there needs to be more discussion and input toward the exact makeup of the NAWS authority board members. There doesn't seem to be a coordinated effort here to assure that all interests in the NAWS system are fairly represented.

Lets start with the City of Minot, who is the major user of the NAWS system water, with over 80% of the usage. Minot has provided the local cost share of 35% for the NAWS system. As a result, we think Minot should be allowed more than 3 seats(which is only 33% representation) on this authority Again, Minot is the major user at 80%+.

We agree there should be a seat provided for North Prairie, who currently purchases water through us from NAWS. However, it does not seem fair that Minot should give up one seat to provide this.

We request a more representative makeup on this authority, based on total water usage. As it sits now, the rural water systems are all equally represented, and each have a seat on the board or authority, but other areas of the NAWS system such as Bottineau, Kenmare, Berthold, Mohall and Burlington are asked to share two seats to represent them.

In closing, we ask, as I stated earlier that the makeup of this board be reviewed and a fair representation, based on usage be considered.

I have included with my testimony, an exhibit from our interim water supply agreement between the State DWR and Minot for reference as to the approximate daily max usage. This exhibit was created by DWR staff and is has been modified to include Minot's approx. max daily usage and the percentage of water usage is added for information.


Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 1218, the creation of a Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) authority. I am Kenny Rogers, a long-time supporter of the NAWS Project and I have some thoughts on what I would like to see in HB1218:

- 1. The NAWS project would be owned by the state of North Dakota
- 2. The NAWS authority would consist of 3 representatives from the City of Minot, 1 representative each from the rural water districts of ASWUD, North Prairie Rural Water District and the Upper Souris Rural Water District, 1 representative from the ND Department of Water Resources and 2 representatives from the other towns served by NAWS. Two non-voting members; 1 from Garrison Diversion and 1 from the Turtle Mountain Tribe. Meetings shall take place monthly.
- 3. The NAWS Project will be operated and maintained by the City of Minot with the managers of the 3 rural water systems (a team approach). After completion of the project, the engineering services will be provided under the city of Minot and the 3 rural water systems. If NAWS is expanded in the future, it would include engineering services from the ND Department of Water Resources.

4. A REM fund will be established between the ND Department of Water Resources and the NAWS authority.

I believe this would be the most effective operating system to provide the NAWS customers with the most efficient system and the most economical water rates.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee:

Thank you for your service to the citizens of North Dakota and the opportunity to offer comments on HB1218. I am *generally* in favor of this bill, but only because I rully recognize the need for an authority to oversee the NAWS system and the inclusion of the Department of Water Resources to make sure we all get along in the sandbox.

Let's be frank, there are competing interests on this Authority. City versus rural. Who and how many votes each entity will receive if this bill passes has been determined solely by the amount of water historically consumed. That is a quick and easy way to do it, but is it equitable? Just because someone uses more of a resource does not necessarily mean they should control it at the expense of the rest. We all have to be on the same team.

A few weeks ago, I attended the 59th Annual Joint North Dakota Water Convention & Irrigation Workshop right here in Bismarck. If I learned anything at all, it was that we North Dakotans absolutely must prioritize our water usage toward the production of food. There are no ifs, ands, or buts about it. Every other story in the news is about the shortage of water across the U.S. and the world. We cannot lose sight of the importance water holds for the people in the rural regions - the true economic backbone of the State, and the people who grow our food.

It has been said that if we had to ration water during a drought, farmers would not be allowed to spray their crops. To which someone wisely replied, "I'd rather eat than bathe."

Deciding who sits on this Authority should not be based solely on water usage, but on the economic impact the rural regions have in our overall economy. If we forget to prioritize the production of food, and allow those who dwell in the cities to determine who gets water and who does not, we might all go hungry.

I guess that will put us on the same team after all.

Thank you for listening to my testimony. Again, I appreciate your service to the people of the State of North Dakota and wish you Godspeed on your decision-making responsibilities.

# Testimony HB 1218—Department of Water Resources Senate Energy and Natural Resources Senator Dale Patten, Chairman March 2, 2023

Chairman Patten, and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee—I am Andrea Travnicek, the Director of the Department of Water Resources and the Secretary to the State Water Commission. I am here today to provide testimony in support of HB 1218.

The Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) project's purpose is to address long-standing water supply and poor water quality problems in northern North Dakota by delivering high quality Missouri River water to the region. NAWS was authorized by the Garrison Diversion Reformulation Act of 1986 and the Dakota Water Resources Act of 2000. Construction of NAWS began in April 2002, with a main line and associated features being built between the City of Minot and Lake Sakakawea. Later in 2002, lawsuits were initiated, delaying the project for years. After 17 years of litigation, the construction of NAWS started again in 2019. Currently, with various projects under construction that will move water from Lake Sakakawea to the City of Minot by Fall of 2024, there is a need to update and modernize the project's oversight.

In 1991, the 52<sup>nd</sup> Legislative Assembly passed N.D.C.C. ch. 61-24.6 creating the NAWS Advisory Committee and gave the State Water Commission (SWC) the authority to construct, operate, and manage the project. In 2021, the 67<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly passed HB 1063 that modified the Advisory Committee and refined the project area. The NAWS project area was modified to only include areas to be served by the project as it is currently envisioned. The initial project area included a ten-county area; however, some of the areas were eliminated as other water systems have begun to serve those areas since the authorizing legislation was passed. Representatives from the City of Williston and the Three Affiliated Tribes were removed, as neither entity will receive water from the project. The

representatives from the rural water districts, county water resource districts, and municipalities in the service area outside of Minot were also modified to remove Williams, Divide, and Mountrail Counties. Currently, the NAWS Advisory Committee consists of one person representing each of the following: Minot, water resource districts, SWC, Turtle Mountain, rural water, other municipal, Garrison Diversion Conservancy District, and an at-large member.

Engrossed HB 1218, would further adjust the make-up of the Committee and elevate the Advisory Committee to an Authority. The other larger regional water projects across the state, such as Western Area Water Supply, Southwest Pipeline Project, and Red River Valley Water Supply project, all have Authorities that assist with project oversight. This would put the NAWS project in line with the other regional water systems.


Engrossed HB 1218 proposes to have four representatives from Minot recommended by the Minot City Council; one representative of North Prairie Regional Water District; one representative of All Seasons Water Users District, recommended by the All Seasons board of directors; one representative of the Upper Souris Water District, recommended by the Upper Souris board of directors; one representative of cities other than the city of Minot with direct water service from NAWS; one representative from the SWC who lives in the Souris River basin; one representative from the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District as a nonvoting member; and one representative of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians as a nonvoting member. Please see the last page of this testimony for a table outlining the previous and proposed changes. This proposed make-up provides equitable representation of all user groups.

The bill also provides length of terms for serving on the Authority, the role of the State Water Commission, and the Department of Water Resources providing staffing and support. The State Water Commission and the Department of Water Resources

have worked with the member entities and the NAWS Advisory Committee to develop HB 1218.

Our vision is to ensure all of North Dakota has access to affordable, ample, and quality water. NDRWSA is committed to completing and maintaining North Dakota's water infrastructure for economic growth and quality of life. Today, I am submitting testimony in support of House Bill 1218, the creation of the Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) authority. Shifting the NAWS Advisory Committee to an Authority is the next logical step as the project further develops. Below are a couple of suggestions to clarify and to create consistency within House Bill 1218:

Page 1, Line 9 - It should reference subsection 5 not 4. The numbering was changed when North Prairie Regional Water District was added as a stand-alone member. I believe the intent was to reference the other city member being elected at the annual meeting of the ND League of Cities.

Page 1, Line 13, Subsection 2 (North Prairie) - One representative from the North Prairie Regional Water District recommended by the North Prairie Regional Water District board of directors.

Page 1, Lines 14-18, Subsection 3 (All Seasons) - One representative from the All Seasons Water Users District recommended by the All Seasons Water Users District board of directors.

Page 1, Lines 19-21, Subsection 4 (Upper Souris) - One representative from the Upper Souris Water District recommended by the Upper Souris Water District board of directors.
