Senator Joan Heckaman

Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Sen. Joan Heckaman from District 23 and I am here to introduce SB 2228 to you.

The 2020 Census has been completed and the North Dakota Legislature will begin the process of redistricting. Currently, Legislative Council as well as legislative leaders have been apprised of work that has begun through national legislative organizations. Legislative Council has accepted a software vendor for our redistricting process. But current law provides that the redistricting committee will be selected from members of the legislature. To me, that poses the question, does it allow legislators to own their voters?

The bill before you establishes a nonpartisan advisory redistricting commission that would be tasked with using the census date to devise a plan that divides ND into 47 legislative district and complies with the requirements in the US Constitution. After the plan has been developed, the commission will submit the plan and any proposed legislation necessary to implement the plan to legislative management for their consideration, For your information I provided the composition of the last redistricting committee in a hand out. (redistricting handout).

You may have heard the work "Gerrymandering" used in connection with redistricting. Gerrymandering is an unfortunate process that restricts the voices of voters by dividing up communities, towns, and counties into different legislative districts simply to serve a partisan goal. (Handout of current districts)

In analyzing information, I have a handout for you to participate in the redistricting process. (red/blue handout)

As you can see, using the same demographics, there are several ways to divide up citizens into different kinds of districts. Using this exercise as an example, shows exactly why some states already have commissions that takes the politics out of the process.

NCSL has information on states that have commissions with primary responsibility for redistricting, some who serve in an advisory capacity, and some have backup commissions if the legislature is unable to agree.

The methodology in this bill would be transparent, representative, and accountable to the people of North Dakota by ensuring district lines are drawn fairly and in a manner that respects the communities and political subdivisions in our state. This bill also ensures that legislators are truly serving the best interests of the communities they represent.

Legislators should not be able to pick their voters. Voters should pick their legislators.

Redistricting is an important process that impacts representation, either positively or negatively. It is my hope that we can be non-partisan in North Dakota and join other states who recognize the importance of the process.

Testimony SB 2228 Senate Government and Veterans Affairs Committee

January 28, 2021

Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Government and Veterans Affairs Committee, good afternoon. My name is Don Morrison. I live in Bismarck and I am here as a volunteer for North Dakota Voters First, which is a non-partisan, grassroots North Dakota group working to strengthen our democracy, help make our elections and public policy more open, ethical, and accountable to the people of our state.

I would like to address two positive sections of SB 2228.

First, this bill provides a redistricting process that would lessen the influence of partisan politics. People in North Dakota would like fewer districts with squiggly borders, obviously drawn to make sure certain candidates or a certain party has greater advantages. Article IV of the North Dakota Constitution and North Dakota law requires districts to be compact. We would also recommend that the new district map respect communities as much as possible, especially city, tribal, and county boundaries. The nonpartisan commission in this bill would provide a great opportunity for drawing legislative district lines fairly.

Second, this bill keeps the redistricting process open and public. That is what we do in a country that is based on citizens participating in government. More often, government functions well when it is open and closer to the people.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony. North Dakota Voters First encourages you to put a Do Pass on SB 2228.
