Chairman Robin Weisz and Members of the House Human Services Committee –

My name is Sierra Heitkamp and I am the Legislative Director for North Dakota Right to Life. I am testifying today to represent the interests of our 3700 members across the state of North Dakota.

Since the overturn of Roe V. Wade on June 24, 2022, there have been many questions regarding what this means for the direction of our organization. At North Dakota Right to Life, we questioned ourselves as to how our vision and goals may have to evolve moving forward to adequately protect those most vulnerable from conception to natural death. After many conversations, the answer became clear – not only will we continue our work in protecting life at all stages, but we also want to back legislation that educates our citizens and encourages life. A woman or family who finds themselves with an unexpected pregnancy should never feel that abortion is their only option to achieve a successful, happy life.

North Dakota Right to Life and its members support HB 1265 as we would like to see education on human development as to humanize the child that has been conceived. We often hear the argument that "it is just a clump of cells" or "the fetus isn't a human, separate from its mother, until carried to term and delivered." This is misinformation and due to the advancement of science and technology, we know that this is far from the truth. It is also important for us to note that this bill does not change the curriculum being taught in our public schools, but instead changes the North Dakota Life Science and Health Education Standards.

I myself first became involved in this pro-life fight in junior high. The Teens for Life chapter in Hankinson, ND was having their monthly meeting and I decided to attend to experience what a group like this did in educating our youth. Throughout the years I was involved, I heard from a girl not much older than me who had an unexpected pregnancy. She bravely explained her experience so that the other members may be able to understand that abortion was not the only option for her. We also watched human development videos during another meeting which was truly eye opening to me as a child in understanding that this is in fact not a "sack of cells," but a human life in critical need of protection and love. The experiences from participating in these educational events truly shaped me into the advocate I am today and fuels my passion in protecting those most vulnerable from conception to natural death.

I ask this committee today for a **Do Pass recommendation on HB 1265** in order to positively encourage the education of our youth on the important lesson of human development in the womb.

Chairman Robin Weisz and members of the House Human Services Committee, I am Linda Thorson, State Director for Concerned Women for America (CWA) of North Dakota. Today, I am testifying for Concerned Women for America Legislative Action Committee in support of HB 1265.

As our state's largest public policy women's organization, we strongly support the provisions in HB 1265 as it meets the goal of providing quality education to a level of excellence in academic achievement.

My background is in education. I served as a speech-language pathologist in public schools for 26 years and received the 2015 Council for Exceptional Children Teacher of the Year Award.

HB 1265 provides content guidelines to our Life Science and Health Education Standards relating to "growth and development and human sexuality." It adds statements to be taught in the classroom regarding the use of digital imaging of human growth and development inside the womb to the Educational Benchmark outlined in our state standards.

First, I want to note the North Dakota Content Science Standards document was developed beginning in 2018. Superintendent of Public Instruction Kiersten Baesler describes the purpose for creating our State Science Standards in part of the <u>Forward</u> written in 2019:

"The North Dakota Constitution recognizes the importance of public education in nurturing prosperity, happiness, and a 'high degree of intelligence, patriotism, integrity, and morality.' Statewide academic content standards, and an assessment system that measures student progress, help us to reach these noble objectives. By using our new, challenging science standards to measure student achievement, we can monitor growth, address deficiencies, and ensure comparability of educational opportunity statewide."

Standards have been changed in the past. Seventeen changes are listed in the North Dakota Science Content Standards following the Introduction in the Documentation Revision Log found online. HB 1265 seeks to make minor changes to our Life Science and Health State Standards. The content description of a "high-quality, computer-generated rendering or animation showing the process of fertilization and every stage of human development inside the uterus, noting significant markers in cell growth and organ development for every week of pregnancy until

birth" provides a meaningful human growth development discussion in the Life Science classroom.

Animal and plant reproduction is part of the North Dakota Life Science Education Content Standards. Adding "human growth and development" and "an oral, written or digital lesson, lecture or presentation about human biology related to pregnancy and human development inside the womb" to the benchmark in the Life Science curriculum provides students the current scientific evidence and should be provided in every school in our state.

Secondly, Personal Health (including Growth and Development) is one of the eight <u>Health</u> <u>Education Content Areas</u> outlined in the <u>North Dakota Health Education Content Standards K-12</u>.

The first standard of the Health Education Content covers understanding concepts related to human growth and development, health promotion, and disease prevention. The Educational Standard is further described in Health Education Content Standard, 1.8.10 to be, "Explain the processes of conception, prenatal development, and birth."

