If a city or county allocation is less than two hundred dollars, that city or county is not entitled to receive a payment for the quarter and the undistributed amount must be included in the total amount to be distributed to other cities and counties for the quarter.
- On or before June thirtieth of each odd-numbered year, the attorney general shall certify to the state treasurer the amount of accumulated funds in the charitable gaming operating fund which exceed the amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for administrative and operating costs associated with charitable gaming for the subsequent biennium. The state treasurer shall transfer the certified amount from the charitable gaming operating fund to the general fund prior to the end of eachbiennium The balance of the net proceeds in the charitable gaming operating fund, less holdback of any amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for administrative and operating costs associated

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE OF AMENDMENT:

This amendment increases the quarterly transfer of charitable gaming tax revenues from the charitable gaming operating fund to the gambling disorder prevention and treatment fund from \$10,000 per quarter to \$95,000 per quarter, resulting in an additional \$680,000 being transferred to the gambling disorder prevention and treatment fund rather than the general fund each biennium.

Chairman Klemin and Members of the Committee:

I'm Scott Meske, representing the North Dakota Gaming Alliance and on behalf of the 152 Members of the NDGA, we offer our support for House Bill 1114 and respectfully offer a one word amendment.

In section 2. Paragraph a, the NDGA requests the amount of charitable gaming funds allocated to the gambling disorder fund increase from ten thousand per quarter to eighty thousand per quarter, bringing the total contribution to \$320,000 per year.

- 2. Excluding moneys in the charitable gaming operating fund appropriated by the legislative assembly for administrative and operating costs associated with charitable gaming, the attorney general shall allocate remaining moneys in the charitable gaming operating fund on a quarterly basis as follows:
- a. Ten Eighty thousand dollars to the gambling disorder prevention and treatment fund. Moneys in the charitable gaming operating fund are appropriated on a continuing basis to the attorney general for the purpose provided in this subdivision.

We do believe it is important the State's gambling disorder fund is properly structured, and appropriately funded. Any funds remaining after funding both the administrative needs of the gaming office, and the gambling disorder program, should be transferred to the State's General Fund.

To assist with the funding of the programs, we would also request an amendment be added to the bill to *increase* the amount that is designated towards gambling disorder prevention from it's current level of \$10,000 per quarter to \$80,000 per quarter, or and eight-fold increase. Combined with proceeds from the North Dakota Lottery, and the contributions from the Tribal Gaming Compact, the total amount available for the gambling addiction and treatment program would total about \$790,000 each year.

We believe there is more than enough revenue from gaming-generated taxes and contributions to support a comprehensive gaming addiction and treatment program in North Dakota, run by the Department of Health and Human Services.

The North Dakota Gaming Alliance urges a DO PASS on SB 2077 with the proposed modifications as we have outlined.

Chairman Bekkedahl and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee,

My name is Lisa Vig. I am a Licensed Addiction Counselor and Internationally Certified Gambling Counselor. I have been providing treatment services to problem gamblers and their family members for over 30 years, primarily with Lutheran Social Services of ND and most recently with the ND DHHS Behavioral Health Division.

I am writing today in support of additional funding to address problem gambling and related harms in ND. A continuum of care, much like we have for those struggling with Substance Abuse Disorder is needed. Problem gamblers and affected others are deserving of the same kinds of resources and supports as those with alcohol or drug problems. Problem Gamblers suffer similar harms; mental health struggles, lost or damaged family relations, legal struggles, financial devastation, loss of job, and a high risk for suicide.

Currently, there are limited prevention and early intervention efforts. This results in the rapid progression of a gambling disorder. By the time many problem gamblers seek help, they often need a more structured program and/or an inpatient setting to stabilize and address suicidality. We have limited availability for counseling and treatment throughout the State with only 3 trained counselors currently offering services. Problem Gamblers would also benefit from the support of Peer Recovery Specialists as well as sober living arrangements, much like those that are available for substance abuse clients.

We've made great strides in creating a continuum of care for those struggling with substance abuse, allowing them the greatest opportunity for a successful recovery. Effectively treating problem gamblers requires the same commitment and effort. Surely, with the overwhelming dollars generated from gambling activities in ND, more direct consideration could be given to support and help those who are damaged and harmed because of their involvement in gambling activity.