HB 1265 addresses the Health Education Standards to include "human growth and development discussion with ultrasound video showing the development of the brain, heart, sex organs, and other vital organs in early fetal development." The specific language is related to pregnancy and human development inside the womb.

Lastly, on January 10, 2023, during a House Education Committee hearing, an educational expert, Dr. Aimee Copas, Executive Director North Dakota Council Educational Leadership, was asked by Representative Eric James Murphy about the frequent occurrence of curriculum changes. Although HB 1265 does not require schools to change curricula but simply adds language to our State Standards, Dr. Copas's perspective should be heard. She said, "Our world is transforming itself in an amazing rate. The way that information is rapidly changing is transforming at an amazing rate... I don't know that we're ever going to see a time where curriculum shifts are going to stop happening. I'll frame it this way too, when in health care do things ever remain the same for more than a few years?"

I agree with Dr. Aimee Copas in our rapidly changing world of information. North Dakota Life Science and Health Education Standards must include digital images of human development covering every stage of development in the womb.

Best practices in education involve using a variety of instructional methods for <u>multi-model</u> <u>learning</u>. The digital presentation of an ultrasound video, showing a developing and moving image of a human being in the womb, will enhance the classroom discussions in Health and Life Science classes in a positive and meaningful manner.

CHAPTER 15.1-21 CURRICULUM AND TESTING

15.1-21-01. Elementary and middle schools - Required instruction.

In order to be approved by the superintendent of public instruction, each public and nonpublic elementary and middle school shall provide to students instruction in:

- 1. English language arts, including reading, composition, creative writing, English grammar, and spelling.
- 2. Mathematics.
- 3. Social studies, including:
 - a. The United States Constitution;
 - b. United States history;
 - c. Geography;
 - d. Government; and
 - North Dakota studies, with an emphasis on geography, history, the federally recognized Indian tribes in the state, and agriculture of this state, in the fourth and eighth grades.
- 4. Science, including agriculture.
- 5. Physical education.
- Health, including physiology, hygiene, disease control, and the nature and effects of alcohol, tobacco, and narcotics.

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15.1-21-02. High schools - Required units.

- 1. In order to be approved by the superintendent of public instruction, each public and nonpublic high school shall provide instruction in or make available to each student:
 - Four units of English language arts from a sequence that includes literature, composition, and speech;
 - b. Four units of mathematics, including:
 - (1) One unit of algebra II; and
 - (2) One unit for which algebra II is a prerequisite;
 - c. Four units of science, including:
 - (1) One unit of physical science; and
 - (2) One unit of biology;
 - d. Four units of social studies, including:
 - (1) One unit of world history;
 - One unit of United States history, including Native American tribal history; and
 - (3) (a) One unit of problems of democracy; or
 - (b) One-half unit of United States government and one-half unit of economics:
 - e. One-half unit of health;
 - f. One-half unit of physical education during each school year, provided that once every four years the unit must be a concept-based fitness class that includes instruction in the assessment, improvement, and maintenance of personal fitness;
 - g. Two units of fine arts, at least one of which must be music;
 - h. Two units of the same foreign or native American language;
 - One unit of an advanced placement course or one unit of a dual-credit course; and
 - j. Two units of career and technical education from a coordinated plan of study recommended by the department of career and technical education and approved by the superintendent of public instruction.
- In addition to the requirements of subsection 1, each public and nonpublic high school shall make available to each student, at least once every two years, one-half unit of North Dakota studies, with an emphasis on the geography, history, and agriculture of this state.

March 13, 2023 Senate Education Committee Testimony in Support of HB 1265

Chairman Jay Elkin and members of the Senate Education Committee, I am Linda Thorson, State Director for Concerned Women for America (CWA) of North Dakota. Today, I am testifying for Concerned Women for America Legislative Action Committee in support of HB 1265.

As our state's largest public policy women's organization, we strongly support the provisions in HB 1265 as it meets the goal of providing quality education to a level of excellence in academic achievement.

My background is in education. I served as a speech-language pathologist in public schools for 26 years and received the 2015 Council for Exceptional Children Teacher of the Year Award.

HB 1265 provides content guidelines to our Life Science Standards and Health Education relating to "growth and development and human sexuality." It adds statements to be taught in the classroom regarding the use of digital imaging of human growth and development inside the womb to the Educational Benchmark outlined in our state standards.

First, I want to note the North Dakota Content Science Standards document was developed beginning in 2018. Superintendent of Public Instruction Kiersten Baesler describes the purpose for creating our State Science Standards in part of the <u>Forward</u> written in 2019:

"The North Dakota Constitution recognizes the importance of public education in nurturing prosperity, happiness, and a 'high degree of intelligence, patriotism, integrity, and morality.' Statewide academic content standards, and an assessment system that measures student progress, help us to reach these noble objectives. By using our new, challenging science standards to measure student achievement, we can monitor growth, address deficiencies, and ensure comparability of educational opportunity statewide."

Standards have been changed in the past. Seventeen changes are listed in the North Dakota Science Content Standards following the Introduction in the Documentation Revision Log found online. HB 1265 makes minor changes to enhance content by the addition of a "high-quality, computer-generated rendering or animation showing the process of fertilization and every stage of human development inside the uterus, noting significant markers in cell growth and organ

development for every week of pregnancy until birth" in order to provide a meaningful human growth development discussion in the Life Science classroom.

Animal and plant reproduction is part of the North Dakota Life Science Education Content Standards. Adding "human growth and development" and "an oral, written or digital lesson, lecture or presentation about human biology related to pregnancy and human development inside the womb" to the benchmark in the Life Science curriculum provides students the current scientific evidence and should be provided in every school in our state.

Secondly, Personal Health (including Growth and Development) is one of the eight <u>Health</u> <u>Education Content Areas</u> outlined in the <u>North Dakota Health Education Content Standards K-12</u>.

The first standard of the Health Education Content covers understanding concepts related to human growth and development, health promotion, and disease prevention. The Educational Standard is further described in Health Education Content Standard, 1.8.10 to be, "Explain the processes of conception, prenatal development, and birth."

HB 1265 addresses the Health Education Standards to include "human growth and development discussion with ultrasound video showing the development of the brain, heart, sex organs, and other vital organs in early fetal development." The specific language is related to pregnancy and human development inside the womb.

Lastly, on January 10, 2023, during a House Education Committee hearing, an educational expert, Dr. Aimee Copas, Executive Director North Dakota Council Educational Leadership, was asked by Representative Eric James Murphy about the frequent occurrence of curriculum changes. Although HB 1265 does not require schools to change curricula, but simply adds language to our State Standards, Dr. Copas's perspective should be heard. She said, "Our world is transforming itself in an amazing rate. The way that information is rapidly changing is transforming at an amazing rate...I don't know that we're ever going to see a time where curriculum shifts are going to stop happening. I'll frame it this way too, when in health care do things ever remain the same for more than a few years?"

I agree with Dr. Aimee Copas in our rapidly changing world of information. North Dakota Life Science and Health Education Standards must include digital images of human development covering every stage of development in the womb.

Best practices in education involve using a variety of instructional methods for <u>multi-model</u> <u>learning</u>. The digital presentation of an ultrasound video, showing a developing and moving image of a human being in the womb, will enhance the classroom discussions in Health and Life Science classes in a positive and meaningful manner.

Chairman Jay Elkin and Members of the Senate Education Committee -

My name is Sierra Heitkamp and I am the Legislative Director for North Dakota Right to Life. I am testifying today to represent the interests of our 3700 members across the state of North Dakota.

Since the overturn of Roe V. Wade on June 24, 2022, there have been many questions regarding what this means for the direction of our organization. At North Dakota Right to Life, we questioned ourselves as to how our vision and goals may have to evolve moving forward to adequately protect those most vulnerable from conception to natural death. After many conversations, the answer became clear – not only will we continue our work in protecting life at all stages, but we also want to back legislation that educates our citizens and encourages life. A woman or family who finds themselves with an unexpected pregnancy should never feel that abortion is their only option to achieve a successful, happy life.

North Dakota Right to Life and its members support HB 1265 as we would like to see education on human development as to humanize the child that has been conceived. We often hear the argument that "it is just a clump of cells" or "the fetus isn't a human, separate from its mother, until carried to term and delivered." This is misinformation and due to the advancement of science and technology, we know that this is far from the truth. It is also important for us to note that this bill does not change the curriculum being taught in our public schools, but instead changes the North Dakota Life Science and Health Education Standards.

I myself first became involved in this pro-life fight in junior high. The Teens for Life chapter in Hankinson, ND was having their monthly meeting and I decided to attend to experience what a group like this did in educating our youth. Throughout the years I was involved, I heard from a girl not much older than me who had an unexpected pregnancy. She bravely explained her experience so that the other members may be able to understand that abortion was not the only option for her. We also watched human development videos during another meeting which was truly eye opening to me as a child in understanding that this is in fact not a "sack of cells," but a human life in critical need of protection and love. The experiences from participating in these educational events truly shaped me into the advocate I am today and fuels my passion in protecting those most vulnerable from conception to natural death.

I ask this committee today for a **Do Pass recommendation on HB 1265** in order to positively encourage the education of our youth on the important lesson of human development in the womb.
